Mr. F. H. Seymour and son were in Nogales during the week.

Hy L. Caraway went to the Bacanuchi ranch in Sonora on Tuesday.

A. B. Smith, father of Mark Smith of Nogales, is here from Tucson visiting his son.

Mr. John Smith, the genial postmaster at Crittenden, was a visitor at Nogales early this week.

Mrs. W. C. Budge, wife of Conductor Budge on the Sonora road, is spending the summer in Prescott.

J. W. Kelley of Kansas City, passed five carloads of cattle Monday. They were feeders from Magdalena.

Paymaster Lesser of the Sonora & N. M. & A. railroads, has been up from Guaymas during the week paying off.

C. P. Pearson and wife came up from La Colorado, Sonora, Sunday night and will visit in Nogales a few days.

Arthur E. Crepin, manager of the Company Store at Rollin, was in Nogales Sunday and Monday on business and pleasure.

Geo. Webb, Albert Behan and Sam King went out to Walker's Canyon Sunday and brought in a lot of Blue Rock pigeons.

Miguel Borrion and C. O. Allen, manager and superintendent of the Colorado Gold and Silver Mining Company, were in town a portion of the week.

Supt. C. C. McNeil, of the Maricopa & Phoenix railroad, has gone to San Francisco. He was called there at the same time Supt. Naugle went up.

Secretary of State Celedonio C. Ortiz is in Nogales with his wife and children to spend the summer. He has taken rooms in the Mascareñas building on the Sonora side.

An American lady from Nevada will open a candy factory and bakery, with soda fountain and ice cream parlor in Nogales on September 1. She will make only first class goods.

W. C. Greene of Cochise county, spent Sunday in Nogales and went back to Crittenden that evening where he had left his team. From there he went by team to the Cananea mines.

W. E. Pomeroy returned from Mesquite City Tuesday. Mr. Pomeroy has just returned from California where he went with the remains of Prof. F. J. Nether-ton, who was thrown from his horse and killed June 30.

Richard H. Reynolds and J. M. Miller, U. S. customs inspectors at Bisbee, captured 40 gallons of mescal and arrested two Mexicans Friday night at Bisbee. The Mexicans were bound over and in default of bail went to jail.

Nogales now has a city water works on the syphon plan. Chenoweth Bros. have spent thousands of dollars putting in wells and machinery to supply the town with water and now they have hit on an inexpensive way to supply water.

Joaquin J. Saldana, postmaster at Hermosillo, died at Nogales Monday afternoon. Mr. Saldana had been ill for some time. He had secured a leave-of-absence and was on his way to the City of Mexico when taken suddenly worse here and died.

Lieutenants Wright, Grisard and Bennett with a squad of men were in Nogales a portion of the week. These officers are traveling through the country drawing maps of the ranches, roads and trails on the American side along the international boundary line.

Albert Behan arrested a Mexican Saturday morning at Lochiel with two gallons of mescal in his possession. The Mexican was held over Saturday to the next grand jury in the sum of

\$100 in default of which he went to Tucson. Deputy U. S. Marshal Scott White came over from Tombstone Monday and took him in.

The Dos Nacion cigar factory is turning out a lot of fine cigars now. Following are the names of the leaders: Celestiales, Imperiales, Regalia del Comercio, Wells Fargo, Mineros, Victorias de Colon, Regalias de Mexico and Orgullo de Ricardo. This is the only cigar factory in Arizona and the cigars are all made of genuine imported tobacco.

There has been a new superintendent appointed at Rollin. Mr. Richard Eames, Jr. is now in charge and is getting ready to increase the working force. The new parts of the smelter have been received and it will start up between now and the first of the month. Dr. Eames and Chas. J. Eames, Jr., have gone east to remain. Rollin is destined to be one of the heavy producers of Pima county.

