

More Nogales Schools.

The matter of providing more and better school facilities for the children of Nogales has been discussed by the Board of Trade for some time, the Board realizing that something should be done to accommodate the increasing school population.

From figures given the Board, it seems that not more than 40 per cent of the children of Nogales are attending public school. The school building now is filled to overflowing, and the School Board have had to rent other places to accommodate to overflow; should the law be enforced and all children of school age be compelled to attend, there would be no place to accommodate them. With the above facts before the Board of Trade, the President appointed a special committee to look into the matter and see what was best to be done in the premises.

The following is the report of the special committee:

"Your Town Improvement Committee beg leave to report since the last meeting of the Board, this Committee has met in conjunction with the Board of School Trustees of Nogales School District No. 1, for a discussion and consideration of the question of enlarged and more commodious school buildings and accommodations for the school children of said district, conditions which are imperative by the growth of the town and the increase in the number of children of school age. After a full and careful consideration of the subject your committee desires to offer the following resolution, viz:

Whereas; The Public School facilities of Nogales School District No. 1, Santa Cruz County, Arizona, are entirely inadequate to the needs of the district, and for the accommodation of children of school age residing within said district, and,

Whereas; by reason thereof, and of the present crowded condition of the school, and on account of the growth of the town and the natural increase in population and in the number of children of school age whose educational needs must at once be provided for, it is imperative that more room be had and other teachers employed.

Resolved, that it is the sense of this Board of Directors, that the School Trustees of said Nogales District No. 1 be and they are hereby earnestly requested to take such immediate steps as may be necessary to increase the school facilities in and for said district and to that end, we recommend that as soon as the necessary authority can be obtained therefor from the Congress of the United States that said trustees call an election and submit to the taxpayers of said school district whether the bonds of said district, in the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars shall be issued and sold for the purpose of raising money for purchasing one or more suitable school sites for building one or more school houses and for supplying the same with suitable furniture and apparatus."
