Osa Family Who Kill. OWENSBORO, KY., June 10.

Chas. F. Wing, after five days' trial, was convicted of murder at Princeton to-day, the jury recommending a sentence of ten years. Wing killed Policeman Cruger, in Princeton, in December, 1883 while under arrest for drunkenness.

The Riel Trial. OTTAWA, ONT., June 10.

It now appear doubtful whether the Government will be ready to go on with the prosecution of Riel before the middle of July. While there is sufficient evidence immediately at hand to commence on, it is deemed advisable to delay the trial a few weeks that the case against him may be more perfectly prepared.

Considerable uneasiness is felt over the report that Blood Indians have gone on the war-path. The Bloods are one of the most numerous tribes in the Northwest, and are closely allied to the Blackfoot Nation.
