Mr Hampton has been transferred here in a promotion inspector. He is the youngest son of the noted General Wade Hampton.

Prosperous Mining Camps.

Great activity pervades the atmosphere in and about Chaparral; people over there are very jubilant over their railroad prospects, and about every man, woman and child appear as happy as if entering into the 7th heaven. The railroad is expected to be constructed into Chaparral, thence to Big Bug, Meyers, and on to Bumble Bee. Chaparral at present, is a typical mining camp, and now contains within its (unincorporated) limits two restaurants, meat market, blacksmith shop, two hay and grain feed corrals, and necessarily several of the "O, be joyful" places of rest, where "wet goods" are supplied the thirsty and where "the weary are at rest."

The Gopher Gold Mine and Milling Company are putting up machinery and soon will commence piling rich gold rock on their dump. This company have recently put in a 10-horse power Weber hoisting engine, and are making many other improvements.

Our old friend, Sam Foran, judging from his vivaciousness, appears to have "turned back the hands of time," and is now as happy over the railroad prospects as any kid in Chaparral.

All along the Big Bug, from Joe Meyer's up to the Anna mine mill, being as far up that classic stream as we had the pleasure (?) of going, placer miners were seen "rocking the cradle" or working the sluice boxes.

We did not visit the Lotta mill and mine, but from "Anaville" could hear its stamps pounding away on rich rock one half mile away, up a gulch putting into Big Bug on the south.

The Anna mill has shut down temporarily, but was expected to resume operations soon.

The Henrietta mine and mill was running with its usual complement of men and appeared to be turning out its quota of yellow wealth.

The Little Jessie mine and mill continues to hold its own as one of the best gold-bar producing mines in old Yavapai county.

There is much more to be said about the Big Bug, Chaparral and Bumble Bee country, but as our visit was merely a "hop, skip and jump" across country, we will reserve further remarks in this connection until another time and visit, when more time will be taken in looking up those sections.—Pick and Drill.

INTERIOR MEXICO NOTES.

SALTILLO:—There is some talk of erecting a new sanitarium here for people with lung troubles.

The work on the new railroad under the direction of Chief Engineer Abbott, is progressing in the most perfect order.

MICHUACAN:—The flour mill at Pates, this state is about to resume work again, after having been shut down for a year. It is now hoped that there will be some returns as there is more animation in agricultural circles than heretofore.

SAN LUIS POTOSI:—The cereal crops of the district of Rayon, under the most favorable circumstances, will not give the results anticipated. It is estimated that the crop will only yield thirty-three per cent of what was reckoned on.

BOQUILLAS DEL CARMEN:—There are many mines being worked here which promise to turn out well. A company was recently formed here called La Alianza which has been working the El Pacific mine and annexes with excellent results. There is a notable increase in the business of the place, especially in the mining circles.

HIDALGO:—The flooded mines of Pachuca showed the following for the lowering of water during last week: The Candelaria one metre, twenty-four centimetres; the Xotol two metres, seventy six centimetres; the San Rafael two metres, twelve centimetres; the San Juan one metre, seventy centimetres, and El Carmen eleven metres.

VERA CRUZ:—News comes from Tlaxcalpan that the operations are

progressing on the canal which will connect the river Papaloapan with the Consolacion river, making a water way of great importance which will permit the rapid transportation of goods between Tlaxcalpan and Salabarrana. The trips that are now made by steamers plying between the two places consume seven or eight hours going, and the same on the return trip. But by the new route the round trip will be able to be accomplished in three hours. The region traversed by this canal produces aguardiente, sugar, corn, coffee, etc., etc.

MINING NEWS.

James H. Graham, the Fortuna Blaisdell stage proprietor, has been in town for several days. He gives a glowing account of La Fortuna mine, and says it is growing bigger right along, rather than working out, as mines in some countries often do. Mr. Graham says that the country around Fortuna also contains a number of already discovered first class properties, which, as soon as capital takes hold of them, will prove no small producers.—Yuma Sun.

Col. Jas. A. Fleming, president of the Black Warrior Copper Co., arrived on Sunday from Phoenix, to inspect the company's mines and advise as to future operations. We understand that development work will be more actively prosecuted.—Globe Silver Belt.

Miles W. Gibbons, superintendent of the Kasser Gold Mining Co., who spent Sunday in town, informed us that development work on the company's claim was progressing fairly well. In the new shaft on the Kasser mine at a depth of 53 feet, very good ore was encountered. The company has recently bonded a number of gold claims in the Lost Gulch region which will be thoroughly prospected.—Globe Silver Belt.

B. A. Haraszthy, representing the well known mining and real estate firm of Haraszthy & Carpenter, and Mr. Campbell, a prominent mining man from Prescott, who once operated the famous Vulture mine, in Yavapai county, for Senator Tabor, made an investigating trip last week to the Dos Palms and Corn Springs districts, north of Salton. They returned Wednesday with roscate reports of that country. There is now being shipped a great deal of rich ore, which comes from small, very rich stringers, in which the country abounds. There are a good many prospectors and miners in the country, and they all appear to be doing well. There is abundance of water obtainable, both from tanks and living springs. The outlook for the Dos Palms and Corn Springs districts, according to these reports, is very bright.—Yuma Sun.

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A MINER'S BURIAL.

Ed Schieffelin is Buried on His Old Camp Ground.

The last rites were performed at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon over the remains of Ed Schieffelin, the discoverer of Tombstone, who died in Canyonville, Oregon, on May 14th, and by his last request was to be buried in the city which he founded. The ceremonies took place in Schieffelin hall, which was draped in beautiful and appropriate design and was crowded with people from Eisbee and other points, who gathered here to do honor to the one they had loved. Colonel Harris of Tucson, who was formerly a citizen of Tombstone, and who knew the deceased well, gave the funeral address and spoke touching upon the many virtues of the departed. The body was interred in the Granite hills, where he made his first camp, before the discovery of Tombstone, where a grave had been dug from the solid rock. His remains were followed to the grave by a vast concourse of people, who vied in doing honor to the famous prospector and discoverer of Tombstone camp.

LIVE STOCK ITEMS.

The stock trains which were delayed last week along the lines of railway in New Mexico, because of the washouts, which have been frequent of late, were all started on their way east this morning.

The calf crop in Southern Arizona is better this spring than it has been for several years.

The rush of Mexican cattle still continues. The McKinley law will stop business along the border.

The outlook for the cattle business is brighter now than it has been for years. Those who stay now will win out.

Antonio Sosa has taken the contract and is under bond to fill the same, to gather and deliver at the stock yards at Tucson for shipment 1,650 head of cattle belonging to the estate of John Charleau. The cattle ranged on the Lower San Pedro, in Cochise county. One drive of 500 head has already been made and Mr. Sosa is now busy gathering for a second shipment. Stock in this section are in excellent condition and the ranchers are hopeful for the coming year.—Tombstone Prospector.

Stock throughout the Sulphur Spring valley were never in better condition as this season of the year than now, and especially is this true of that section of along the west side of Dos Cabezas and Chiricahua mountains. In the Riggs neighborhood good beef may be had and all the young stock is in fair marketable condition; and all along down the valley the same conditions prevail. Feed is abundant and stockmen are jubilant.—Tombstone Prospector.

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
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
