Tuesday night Hon. Manuel Mascareñas, the millionaire banker and ranch owner, arrived home from a ten months trip around the world, looking the picture of health and in excellent spirits. A delegation of prominent Nogales citizens met Mr. Mascareñas at Calabasas, and scores of friends were at the train to welcome him home. Mr. Manuel Mascareñas, Jr., who went to El Paso to meet his father, missed him on the way, and did not get back until Wednesday night. Since returning home Mr. Mascareñas has been busy night and day shaking hands with old friends and acquaintances.

Mr. L. Ephraim, president of the Nogales Water Company, who last week went to the Pacific coast with his wife, is back, and it is said has disposed of all his interest in the old Promontorio mines, to the Promontorio Mining Company, composed of Canadian financiers. It is said the deal was consummated Thursday as a result of the report of William McDermott, the old Comstock mining engineer, who for some time past has been thoroughly sampling the old silver-gold mines, from which Mr. Ephraim has already made a snug fortune. Work at the Promontorio will shortly be resumed on a bigger scale than ever, and Nogales will be benefitted as a result, for this has always been the supply point for the camp.

The proposed wagon road between this city and the City of Altar, Sonora, a distance of about ninety miles, should be built at once, in order that this city may become directly connected with that wonderful rich mineral section, where at this time there is a great gold excitement. The committee appointed by President Curtin at the joint meeting of property owners and the Santa Cruz County Board of Trade, to investigate the proposition, is very busy looking into the matter, and will make an intelligent report at next Tuesday evening's meeting of the board. Of course, the proposition will be first submitted to citizens of Nogales, Sonora, who will no doubt immediately take such action as will insure the early completion of the road between here and Altar.

Pacific rail way, will leave Tucson tomorrow for Sonora and Sinaloa, for the purpose of extending personal invitations to the governors of Sonora and Sinaloa, and to the mayors of the large cities in those states to attend the celebration. The committee will formally invite the mayors of Guaymas, Alamos, Mazatlan, Ouliacan, Hermosillo, Magdalena, Nogales and Cananea, on behalf of the citizens of Tucson, who will donate many thousands of dollars to pay the expense of entertaining their guests. The War Department has issued an order detailing the Eight Cavalry, stationed at Fort Huachuca, to march overland to Tucson and take part in the celebration.
