## MINING NEWS.

Now that the famous old Vulture mine in Arizona is again being opened up there are many of the old timers coming to the front with stories concerning this grand old property. In the early days of this property only the richest of the ores would stand the great cost of transportation and milling charges. Expenses were so great then that only the very highest grade ores were milled. All the balance was thrown aside and used in the construction of buildings in the camp. The old office building and store rooms of the company are built of rock, or ore running upwards of \$50 in value per ton in gold. The walls of the office building are three feet thick, and the structure is about fifty feet wide by 100 feet in length. Some day when the mine is exhausted and all the ore taken out and worked, no doubt the old buildings will be torn down and walls run through the mill. There are other buildings of the camp built of ore. The old assay office building was torn down several years ago by miners and the walls milled. It was a very small building, but the returns footed up fully \$2,000. You can pick up pieces of ore all over the camp. It is everywhere you go about the mines, a great deal of which is very rich. There was such an enormous quantity that it seems to have been depreciated in value in the eyes of the old proprietors. They did not even consider the value of a large ledge running off to the west of the mountain of gold, for a blacksmith shop, with ore walls, was erected right on its widest part. The building is still there as a monument to the days when ledges of rich gold ore were none too good for a foundation or a blacksmith shop. Of course this old landmark will have to fall some day.—Western Mining World.

The Black Warrior Copper Co. are doing an increased amount of work on their several claims in Webster gulch. They are running five levels in the Black Copper mine, the lowest at a depth of 340 feet, and developments are very encouraging. A new winch is being placed over the Dadeville shaft which is 100 feet deep. Also an 18-inch track is being laid on the surface from the Geneva to the Montgomery claim for the transportation of ore from the mine to the end of the wagon road. About 25 men are now employed by the Black Warrior Co. and the force is to be further increased. Mr. John Whyte, acting superintendent,

expresses himself as satisfied with the progress made in development and the present showing of ore. President Jas. A. Fleming, who has been in Denver, is expected here about the 20th inst.—Globe Silver Belt.

C. D. Lane, owner of the Fortuna mine, passed through here Wednesday on his way home from Old Mexico. Mr. Lane reports that while there he purchased a new mine paying therefore \$3,000,000. Of that amount he has paid down \$100,000 and the balance to be paid in thirty days. Mr. Lane has had remarkable success in all his mining deals in the past, and we hope he will continue to have the same in future, as he is a liberal first class man and a benefit to any community.—Yuma Sentinel.

W. H. Storey, bookkeeper for the Castle Dome Mining Company, was in town this week. Mr. Storey is at present in charge of the mines, Superintendent Trego having gone east on business. The company is contemplating closing down the mines for a while, for the purpose of putting in new and extensive machinery. Whether or not they will do so Mr. Trego will determine in the east.—Yuma Sun.

## His Last Picnic.

A most deplorable accident occurred on the homeward trip from the firemen's picnic last evening. The cars were crowded and a lot of people were standing on the platform. Among the number was Miguel Barba of Phoenix, who amused himself by hanging on the car and picking up flowers growing alongside the track. In one of these attempts he got too far out and his head struck a telegraph pole crushing his skull and inflicting other serious injuries. The accident occurred just this side of the orange grove, and the injured man was picked up and placed in the baggage car, where Dr. Scroggs who was on the train, did what he could for him, although from the first it was evident that the poor fellow was past all earthly help. He never regained consciousness and died before the train reached Phoenix. He was one of the most prominent young Mexicans of Phoenix and was a druggist by profession. His unfortunate death will be deeply regretted by a host of friends. The deceased was about twenty-three years old and unmarried.—Tempe News.

## Brand Registration.

The promptness with which stockmen throughout the territory are complying with the requirements of the law providing for territorial registration of brands is surprising even to the Live Stock Sanitary Board, who knew, from personal correspondence with representative stockmen, that there was a widely prevailing sentiment in favor of a territorial brand book.

Opponents of the law predicted that not one twentieth of the brands in the territory would be on the territorial brand book by the first of July. It now seems probable that more than half of the county recorded brands will be on record by the end of June.

In addition to the transfer of the county recorded brands, there are now on file with the secretary of the board over five hundred applications for new brands, awaiting consideration as soon as possible after July 1.

Those who have failed as yet to procure and send in certificates of their brands, now on record in their county, should lose no time in attending to the matter, since the period within which their brands are privileged will expire June 30, after which date they will be on the same footing as new brands and subject to rejection if found to conflict with any of the several hundred brands already entered.—Range News.
