Patagonia is going to celebrate the Fourth of July, and has an idea that it can do it in right proper shape—that is good enough to make it an object for people to come some distance to see and hear the fun and take a shot at drawing down some of the liberal prizes to be offered. Patagonia people are modest, and do not claim that they are going to have the only celebration in the west that will be worth participating in, but do assert that if you will come you will get something more than your money's worth, get a fair deal in every way, and have a mighty good time.
