## RAILROAD NEWS.

### What is Going on Along the Line.

There will be about fifty carloads of Mexican peas shipped in bond to Europe this year from Guaymas, through the United States via New Orleans.

Mrs. C. C. Miller, wife of Agent Miller at Imuris, arrived from the south Wednesday. Mrs. Miller will take up her residence here during the hot summer months.

M. O. Bicknell, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific railroad passed through Nogales last Tuesday for Guaymas and intermediate points in the interest of his road.

The S. P. will improve Guaymas bay and put on a line of steamers from San Francisco to Guaymas in the near future. This will be a great boon for Guaymas and her citizens will hail the news with delight.

Mr. G. G. Graham, agent at Magdalena, accompanied by Mrs. Graham came up from that place Wednesday. Mrs. Graham is in ill health but it is hoped she will soon recover under the influence of Nogales' health-giving climate.

Mr. Geo. Jones, the genial Wells-Fargo messenger, has returned from his visit at Santa Monica. Mr. Jones is somewhat sunburned but is looking well and hearty. He reports having had a jolly time sporting on the beach but says he did not care for the sea.

The Sonora train was one hour and thirty-five minutes late Friday evening on account of the burn of bridge No. 592 at Casita. Had it not been for the lively work of Conductor Will Brodrick, who took off his coat and helped put in the cribbing, the train would have been six hours late.

Thos. Wilkinson, section foreman at Sonoita, was in Nogales during the week and paid the VIBETTE a pleasant visit. Mr. Wilkinson has only been in the land of Spanish speaking people a short time but he is rapidly mastering the sweet sounding language and will soon be talking like a native.

There will soon be such another excursion.
