DISTRICT COURT.

Grand Jury Finds 21 True Bills and Ignores Four.

District Court convened in this city last Monday morning with Hon. Fletcher M. Dean presiding. The following officers were also present: W. A. O'Connor, district attorney; J. W. Walker, court reporter; Harry J. Saxon, sheriff; Allen T. Bird, clerk; Bailiff Bo. J. Whiteside announced the opening of court.

The regular grand jury was called and the following gentlemen were excused: H. J. Karnes, Ernest Best and Jesse Gatlin, after which a special venire was issued for five more jurors.

At eleven o'clock the following jurors were sworn in: Bracey Curtis, William Schuckmann, John O'Donnell, Frank Athearn, A. W. Chapman, M. M. Allred, J. E. Wise, Sam Leeker, J. R. Bent, Mart Holden, E. E. Holler, Frank Irvine, J. B. Brietol, E. K. Cumming, Robert Shugart, F. M. Parker, S. J. Habert, Ford VanMourick, H. Pendergrass, Josiah Bond, George Morris.

Wednesday morning the jury, through its foreman, William Schuckmann, made final report and were discharged. They found twenty-one true bills and ignored four.

The following against whom bills were found, pled guilty and were sentenced by Judge Dean to the territorial penitentiary: C. Leon, burglary, two years; Antonio Cervantes, grand larceny, two years; Rafael Molina, aggravated assault, three years, with credit six months spent in jail; Juan Contreras and M. Sanchez, burglary, each two years. Blas Espinosa, assault with deadly weapon, received a suspended sentence and was released from custody. E. Parra pled guilty of burglary and was given two years.

Mr. Duarte was indicted for robbery, Ben Urquides got two bunches handed him, one for burglary and one for grand larceny; Angel Bajar was indicted on a charge of an assault with deadly weapon.

Those who were indicted and are in custody, will be tried next week, their cases having been set for Monday and Tuesday.
