MORE MONEY NEEDED.

Representative De Graffenreid, of Texas, speaking of wheat and silver says: "Our farmers are this year blessed with abundant crops and the wheat-producing countries on the other side of the ocean have short crops. In other words, the demand for American wheat is almost greater than the supply; hence the big prices which the speculators are just now getting. I am sorry to say this will not always continue, for next year the demand for wheat by reason of good crops on the other side may be only normal, and in that event our farmers will not receive any more for their wheat than formerly. Let the mints of the United States, England, France and Germany be opened tomorrow to silver, and you would see the price of the white metal rise steadily until it reached the level of gold. Why would it rise? Simply because of the demand—just the same as demand has raised the price of wheat." Mr. Graffenreid expressed his opinion strongly of those who are constantly decrying the four hundred million standard silver dollars the country now has, and ended an interesting chat by saying: "The only solution of the question is to open the mints to silver the same as gold. Permanent prosperity will never come through the further contraction of the currency, which the gold bugs are trying to bring about by discrediting our standard silver dollars. What the country needs is more money. That will be the issue in the next campaign, and, in my judgment, the democrats will win upon it."

SEPTEMBER SIXTEENTH

To be Celebrated in Grand Style

By the Citizens of Nogales, Sonora.

The Eighty-Seventh Anniversary of Mexico's Independence to be a Day of Good Cheer.

The citizens of Nogales are to have a big day on the 16th inst. by properly celebrating the day of Mexican independence. Elaborate preparations have been made and a general good time will be had. A big parade will be made and then speaking music and dancing.

15th of SEPTEMBER.

The federal, state and municipal authorities and the members of the celebration committee will meet promptly at 9 o'clock p. m., at the Sonora municipal hall, from which place the procession will start escorted by the Sonora band. Senor Rodolfo Ogarrio, as president of the day, commanding, and march to the public tribune at Campo de Marte, where the following civic and musical program will be rendered:

- 1.—National Hymn by the orchestra.
- 2.—Waltz, "Emilia," by the following ladies: Mrs. Elisa E. de Chenoweth, Mrs. Angela de Martinez, Mrs. Frank M. King, Mrs. A. Hampton, Mrs. S. M. Aguirre, Misses Luisa Mascareñas, Ana Elias, Manuela Escalante, Eloisa Ramirez, Josefa Martinez, Jesus Ramirez, Mary Seymour, Clara Holler, Pastora Joffroy and Jesus Sardoval.
- 3.—Civic oration.
- 4.—Waltz by the ladies studentina.
- 5.—Recitation, poem by Miss Covarrubias.
- 6.—"El poeta y aldeano," by the Gutierrez's orchestra.
- 7.—Tribute, free accession to the public.
- 8.—Danza, "Me quibres," by the studentina.
- 9.—Mexican National Hymn sung by ladies from both sides of the line.
- 10.—Reading of the declaration of independence by the secretary.
- 11.—At 11 o'clock p. m., the municipal president of Nogales, Sonora, will close the evening exercises by giving three cheers in commemoration of the day and adjourn to form the line of march for the torch-light procession.

16th of SEPTEMBER.

- 1.—The nation's flag will be hoisted at sunrise on all the government buildings, salutes fired and street parade by the band.
- 2.—At 10 o'clock a. m., the public school children will hold an infant's festival at the school building with recitations and music.
- 3.—At the Ranchito grounds, at 5 o'clock p. m. races as follows: horse, sack and bicycle, and grained pole with prizes. Open to all.
- 4.—Grand illumination serenade, at the plaza, commencing at 8 o'clock p. m., and fireworks display will include: Salute; Bombardment; Colored Roman lights; Volcanic eruptions; Tricolored fire; Golden showers; Japanese shells and balloon ascensions.

18th of SEPTEMBER.

Grand invitation ball at the custom house at 9 o'clock p. m. The committee respectfully request the citizens to decorate the fronts of their houses and illuminate them on the evenings of the 15th and 16th.

The New Game Law.

To the many sportsmen who have found the text of the game law passed by the last legislature confusing, the following summary of its principal features may prove interesting.

The following game may be killed during the season shown for each:

- Antelope, buck, Aug. 1 to Dec. 15.
- Brant, Oct. 1 to April 1.
- Deer, buck, Aug. 1 to Dec. 15.
- Doves, June 1 to March 1.
- Duck, Oct. 1 to April 1.
- Geese, Oct. 1 to April 1.
- Grouse, Oct. 15 to March 1.
- Partridge, Oct. 15 to March 1.
- Quail, Oct. 15 to March 1.
- Rail, Oct. 15 to March 1.
- Snipe, Oct. 15 to March 1.
- Turkey, Oct. 15 to March 1.

Bucks, for camp or domestic purposes, Aug. 1 to Feb. 1.

The killing of the following game is entirely prohibited:

Antelope, female; bobwhite, camel, deer, female; doe, elk, fawn, spotted; mountain goat, mountain sheep, pheasants, prairie chicken.

The killing of all birds named is prohibited unless the carcass be used or sold for food.

The taking or destroying of the eggs of any of the birds named is entirely prohibited.

The trapping of partridge, quail or grouse is entirely prohibited.

The sale of all game is prohibited out of its season.

The sale of the hide or meat of the following game is entirely prohibited:

Antelope, deer, elk, mountain goat, mountain sheep and turkey.