J. P. Furlong, a man well known in this part of the country, as a wide experienced mining man and who is doing business now at La Colorado, Sonora, as news and stationery agent, and who lived in Bisbee for five years. It is claimed he was married a year and a half ago. If there is anyone here or anywhere else who will prove the fact they will receive a reward of \$1000 by calling on J. G. Pritchard, the postmaster at Bisbee.

Henry Douglass, who has been passenger conductor on the Sonora railroad for the past two years, left Monday night for San Francisco. "Dug," as his friends (of whom he has a host) called him, is one of the most thorough railroad men who ever came to Nogales and withal a perfect gentleman. Few railroad men have run out of Nogales who will be missed as much as Mr. Douglass. SONORA NEWS.

Mining and Other Items from Our Sister State.

The mining interests of Sonora never looked better.

The steamship Orizaba arrived at Guaymas from San Francisco last Monday.

The Cerro Blanco country in Sonora is coming to the front as a mineral producer.

Last Wednesday was the first rainfall experienced by southern Sonora for this season.

McWood & Breckenridge have taken a bond on the Mulatos mine in Sahuaripa district. This mine is a fine property.

The schoolship Zaragoza, which left Guaymas a year ago last May to go around the world, arrived at Vera Cruz on the 3rd inst.

The state secretary of Sonora has annulled the concession of Jas. Moffett to build a smelter in Sonora on account of nonfulfillment of contract.

The Trinidad mine in the Sahuaripa district has closed down. This is one of the biggest mines in Sonora. We did not learn the cause of its closing down.

El Sol has been enlarged to a six column paper and is now neat and newsy. Valencia and Figueroa, the editors, are to be congratulated for their enterprise.

The new company which recently purchased the Las Amarillas and Grand Central mines in Minas Prietas district, are now taking out \$80,000 a month in gold clear of all expenses.

Now that the rainy season has commenced in Sonora mining matters will liven up, and mills that have had to shut down on account of shortage in water will again steam up.

Captain Teofilo Genesta has taken command of the gunboat Democrata, and Don Manuel Hajar, formerly commander of the same, leaves for Veracruz to take charge of the naval training school there.

Jose Abundio Salas, Pascual Hernandez and others who were recently arrested at Altar on a charge of having bogus coins, have been released from custody as there was not sufficient evidence to convict.

Eighty Yaquis who belonged to the 24th battalion of the Mexican army formerly stationed at the Yaqui river, have been mustered out at the City of Mexico and are on their way back to the Yaqui country.

The Twelfth Battalion of the Mexican army under command of Colonel Garcia Hernandez will shortly leave Torin on the Rio Yaqui, where they

have been stationed for several years and go to the City of Mexico.

George Grunic, of Hermosillo, Son., is at the Jardin, and expects to remain here about three weeks. Mr. Grunic was in Mexico a year ago and was so impressed with the country that he has returned. Associated with Dr. H. Hooper and Jacob Schuele of St. Louis and New York, he has started a large brewery at Hermosillo. The last gentleman is inventor and patentee of American ice machinery.—Mexican Herald.

MINING NEWS.

The Copper King mines of San Xavier district are taking out some rich copper carbonates.

The Corda Brothers were in town yesterday from Olive camp, as was Charlie Dougherty also. They all look prosperous and report the well known chloriding camp as still holding its own.—Star.

Jos. Goldtree yesterday shipped a carload of high grade silver-lead ore from the New Colorado mine in the Sierritas. He says he will use the proceeds in paying the expenses of himself and family on a summer outing to the coast. Unless the returns fall below that from former shipments from this property he can extend his trip to Paris if he cares to do so.—Star.

General Manning is shipping a carload of silver-lead ore daily from the San Xavier property, more especially for the purpose of ascertaining the true method of economically treating the ore before adding machinery for treating the ore on the ground. This property now promises to soon become an important feeder to Tucson's business.—Star.

