There are in Mexico 11,512 schools. Of these 5,852 are sustained by the states, 3,212 by cities and 2,442 are private schools. Of the total 6,027 are for males, 3,104 are females and 2,381 are mixed. The actual attendance at these schools was 491,743, and the amount appropriated for the support of public schools nearly \$5,500,000.

Geo. J. Reiger has just arrived from the east. Mr. Reiger is one of the lucky ones and has recently sold the San Pablo mine in Chihuahua for \$50,000. This valuable property is situated five miles from the city of Chihuahua. On His Mettle.

Dr. Goodfellow, who is chief of the surgeons attached to the army under General Shafter, has made quite a reputation during his military career on the Island of Cuba, more particularly before Santiago. The doctor is a Tucsonian, hence his movements are watched more particularly by our people and the people of this county generally.

Professionally Dr. Goodfellow has a high reputation. The incident at Caney was a little out of the ordinary routine, but it was just like Goodfellow to act as he did. This is the story in brief:

"The Cubans, these noble and brave men of whom you have read, showed their true character at Caney. When food was being given to the starving refugees from Santiago, they pushed in great crowds of them, thrusting weak women aside and grabbing the rations. Dr. Goodfellow, wounded in the left hand in the battle, saw one of these greedy loafers snatching food from a starving woman and stopped him. The Cuban grew angry, whereat the doctor punched his face. Then the Cuban wanted to shoot, so Dr. Goodfellow punched him some more and kicked him out of the crowd. He then notified the Cubans that any further depredations would be punished by a firing squad of soldiers. After that the Cubans stayed away. The lazy loafers watched the refugees gathering coconuts and mangoes and then robbed them.—Tucson Star.

RAILROAD NEWS.

What is Going on Along the Line of Travel.

Conductor Homer Prickett has gone to Texas on a thirty days' leave of absence to visit relatives.

There was \$4,700 in the till of the pay car at the time it was burned Sunday. This was melted by the heat of the car. Much of the bullion was afterwards turned by the officers of the company, and the gold will be sent to the mint for recoinage. That they did not find it all was evidenced by a prisoner in the recorder's court this morning. He had about four pounds of the melted metal on him when arrested. It was turned over to the S. P. company.—Citizen.

George Monroe, assistant agent at Fairbanks, is in town on a sick leave. He contracted chills and fever and is trying to shake them.

Changes in School Books.

The Territorial board of education met at San Xavier hotel on Saturday last, the following gentlemen were present: Gov. M. H. McCord of Phoenix, Prof. McNaughton of Phoenix, Treasurer Johnson of Phoenix, Superintendent Shewman of Mesa, and Ex-Gov. Hughes of Tucson.

The change made in geographies was the substitution of the National Series for Appletons which have been in use in Arizona schools for quite a number of years. Arithmetics were also changed both primary and practical, and White's primary, and White's New Complete Arithmetic adopted. Grammars and Language Books were also changed and Sheldon's series substituted. The changes cover about ten or a dozen books.

Death of Pete Gabriel.

The death of J. P. Gabriel—better known as "Pete" Gabriel, is reported. He died at his camp on Friday night last, at the head of Dripping Springs valley. He was buried Sunday morning at sunrise in the camp, where he died. Death is said to be due to the water used. His partner was with him at the time of his death. They were engaged in developing a mining property, and early Saturday morning he left for Sutherland's ranch in the Dripping Springs valley. Here he was joined by Geo. Canine, an employe at the ranch, and together they returned to the camp. The body was, however, so badly decomposed that it was impracticable to move it.

Gabriel was a Prussian by birth, but had long been a resident of this country. For years he lived in Florence and was repeatedly elected sheriff of Pinal county. He was a bold and fearless man, a good man, a good officer and his death removes one more of the old fighting frontier landmarks. His battles with the lawless have been many and desperate. He has been shot often enough to kill a half-dozen men. In his famous encounter with Joe Pity he was shot through the kidneys, and this probably hastened his death.—Phoenix Herald.
