THE STRIKING ENGINEERS.

Col. Randolph Refuses to Discuss R. R. Business With E. Corrigan.

Since 7 o'clock Tuesday evening, January 17th, all the locomotive engineers on the Southern Pacific Railway of Mexico, including the Mexican firemen, have been off. On Monday sixty two engineers handed their resignations to the company, the same to take effect the following day at 7 o'clock. As a result the regular southbound passenger train due to leave here at 10 o'clock Tuesday night, did not get away until 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, when it was taken out by Assistant Superintendent J. H. Kingsbury, of the Sonora railway, assisted by Fireman Amos J. Yeager, manager of the Zambona Development Company. John Henry was the conductor.

The train due to arrive here Wednesday morning was brought in by Superintendent Kingsbury about ten o'clock Thursday forenoon. It is said that Fred. Cole, who brought the train north returned south with Fireman Yeager, Mr. Kingsbury taking his place at the throttle of No. 2.

Another passenger train from Guaymas arrived in the city about six p. m. Thursday, with Fireman Jameson on the driver's seat. Yesterday morning when the time came for the train to depart on the return trip, Jameson was conspicuous by his absence, having decided to return to the bosom of his family on the American side of the line, and resign from the strenuous, nerve-wrecking business of strike-breaking.

Assistant Superintendent Kingsbury again saved the day by taking the train out.

Engineers on the Nogales Tucson branch of the Southern Pacific refuse to switch in the local yards on account of the fact that they are said to be a part of the Southern Pacific of Mexico.

All the engines of the Southern Pacific of Mexico have been taken across into Mexico where they are being cared for in Master Mechanic Fiedler's open air round-house near the depot.

The following communications, one written by Mr. E. Corrigan, representing the engineers, and the other by Colonel Epes Randolph, vice president of the Southern Pacific of Mexico, will be of interest to everybody in Nogales:

MR. CORRIGAN'S LETTER.

Nogales, Ariz., Jan. 13, 1911.
Mr. Epes Randolph, President,
S. P. R. R. of Mexico
Tucson Arizona.

Dear Sir:
I take the liberty of addressing you with reference to a threatened interruption of friendly relations between your company and the engineers employed on its lines.

A committee representing those engineers has been in session for several weeks past and have with great patience and conservatism, endeavored to reach an understanding with General Manager, Mr. R. H. Ingram. After having been denied by Mr. Ingram any consideration whatever in matter of increased compensation, or improvement in working conditions, they appealed to you, asking you to set a date to meet them that they might present to you their reasons for requesting that some improvement be granted. In reply you referred them again to Mr. Ingram, who informed them that as you were not disposed to grant anything it would be a useless waste of time to discuss the matter with them, thus closing the matter without giving them an opportunity of presenting their case to you.

In taking this matter up with you, I am assuming it is possible that you are not fully informed as to the causes of the deep seated dissatisfaction that exists and that has led up to the present situation.

I am informed that the company formulated and bulletined a schedule of wages, but that instead of that schedule being adhered to, individual subordinate officials have made a practice of exercising their judgment as to how time should be allowed and that it is a common occurrence for time to be disallowed and little or no attention

paid to protests from the victims of such arbitrary methods.

It was with a hope of correcting such abuses that the engineers requested a written wage schedule and in refusing to grant that request or to even discuss the matter with them you have not shown a disposition to deal fairly. Should you persist in that policy the engineers will leave your service, in protest against such unfair and arbitrary treatment and they will be supported to the fullest extent by the organization I have the honor of representing.

I am addressing you with a sincere desire to have friendly relations continue between your company and the engineers, and hope that your sense of justice will impel you to reconsider your reply to the request of the committee and that you will meet them with a view of agreeing with them upon a schedule.

I would be very glad to hear from you upon this subject at an early date.
