BRIEF ITEMS.

D. J. Butcher shipped to Denver Monday the band of 1000 head of catt recently purchased from Richard G. Brady.—Star.

A wreck occurred on the Southern Pacific railroad west of Yuma late Saturday night in which a mail clerk is reported to have been killed.—Star.

The chemical engine has been thoroughly overhauled and polished, and the members of the new department will endeavor to keep it looking bright. Citizen.

W. T. Harp, engineer of the S. P. Co., who has been stationed at San Simon for the past eighteen months, is in the city on the sick list. He is threatened with an attack of pneumonia.—Star.

The great Wallace shows are billed to appear in Tucson on Monday, November 7. This circus is one of the largest in the world and the acres of canvas which they spread cover everything to be seen in any circus besides novelties of many different kinds.—Star.

It has been decided that in the future the street sprinkling wagons shall accompany the chemical engine to fires, the water used for recharging the chemical's reservoirs to be taken from the sprinklers, thus obviating the necessity of recharging from the hydrants.—Star.

A fire started in the railroad boiler shops Sunday evening at eleven o'clock which for a time threatened much destruction.
