



ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE Sonora Arizona Gold Mining & Milling Company.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: Harvey Finch, Jos. Saavedra, L. C. Finch, have this day associated themselves together and do hereby associate themselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the Territory of Arizona, and do make, sign, acknowledge and publish these articles in writing and do hereby certify.

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation shall be the SONORA ARIZONA GOLD MINING & MILLING COMPANY.

ARTICLE II.
The principal place for the transaction of the business of this corporation shall be at Nogales in the County of Santa Cruz, and Territory of Arizona, and there shall be branch offices established for the transaction of the business in the States of Sonora, Mexico, and Detroit, Michigan, and there may be branch offices established at such other places as the Board of Directors may from time to time direct. Said corporation may also carry on and transact business of the kind and nature hereinafter provided, in any and all of the states and territories of the United States and the Republic of Mexico.

ARTICLE III.
The business proposed to be carried on by said corporation and the purposes for which the same is formed are as follows: (a) In general, to engage in and carry on the business of mining, refining, smelting and manufacturing of any and all kinds of ores, minerals and metals.

(b) To purchase, lease or acquire by license, bond, option, patent, concession, grant or otherwise any lands, mines, mineral rights, buildings, easements, rights or privileges, machinery, plant or other property, or effects whatsoever which the company may think proper from time to time to acquire for any of its purposes.

(c) To prospect and search for ores and minerals; to develop mines and grant licenses for mining in and over any lands which may be acquired by this corporation, and to sell and otherwise dispose of the lands, mines or other property franchises or privileges of this company.

(d) To buy, sell, manufacture and deal in mineral plants, machinery, implements, conveniences, provisions and things, capable of being used in connection with mining operations or required by workmen or others employed by the company.

(e) To construct, carry out, improve, manage, work, control, and superintend any roads, ways, railways, bridges, reservoirs, water courses, aqueducts, wharves, furnaces, mills, crushing works, hydraulic works, electric works, factories, and other works, or other works and conveniences which may seem directly or indirectly conducive to any of the objects of the company and to contribute to the laws of the Territory of Arizona, or of the United States, or of the State of Sonora or of the Republic of Mexico.

ARTICLE IV.
The amount of the capital stock of the corporation shall be One Million (\$1,000,000) Dollars, divided into One Million shares of par value of One Dollar each; payment for the said stock to be made in such manner and on such terms as the Board of Directors shall determine and authorize, but all of the said stock to be issued as fully paid and non-assessable stock.

ARTICLE V.
The time of the commencement of this cor-

poration shall be the date of the filing in the office of the Auditor of the Territory of Arizona of a certified copy of these Articles of Incorporation and the termination thereof shall be twenty-five (25) years thereafter.

ARTICLE VI.
The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, which Board of Directors shall, for the present, consist of three directors, who shall be stockholders of this corporation. The first directors to be elected shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified. The number of directors of this corporation may, at any time, be increased to a number not exceeding seven (7) directors, all of whom shall be stockholders of the said corporation. There shall be a meeting of the aforesaid directors, held on the first Monday of November, 1907, at the office of this company, in the City of Detroit, County of Wayne, State of Michigan, and thereafter the directors shall be elected annually at a stockholders' meeting, held on the first Monday of November, at 10 o'clock a. m. of each year, and shall qualify and serve for a term of one year, commencing on the first Monday of November of each year. The Board of Directors shall have power at any time to fill vacancies that may occur therein and shall have power at any time to meet at any place, by them designated, either in the Territory of Arizona, or elsewhere.

ARTICLE VII.
The officers of this corporation shall be a President, Vice-President and a Secretary and Treasurer, each to be elected by the Board of Directors from their own number and such other officers as the Board of Directors may from time to time deem necessary. The first officers of this corporation shall be: President, Harvey Finch; Vice-President, Jos. Saavedra; Secretary-Treasurer, L. C. Finch, who shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified. Thereafter the officers of this corporation, above enumerated, shall be elected annually at the Board of Directors of the first meeting of the Board following the annual election of such directors.

