Cigars and cigarettes will be manufactured from Mexican tobacco. The public at large will be treated to some first class smokes, when the factory opens on June 1st.

Parker the Murderer.

The outlaw James Parker who broke jail at Prescott May 9, and murdered E. L. Norris, assistant district attorney of Yavapai county, has not yet been captured and might possibly double back on his trail and come this way.

Age 32 and 33 years, weighs about 150 pounds, 5 feet 8 inches high, medium complexion, medium dark hair and inclined to be curly; wears his hat on the back of his head so as to show his forehead and hair; when he left was smooth shaven, but his beard may be grown since; has a full forehead, light blue eyes, rather round face with a brazen look; is a good cow-puncher and horse breaker, and will probably go to some out-of-the-way ranch. The saddle he was riding was a single-rigged saddle with tapaderos, checkered, stamped and made by J. S. Calles, Prescott, Arizona, whose stamp is on same. The bridle was a silver-mounted combination bit, and silver-mounted split eared headstall; rawhide, braided reins.
