MINING NEWS.

Pete Anderson and Chas. Swenson, two smelters employed by the Copper Queen for some years past, left this morning for a six months trip to the old country. They have been among the most steady of the smelter employes and go on a deserved trip.—Prospector.

A. C. Malin of the Ophir mine near the Twin Buttes, was in town yesterday and states that at a depth of twenty-five feet the Ophir shows an eighteen inch vein of ore running twenty per cent copper and one half ounce in gold. Malin for years followed the occupation of a "typo" but declares that mining and prospecting in Arizona is far preferable in every respect, and especially that it at least promises to prove such more pecuniary profitable.—Star.

Max Rudy, who, in company with Mel Harwood, owns the Anaconda, one of the most promising claims in the King of Arizona district, is in town. He says the good reports concerning that district are in no wise exaggerated, and that with the development of water it will truly prove the King of Arizona. Rudy and his partner have done the assessment work on the Anaconda, and they are well pleased with the showing the property makes. The ledge is well defined and about four feet wide, and horns well clear across.—Yuma Sun.

Supt. Randolph of Tucson, with President Gleason of the King of Arizona mine, came in from Tucson Tuesday and met the other stockholders of the mine, and the company was formally organized and incorporated. We learn that a clean-up was made at their 5-stamp mill Monday from a forty-hour run, and while we did not hear the exact amount cleaned up, they claim that there has never been as much gold taken from the same amount of rock (18 tons) before in the history of mining in the southwest. The teams they have no are not able to keep the mill running but arrangements have been completed for new teams; and in a few days they expect to start on a regular run. Then you may expect a record breaker.—Yuma Sentinel.

The Helmet Peak Co. are working a few men, under Eob Roberts, Supt., on their group of mines lying about a mile and a half south of the Olive camp, and 2 1/2 miles south of Tucson. The group consists of four claims, including the once famous "Speculation" mine, worked some years ago by what was here called the Westinghouse Co. The Helmet Peak Co. was organized here a few months ago and represents Tucson capital solely. The work now being done is on the Atlanta mine (formerly the "Speculation"). At a depth of fifty feet drifting is being done on the lead, which is several feet in width, with a paystreak of ten to eighteen inches, which by sample assay shows silver, 60 and 80 ounces and 40 per cent lead. A carload of ore is out and assorted for shipment. It will be in within a few days and shipped. The management is proceeding very conservatively, and will add to the working force as rapidly only as development justifies it. However, there will be no delay in making the camp another valuable feeder to the business of Tucson so soon as the property shows itself to be capable of being so.—Star.

E. J. Gilson and son, Clarence Gaston and Frank Ward, went up to Sanford on a stock train last Saturday on a little hunting expedition and returned on the helper engine that night. They killed a number of Blue Rocks during their five hours hunt. Mr. Gaston did most of the killing.