ARTICLE VIII.
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability which this corporation is at any time to incur shall in no case exceed One Hundred thousand (\$100,000) Dollars.

ARTICLE IX.
The Board of Directors of this corporation shall adopt by-laws which may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of the stockholders.

ARTICLE X.
The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be held exempt from any and all liability for the corporate debts of this corporation.

Yesterday morning Mr. Krohn went to Tucson on official business, his wife and the little ones remaining here as guests at Hotel Moderno.

Lieutenant Will Old of the Rangers, was in the city Thursday, from Tombstone where he and Sergeant Jeff Kidder took Olney Musgrave, the man captured last Sunday at Patagonia, and wanted in Texas for horse-stealing and other crimes. When the rangers rounded up the horse thief, they supposed him to be George Musgrave, the train robber wanted in Texas for murder and for whose arrest a reward of \$1,800 is offered. George Musgrave was a member of the notorious "Black Jack" gang, that robbed the International Bank of Nogales, about ten years ago. Lieutenant Old says he still has hopes of landing George and that eighteen hundred. From Nogales he will go to northern Arizona for the purpose of rounding up a gang of cattle rustlers, but expects to return to southern Arizona when the snow flies again.

Delos Durfee, the mining engineer, ex-county surveyor of Santa Cruz county, arrived in the city Wednesday night with J. L. Shepard, from near La Dura, in the Yaqui Indian country, Sonora. Mr. Durfee states that the trip from the mines to the railroad at Minas Prietas, was made most of the way at night by himself and Mr. Shepard in order to dodge "bad Indians." The mines in that district owned by Messrs. Durfee and Shepard, have been closed down pending the arrival of the Cananea, Yaqui River & Pacific railway, which runs within a very short distance of their property. The gentleman stated the report that the La Dura Company, controlled by the Richardson Bros., had suspended active operations, was absolutely false, regular shipments of ore being made. Mr. Shepard went to Tucson, his present home, and Mr. Durfee left yesterday for Los Angeles, California, to visit his family.

Wednesday evening F. F. Oranz, the geologist of this city, and Manager N. J. Purcell of the Buena Fortuna Gold Mining Company, owning splendid property out in the Pinito mountains, Sonora, arrived in the city from the properties of the Sonora Copper Company, near Noria, a station on the Sonora, where they had been several days inspecting the progress of work being prosecuted under Manager A. M. Conard's direction. The gentlemen were very enthusiastic over the future outlook for the Sonora Copper, which under Manager Conard's supervision has made an enviable record, splendid shipping ore now being mined. Mr. Purcell also reports a number of new, important discoveries on the property in the Pinito mountains owned by the Buena Fortuna Gold Mining Company of which he is manager. There has been an abundance of rain in the Pinito mountains and in the vicinity of Llano, recently and the country is looking fine.

Board of Trade Meeting

The regular weekly meeting of the Board was held at the Board rooms on Tuesday evening; seven directors and four visitors present.

The Secretary reported that during the week last past he had sent out 105 personal letters and had also sent out 200 pieces of printed literature.

Owing to the fact that Mr. Anderson's withdrawal from the work of the gauging station on the Santa Cruz river has created a vacancy the Irrigation Committee brought in a report recommending that Mr. Jas. A. Harrison be appointed to fill the vacancy. The report was unanimously adopted.

The President appointed the following committee to have charge of the arrangements for the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trade which occurs on August 6th; following is the committee: Mr. H. M. Chapman, Chairman; Messrs. Schuckmann, Kelsey and Escalada.

This committee will at once begin arrangements for the most important meeting of the year, and will make a report on results of their work at the coming weekly meeting.

A series of resolutions were offered by Mr. Chapman, thanking the President of the Board for his faithful services to the Board and the community, and the resolutions were unanimously adopted.

The meeting then adjourned.
