The Rhode Island campaign, now fairly opened, promises more excitement than has been known in the politics of that State since the Dorr rebellion.

The Russians are getting their navy in order for battle. Only yesterday they moved eighty unused vessels to ascertain if they were trustworthy and serviceable.

Two individuals who thirsted for gore fought a duel in San Francisco yesterday, although the contestants were thirty feet apart and seven shots were exchanged, no one was hurt.

The Legislature of Tennessee has made a liberal appropriation for school purposes, but the amount does not equal the sum total of the repudiated bonds of Tennessee held by the trustees of the Feabody fund.

A Tory journal commenting upon the meeting held at Cooper Union, where three thousand people assembled to express their sympathies with Ireland in her struggle for justice, said that three-fourths of the vast assemblage deserve being thrown into the New York harbor.

Every man in New York City who breaks a law has a constitutional right to a speedy trial for his offense, and admission to prison if found guilty. If the criminal does not insist on this right himself the people must do it for him.

Since the Coronado beach property at San Diego, was put on the market, less than six months ago, the sales have amounted to \$425,000. The list of purchasers include Chinamen and various other nationalities and many eastern cities are represented.

Miss Dawes daughter of the venerable senator from Massachusetts is a bright cheery young woman, who likes newspaper work and takes her assignment from the city editor's desk like the rest of the reporters on the Pittsfield paper which has secured her services.

The total German force within what is considered striking distance of the frontier, approaches \$100,000 men, and the French forces, similarly situated on the other side, are slightly heavier. The estimates of French strength near the frontier, published in Berlin, are shown to have been erroneously exaggerated.

The Interstate Commissioners will not have more than fifteen days in which to study and try to comprehend the intricacies of the law "to regulate commerce." Thousands of the brightest minds in the world have been studying the problem of how to "regulate commerce" for cycles of years and have not solved it yet. Perhaps the Commissioners can do it.

This city is well provided with gas and gas lamps, yet for some cause unknown to the inhabitants, our streets are left in the darkness. If any trouble or difficulty should occur after dark in this city, it would be a moral impossibility to apprehend the offender, as Fremont street is enshrouded in darkness, the people should at least know the reason of the gas not being lighted, and in the event of refusal or inability of the Council to remedy this defect, some steps can be taken by the citizens. Darkness is always an incentive to crime, it aids and abets all species of it, and the sooner this matter is looked into, the better it will be for all concerned.

The Chicago Anarchists cursed the authorities over the dead body of Naeb's wife. There are some things about these people that are absolutely grotesque in spite of their terrible earnestness. Another illustration of this feature is the latest exploit of Mrs. Lucy Parsons, who when she was refused the use of a hall in Columbus Ohio, went to the Mayor's office and blackguarded and abused him and the city authorities in such a violent manner that she was arrested and thrust in jail, all the time loudly declaring that no officer dare to touch her. Anarchism and the more rapid forms of Socialism may be regarded as a dangerous form of contagious mental disease. The Supreme Court will it is thought affirm the judgment of the lower court and send the anarchists to the gallows.

WORLD'S NEWS.

A Railroad Disaster—Many Lives Lost

An Attempt to Lynch an Unruly Citizen.

The Russia—United States Extradition Treaty Signed.

An Enraged Spouse Kills Her Better-Half.

CHICAGO, March 26.—Mayor Carter Harrison has again declined the Democratic nomination for Mayor of Chicago and this time declares that his decision is final.

VICTORIA, B. C. March 26.—The first through passenger train on the Canadian Pacific railroad, since the blockade, arrived here from the East last night. It is believed no further interruption to travel will occur.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 26.—Eighty-seven Torpedo vessels belonging to the Baltic fleet of the Russian Navy have been ordered out in a state of constant readiness for service. Crews have been ordered forthwith for forty-five of these vessels.

CHAMBERSBURG, March 26.—The town was thrown into excitement over an attempt at lynching last night. It was not known until to-day. Frank Guyer, painter, alleged to have forsaken his children, and taken up with another woman. Last night a man called him out, and instantly a crowd of masked men surrounded him and commenced beating him. After pounding him, they asked him to return to his wife. He refused when they said they would tar and feather him and hang him from the railroad bridge. They started in that direction with him. Guyer fought hard for his life and finally succeeded in making his escape. He is seriously injured and confined to the house. No clue to the perpetrators of the deed.

NEWARK, O. March 26.—The wrecked steamer Scotia, of the Fabre line, on the beach 15 miles west of the Fire Island, has been reached by a wrecking steamer and the rescue of the passengers will be proceeded with as soon as possible. A dispatch was received to-day from the scene of the wreck, which states, that the sea is smooth and the vessel resting easy.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 26.—The steamship Belgic arrived to-day from China and Japan, and brought news that a dreadful tragedy occurred at Chen, China, 20 miles northeast of Hongkong. Over three hundred tramps appeared at the village and greatly irritated the inhabitants. The villagers inveigled the whole body into a temple and during the night set fire to it. Only forty occupants of the building escaped. The remainder were burned to death.

NEWARK, O. March 26.—Jacob Broad died last night from the effects of a scalding received at the hands of his wife on Sunday night during a quarrel. The couple frequently had trouble, and on this occasion becoming exasperated by the abuse of her husband, Mrs. Broad threw a pan of boiling water in his face. She kept every body out of the house after the scalding, but since his death she has become a raving maniac.

NEW YORK, March 26.—The World this morning prints the text of the extradition treaty with Russia, which was signed yesterday by Secretary Manning, and Minister Strows. It provides for the mutual surrender of persons convicted or charged with murder, manslaughter, rape, abortion, burglary, robbery, forgery, counterfeiting, embezzlement, piracy, mutiny and malicious destruction of property when it endangers life. The Treaty, also provides that persons shall not be extradited for political offense.

NEW YORK, March 26.—Arrangements are being perfected in this city for the consolidation of a number of roads south of the lakes, into a system like that of the Richmond & West Point Terminal Company. The Louisville, New Albany

& Chicago, and Lake Erie & Western, and Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton, will form the roads of the system, and will compete for business from the Mississippi to the Ocean. The Dalton & Dalton, railroad has been bought by the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton, and will be used as a connection with Chicago and the Atlantic. Most of the principal stockholders in the Richmond Terminal, are interested in the new system, and if Styner and Ives, purchase of the Baltimore & Ohio, is successfully carried out, their railroad will be used for the eastern connection.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 26.—A duel took place early this morning in Hinchey alley, near the City Hall. The participants were Jim Neal and Val Pacheco. On Wednesday Neal struck Pacheco's wife, after she had declined his attentions. Last night he challenged Pacheco to a duel, who accepted. Both men met in the alley, selected their seconds, paced off ten steps and under the dim light commenced the fusillade. Neal fired nine shots and Pacheco two, none of which did any harm. All the parties then disappeared. Pacheco was arrested later this morning.

LYNCHBURG, March 26.—A train on the Norfolk & Western railway went through the bridge on Otter river. The bridge is some miles above this city. It is stated to-night that eight persons were killed. Particulars cannot be obtained. A wrecking train with physicians has gone to the scene of the disaster.

LATER—The morning freight train went through the bridge nine miles from Liboria, on the Norfolk & Western railway. The bridge was in process of repair. Eight or nine workmen were killed. Several others were wounded, none of them train hands as far as known. The engine and several cars crossed the bridge safely before the structure gave way.
