BRIEF ITEMS.

Business in Tucson continues good. The railroad shops will stay at Tucson.
There is no let up in Tucson improvements.
Several weddings are on the tapis for this summer.
W. C. Davis is home from his Yavapai county mines.
W. A. Linder of Nogales was in town during the week.
Major J. A. Black has the biggest jewelry store in Arizona.
There are a number of fine camping grounds near Tucson.
A. C. Bernard and Jack Halbert have gone to Arivaca on business.
Wm. Grosetta is building a brick dwelling which will be a handsome one.
John H. Behan is in Washington to see about his re-instatement as Chinese inspector.
Gen. Wm. Herring will deliver an oration at the G. A. R. exercises at the opera house tonight.
It is reported that Baxter and Irish are about to sell their rich copper mines at twin Buttes.
The convent academy will soon have another story added to the present stone two-story building.
Fred Hughes, clerk of the board of supervisors, has returned from a trip through the county on tax business.
Hon. W. T. Smith, one of the heavy property owners of Phoenix, was in the old pueblo the first of the week on business.

Pennington street is being reopened by the city fathers. The street will be opened to Seventh avenue and widened forty-five feet. This will give a much needed outlet to the lower end of Pennington street.
Col. and Mrs. J. H. Martin returned from Tombstone Wednesday morning. The colonel was there on legal business, and while there visited Ft. Huachuca, where they were very pleasantly entertained.—Star.

Treasurer Hoff held an auction sale of personal property as the court house this morning as advertised; at which \$28,15 was realized. This was all property left by deceased persons buried at the expense of the county.—Citizen.

Anton Hittenger, his daughter, Mrs. R. W. Gray and Baby Gray, have gone to Oakland, Cal., where they will reside in future. Mr. Gray has been there some time. Many people in Tucson will miss this pleasant family. They have resided here for years and their friends are counted by the hundreds.
Real Estate Agent H. D. Underwood reports real estate in increasing demand and values appreciating. It is surprising, he says, the continual de-

mand there is for houses, furnished and unfurnished. This time of the year there is generally a falling off in the demand for houses, but this year the demand seems to continue.—Star.
The Goldschmidt addition is claiming some attention. The people, especially newcomers, are selecting the addition as the place for building homes, so that next fall it is likely there will be very considerable building in that desirable section of the city. Mr. Underwood is the agent for this addition and believes that in less than five months every lot will have been purchased or bargained for.—Star.

One case of small-pox was reported to the city authorities on Sunday last. The Blue Jay mine twenty-eight miles south of Tucson is developing some rich bodies of black sulphurets. A tunnel has been run and at the end of the tunnel an incline of sixty feet deep has developed a rich body of sulphurets which will go 200 ounces silver to the ton. There is over a carload at the depot which will be shipped as soon as sufficient to make three carloads is taken out. Night and day shifts are being worked. Fred Willis is foreman for the company.—Star.
