The Indians on the San Carlos reservation, are reported to be very industrious this season.

Wm. Blackburn, a prominent mining man of Sonora, is visiting his brother, Charley Blackburn, of this city.

There are nine patients at the County Hospital, who, under the able treatment of Dr. Dunn, are doing well.

Scrapping matches were both frequent and bloodless in the city last night. The officers made several arrests.

The Parliament of the Colony of Victoria has voted the sum of 400,000 to be expended in prospecting for gold.

The large, new hall of the Heliness Mission was crowded last night, and many people stood in front of the doors on the street.

We, the jury empaneled by the Coroner of Cochise county to inquire into the death and manner of such death of Tomas Salcido, find that the deceased's name was Tomas Salcido, a resident of Fairbank, twenty three years of age, a native of the United States, and came to his death from the effects of knife wounds inflicted by a knife in the hands of Carmen Mendibles, and we also charge Pedro Gonzales, Victoria Luso and Angelas Paredas as being accessories to the crime, and recommend that they be tried as such before the court of Cochise county.
