OPENING

Of the Territorial Normal School.

The Normal School building located at Tempe, in Maricopa county, is now completed, and it is the intention of the Board having the matter in charge, to open the school on the first Monday in February next, and continue for a period of 16 weeks.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

1. All applicants must be not less than 16 years of age and of good character.

2. Applicants must be able to pass an examination in the "First Grade" laid down in the Course of Study for Public Schools. [See appendix to School law.]

3. Each member of the Legislature is authorized to nominate one pupil who shall be entitled to free tuition. No charge will be made for tuition to those who intend to follow the profession of teaching. All others must pay a monthly tuition charge of FOUR DOLLARS.

4. Board and lodging can be obtained in private families for about \$20 per month.

The Board intends to furnish every facility to those who attend, for obtaining a thorough education.

A MIDGET'S WARDROBE.

Lucia Zarate's Tiny Hosiery and Shoes—Gloves Too Small for a Baby.

Every one was of a different color, and old gold was contrasted with pale green, until the eyes were pained looking at such an array of colors. Fastened on a cord across the top of a window were pairs of tiny silk hose, all this and colors being represented. It was not so much the oddity of position that pleased the inspector as it was the wondrous shape of the hose. They were too small for baby stockings.

"Ah, yes; see Lucie's stockings," parbleu! She sure has 'em plenty," said Mrs. Zarate, the mother of the midget. There were just three other occupants of the room, and all had turned their gaze on the reporter, to see how he received this flood of mixed Spanish-Mexican-French, and very bad English. Through the invitation of Manager Goodwin, of the Great Chicago Museum, the reporter was paying the little lady a visit in her parlors, and an inspection of her wardrobe was undertaken. It was surely the strangest lilliputian wardrobe ever seen outside fairyland.

Two large trunks were opened and the contents displayed, the operation being aided by Lucia, who pulled costly dresses about with a display of vandalism that rather startled the reporter. Everything worn by the little lady has to be especially designed, and made to order, thus entailing an additional cost. The most difficult workmanship is on her shoes, owing to their peculiar shape. Being scarcely more than two inches long, the toes are less than half an inch wide, but the instep must be very high. Most of her shoes were made on a special last formed from a plaster model of her tiny foot; yet not one shoe in ten snugly fits her foot. It seems almost impossible to make a shoe small enough. For three years past a shoemaker on Dearborn street has made her "sabots," charging from \$4 to \$16 per pair, but he has lately utterly refused to make any more pairs, claiming that it does not pay. They are usually of silvered leather, with pink cord-silk lining, small silver buttons, and silver cords and tassels at the top. The little lady has lately displayed a fondness for French hosiery.

Her hosiery was the most curious, however. It would be safe to say that over thirty pairs of silk stockings were displayed, either on the line over the window airing, or were taken from the trunk and shown by the comely mother. They were not big enough to draw over a common tallow candle, and it is only in this way of comparison that one can realize how wonderfully Lucia is made. They are made in Paris by Martini fils, she ordering two dozen pairs at one time.

With each costume the midget has an entire outfit of dainty underwear, most lavishly decorated. Her dresses are marvels of art, and she has one for nearly every day in the year. It takes one and one-half yards of cloth to make her a complete dress. The dress-makers invariably get the costumes too big, and have to alter them several times in order to insure a good-fitting garment. One dress made by a London firm is brown silk, with creamy lace and black jet ornaments, and fits her like a glove. It cost about \$200, and was the only dress ever made for Lucia that did not have to be changed. She has several Mother Hubbards for housewears, and looks very comical in them, and her bonnets are Parisian make, and look fit for a wax doll. She has her gloves made in Paris also, and economizes in this particular line as it is very difficult to get them made to suit her. There is hardly a baby under 1 year of age whose hand will go into one of these gloves. Her tastes are more for bright colors, though she has several dresses of somber hue.
