SANTA CRUZ COUNTY DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

We, the Democrats of the County of Santa Cruz, Territory of Arizona, in Convention assembled, do hereby declare our loyalty and fealty to the following principles:

We renew our allegiance to the grand old Democratic party of the Nation which has fought the battles of the plain and common people ever since the formation of the government of the United States. We glorify the name of the immortal Thomas Jefferson who founded the Democratic party and took his stand always on the principles of "EQUAL RIGHTS TO ALL AND SPECIAL PRIVILEGES TO NONE," and who has had as much to do as any other man with the adoption of the great safeguard to human liberties in the first amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

Possessing an abiding faith in the fairness, honesty and general intelligence of the plain people of the United States, and of the proposed State of Arizona; and believing that all political power springs and of right should spring from the people, and having an abiding faith in ability of the people to govern themselves, we pledge our candidate as nominee of this Convention, to devote every atom of his intelligence and ability to the placing what is known as the Initiative in the Constitution of the new state: The initiative because it preserves and reserves to the people of the state the power to legislate for themselves directly, thereby protecting themselves against corrupt legislature.

Believing that legislatures sometimes fail to carry out the will of the people who elect the members thereof, we favor the Referendum which will give the people an opportunity to pass on any legislation that may seem inimical to their interests.

Believing as we do that all public officers should be directly responsible to the people at large and not to political bosses, and knowing that sometimes men are elected to office who fail or refuse to carry out the expressed will of the people, and realizing that it is sometimes impossible to find evidence enough to make convictions in criminal courts where officials have been dishonest, we favor the recall provision for all state, county and municipal officers.

We favor a direct primary law, and a provision in our Constitution insuring a popular expression of choice for the election of United States senators.

We favor a clause in the Constitution of the State in the form of a safeguard against dishonesty in elections, and a publicity of campaign contributions before election. We favor a provision of the Constitution to the effect that the right of action to recover damages for injuries resulting in death or otherwise shall never be abrogated, and the amount recoverable shall not be subject to any statutory regulation or limitation.

We favor a Corporation Commission like the provision in the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma particularly and specifically setting out the powers and duties of the Commission so that the meaning of the law can not be misunderstood or misinterpreted; and we particularly favor the "fellow-servant" clause of the Oklahoma Constitution and also the clause with reference to forcing telephone, telegraph, express, railroad or car corporations to incorporate under the laws of the proposed State of Arizona before they will be allowed to exercise the right of eminent domain in the State of Arizona.

We favor a clause in our Constitution providing that any person accused of violating or disobeying, when not in the presence or hearing of the Court, or Judge sitting as such, any order of injunction, or restraint, made or rendered by any Court or Judge of the new State, shall, before penalty or punishment is imposed, be entitled to a trial by jury as to the guilt or innocence of the accused, and in no case shall a penalty or punishment be imposed for contempt, until an opportunity to be heard is given; and we further

believe that no injunction should issue without the hearing of complete testimony from all parties in interest except in cases where it is made perfectly clear that a temporary restraining order is absolutely necessary to prevent the immediate destruction or life and property, and in these cases a final hearing should be required within ten days; and we favor a provision in the Constitution prohibiting the deportation of citizens without the State except by due process of law, and after hearing in Court with due notice, if prayed for.

The dominant feature of the Constitution must be that governments are made for the protection of the citizen, and not the citizen made for the benefit of the government; written in the light of experience of all the ages, taking the best from all the constitutions preceding ours, and bearing in mind the fact that we must legislate "EQUAL RIGHTS TO ALL AND SPECIAL PRIVILEGES TO NONE," and that the makers of the Constitution must address themselves to that task without partisan bias, and they must formulate a Constitution republican in form, liberal, fair and equitable; and to which end, we invite the co-operation of all the people of Santa Cruz County irrespective of party affiliation, to all of which above expressed principles we pledge the candidate of this Convention.

Sasco Smelter May Close.

Word reached Phoenix from Silverbell today that the smelter at Sasco will probably close down within the next ten days. It is understood that this is in line with a general reduction of the output of copper while the price of the metal is as low as it is now.

