MINING NEWS.

What is Going on Among the Metal Searchers.

Large quantities of silver lead ore is being daily shipped in from the old San Xavier mine. This property promises to be a big bonanza.—Citizen.

McCarroll & Snyder, who are interested in the recently discovered "Lost Squaw" mines near Adonde Wells, returned from there the first of the week. They have done the assessment work on the three claims of the group, the St. Louis, Gold Band and Queen.—Yuma Sun.

Robert Templeton came in Wednesday from Gold Rock. He is enthusiastic over the future of the camp, basing his judgment on the vast improvement under the new management. Mr. Templeton says the camp is more prosperous now than it has ever been before.—Yuma Sun.

Superintendent Murray Innes, of the Lost Gulch Mining company, who was in town yesterday, informed us that the mine shows great improvement, pay ore having been developed upon four levels. It is confidently expected that ere long there will be sufficient ore in sight to justify starting the mill. The ore is gold, much of it free milling.—Globe Silver Belt.

Mr. W. H. Pearce, in charge of a ten mule team and wagons, for McPherson & Co., of Tombstone, arrived in this yesterday, and left today for the Montana mine near Oro Blanco. The firm has contracted to haul ore for Mr. Geo. Cheyney from the above mine to the mill, a distance of about three miles. Mr. Cheyney has a good property in the mine, and it is showing up better right along.—Tucson Citizen.

The Kasser Gold Mining company's mill in Lost Gulch is about completed. The stamps will begin to drop on ore soon after the first proximo, and as the supply of ore is abundant it is expected to keep the mill in continuous operation. The work installing the new hoist is progressing and will be completed within a week, when sinking the shaft, now down 100 feet, will be resumed. The mine shows steady improvement.—Globe Silver Belt.

J. E. Walker, Dick Stroud and Frank Prothero, who, with Harry McPhaul of Yuma, own the Yellow Log claim, six miles south of Adonde Wells, came down from Phoenix last week, to begin development work on their property, which is considered one of the most valuable in that section of country. The ledge is large and well defined, and shows considerable free gold. It is thought the entire ledge will mill \$30 per ton. The district in which the Yellow Log is located is quite rapidly coming into prominence, a number of good properties being now opened up.—Yuma Sun.

Jake Meadows is in receipt of a letter from his brother, Charlie—Arizona Charlie, as he is known all over the West—who left several months ago for the Klondyke country. His reports show that his trip has been a most successful one, and though attended with many hardships and not a few serious misfortunes, he has reached Lake Linderman, and the hardest portion of the journey is over. At present he is building boats in which to make the balance of the trip, which will be entirely by water, to Dawson City. Charlie announces that he has not only been eminently successful in getting through, but has made considerable money on the way—in what manner, he did not state, but probably by packing, as he took a number of animals for that purpose. He has grubstaked eleven men, and out of the lot the Klondyke representative of the Meadows family ought to own some placer diggings of value in a short time.—Yuma Sun.