Charles Dickson brought in some very ordinary looking samples from the Red Wing claim, in Gold gulch, yesterday, which when broken showed free gold in abundance. The Red Wing and Red Jacket claims, situated in Gold gulch sixteen miles west of Globe, owned by Jas. H. Pascoe, Wm. H. Stewart and Chas. Dickson. The lead is 14 by 18 feet in width and assays have been obtained running from \$14 to \$80 in gold. The Red Wing is opened by a shaft 50 feet in depth and by drifts and cross-cuts showing up considerable ore. On the Red Jacket there is a 25-foot shaft. They are among the most promising claims in the Pinto Creek region.—Globe silver Belt.

MEXICAN MATTERS.

General Martinez, governor of Puebla has returned to his post.

The recent earthquakes in Tehuantepec damaged the light house at Salina Cruz.

Heavy rains have fallen in the vicinity of Jimenez and good crops are assured.

The squadron of auxiliary cavalry stationed at San Luis Potosi have been ordered to Queretaro.

The mint at Culiacan has received forty cases of copper to be coined into a half million cents to be put in circulation.

The prisoners in Belem to date number 2653 men 536 women, a total of 3099. Among those there are 52 who are condemned to death.

A Monterey barber has discovered a preparation in the form of a soap that will shave the stiffest beard by applying the soap and wiping the face with a towel.

The legislature of Yucatan has unanimously approved the treaty arranged by Secretary Mariecal with Belize and confirmed the action of the Mexican senate.

The suit to oust Dan Burns from the control of the famous Candelaria mines in the state of Durango, has been revived again. The suit is for the mines proper and all connections. They are valued at \$18,000,000 and some millions have already been spent by Burns in defending similar suits.

BURNETT WAS ARMED.

Additional Facts in Reference to the Burnett Killing.

From the Bisbee Lyre we glean a few facts about the Greene-Burnett tragedy which will interest Mr. Greene's many friends as follows:

"The defense immediately commenced habeas corpus proceedings before Court Commissioner Johnson, which was heard yesterday. Burnett's pistol, with one empty chamber, and Green's with four empty chambers were identified and placed in evidence. Chief of Police Weiser stated that after Green surrendered and on passing the

body of Burnett he paused, and raising his hand, said:

"Vengeance is mine, saith the Lord, I will repay. That man caused the death of two innocent children and broke my wife's heart. The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away. Blessed be the name of the Lord."

"Mrs. Hart testified that Burnett had told her that he would kill Green on sight, or the first chance he had, and on hearing of Burnett's death she said: 'Burnett said he would kill Greene, but it has turned out the other way.'"

"B. A. Packard testified that Burnett had told him 'Greene and I can't both live, and I am going to live.' He had said the words in a very emphatic manner, and that he, Packard, had told Greene to be on his guard, as Burnett was a bad man.

"Court Commissioner Johnson admitted Mr. Greene to bail in the sum of thirty thousand dollars, which was at once furnished and Mr. Greene was released."

Avenge His Little Girl.

Further details have been obtained of the drowning of the little Greene girl in the San Pedro. It was supposed that she and another child were drowned owing to their own carelessness. This, it transpires, was not the case. They were overtaken by a break in the dam up the river. The dam was blown out by parties then unknown, and the rush of waters overtook the children, sweeping them away to their destruction. William Greene, father of one of the children, offered a reward of \$1,000 for information as to the identity of the destroyer of the dam. The reward availed, and brought out the fact that it was done by one Jim Burnett, for reasons known only to himself. Greene found Burnett at Tombstone, in front of the O. K. hotel, and after explaining that his errand was to avenge the death of his little girl, he shot and instantly killed Burnett. Public sympathy is all with Greene. No Arizona jury would convict him, and he will doubtless be cleared.—Los Angeles Times.

NEWS OF THE RANGE.

Things That Are Happening Among the Cattlemen.

Mr. J. G. Hall, who has made his headquarters at Deming the past season, was in town Sunday on his way to Sierra Bonita ranch to look at some of Col. Hooker's fine bull calves.