Then, too, the building of the Tucson & Port Lobos railroad, the contract for which has already been let, will give the Imperial Copper company its own railroad to the tidewater and thus considerably reduce the cost of operations at Silverbell, it is believed.

It is supposed that the development work at the mines of the Imperial company and also on the El Tiro property, which the Imperial company has recently taken an option on will continue without interruption.—Democrat.

TRYS NEW CURE.

Twenty Years Ago.

Today Postmaster J. Knox Corbett has been besieged by friends wanting to know whether he has always been Tucson's Postmaster, says the Tucson Citizen.

The inquiry received its impetus from the following item in the "Twenty Years Ago"

"Postmaster Corbett has put on a stage between Tucson and Nogales."

"How the time does fly," said Mr. Corbett today. "I remember the time as well as though it were yesterday. Heavy rains had kept the railroad to Nogales washed out for a month. Tons and tons of mail had accumulated here. It was piled in sacks as high as a man could reach, and extended from the old postoffice on Mesilla street and in solid tiers to Congress street and from Congress to Warner street.

Finally in desperation, I wired to Postmaster General John Wanamaker for instructions to sign contracts for hauling that mail overland to Nogales, and receiving it I hired every Mexican and every kind of conveyance I could find to haul that mail. For a time my special mail carriers extended in an almost unbroken line from Tucson to Nogales. The mail went through, and without the loss of a single sack."

"That is all right for 20 years ago," said a friend, "but someone told me yesterday evening that he had heard of a Postmaster Corbett here away back in 1881."

"That was my brother, W. J. Corbett," answered J. Knox Corbett.

May Survey a New Line.

The surveying crew of the El Paso & Southwestern is now straightening weak places along the right of way from Fairbanks to Benson, and is making ready to resume the completion of the location survey for the proposed extension of the El Paso & Southwestern main line down the San Pedro valley from Benson to Winkelman, it is stated. C. S. Henning, chief of the party, has been in El Paso for some days in consultation with his superiors in the division office, and has just returned to his party.

TERRITORIAL NOTES

Items of Interest Culled From Our Exchanges.

The land officials have received notice from the commissioner of the general land office that old camp Bowie military reservation would be sold at auction on October 10, the sale to be conducted by Receiver Arnold and Register Parker. Camp Bowie contains 23,000 acres of land and it is listed as agricultural, grazing and mineral.—Phoenix News.

The price of news print paper in Mexico is soon to be reduced and as a direct result it is believed that newspapers in all Mexico will increase the size of their editions and some may reduce their subscription prices. The exact amount of the reduction is not known but it is believed generally that the saving to publishers will be considerable.—Ex.

It is stated that after the location survey from Benson to Winkelman is completed, part of which was done recently by a party following immediately behind the preliminary survey crew, location lines will be run to Tucson from both Benson and Hereford, and a line projected from Tucson to Phoenix to take the place of the proposed Benson-Winkelman road—Silver Belt.

Sentiment in favor fruit culture in the San Pedro valley is gaining every year, and thousands more of trees were planted laster winter and spring than ever before. Good reports are coming from the young trees, and the yield from older trees is coming into market to speak for itself, so that the movement is starting in good shape to make this a fruit producing county.—Benson Press.

The cyclone which destroyed all the buildings at the Jack Rabbit mine, in the Casa Grande district, also did considerable damage to the big pumping plant and put it out of commission temporarily. As a result work on the mine will be suspended for some time as the damages to the surface equipments cannot be repaired in less than two months. The accident is to be deplored as the work of unwatering the mine with the new mammoth pumping plant had just been completed when the cyclone made its appearance. A cyclone was never known to visit this county before.—Florence Blade.

The county hospital near Douglas stands ready for occupancy and will be turned over to the board of supervisors when it meets Monday at Tombstone, according to Charles Poulti, of the contracting firm of Poulti and Bauer, of this city which constructed the building. The buildings composing the hospital and its adjuncts, including store rooms, bath house, etc., are built of brick and cement blocks, and altogether contain thirty-two rooms some of them large ones that will be used for wards. It is modern in every particular, including plumbing etc. The building was erected at the contract price of \$28,635.—El Paso Miner.
