BETTER TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

Manager Hoff is Making Arrangements for Improvements.

Chas. F. Hoff, manager of the Sunset Telephone & Telegraph Co., who was in Nogales early this week, stated to THE VIDETTE editor that the service of the Nogales system would be improved by running central office to 9 o'clock p. m., and all day Sundays. Some changes will also be made at central office which will give the operator a better opportunity to answer calls more promptly. Mr. Hoff says that he will strive to give the people of Nogales the very best service he can, considering the limited number of subscribers, until he can connect Nogales with Tucson or the outside world.

He is also now figuring on making the

city authorities a proposition to put in a fire alarm system in connection with the telephone office, in which case central office would be open all night. The idea would be to connect a bell tapper with the city fire bell by means of a "repeater" at central office. Every telephone under this system would become a fire alarm box. Any subscribers could give the alarm by ringing up central office. Central office by referring to a special card ascertains in what fire ward the telephone giving the alarm is located and sets the "repeater" at work which gives the alarm and strikes the number of strikes for the ward. The city would be asked to purchase the tapper and repeater and place from six to ten telephones in different parts of the city, where the policemen or owners of adjacent property can readily find them. These systems are a great success all over the country now and are used altogether in cities of less than 1,500 people.
