Alex. Joffroy, the customs broker, is the proud father of a bouncing boy. The little incontinent arrived Wednesday.

Important special meeting of the Nogales Fire Department this evening. Every member is urged to be present.

Wednesday Mrs. Albert J. Abbott presented her husband with a cute babe girl. Dr. Smelker reports mother and little one doing nicely.

Ben Powell, one of Santa Cruz county's best known, most successful ranchers, has been a visitor in the city a couple of days this week, transacting private business. Ben is for the constitution, first, last and all the time.

Dr. G. W. Quick, a recent arrival at Egin, near where he has taken a homestead, was a visitor here Thursday for the first time. He expressed himself as well pleased with the capital of the county, and promised to return often.

Good news is to the effect that work will shortly be resumed on the Altamira situated near Patagonia, this county, which have idle for some time past. A large force of men will be employed and the whole county will be benefited as a result.

The city fathers, through Mayor Noon, have offered a reward of \$50 for the capture of, or information leading to the arrest or conviction of the thief or thieves, who recently committed, or may hereafter commit burglaries in this city.

Yesterday the young American soldier who is accused of crossing the Mexican line while intoxicated and shouting for Madero, was taken to Fort Huachuca, where it is said he will be tried for his alleged crime against the peace and dignity of Mexico.

Mr. Jose (Pepe) Maytorena, of Guaymas, has for several days past been a guest at the Montezuma hotel, being accompanied by Mr. O. Navarro, also of Guaymas. Being here, Mr. Maytorena is not at the head of 500 Pimas Indians fighting Mexican soldiers in Sonora.

Yesterday morning Francisco Alvarez Tostavo, the young Madero orator, was a passenger on the north-bound train, on his way to San Antonio, Texas, where he has relatives and friends. Hundreds of sympathizers of the cause he so ably represents, wish the young man success.

Thursday morning Mr. O. D. Moore, proprietor of The Arcade saloon, left for the Aguascalientes hot spring near Yuma, Arizona. For some time past Mr. Moore has been a rheumatic sufferer. He goes to the springs in the hope of getting rid of his trouble. Parties who have been there, say he's going to the right place.

F. A. Roby, of Webb C. Ball Company, who was in the city last Monday, appointed Al. O. Hauer official time inspector for the Southern Pacific railway, vice W. H. Smith, resigned. Mr. Hauer has been in the city a long time, being in the employ of W. H. Smith, the jeweler who has removed from the city. He is thoroughly reliable and competent.

Last Saturday in honor of Miss Marguerite Wise's eleventh birthday anniversary, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Wise of Olathe, entertained a number of friends in a most delightful manner. Such a good time was had that the festivities were resumed again on Sunday, when a turkey dinner was served, Dr. Smelker of this city, being one of the honored guests. We wish Miss Marguerite many happy returns of the occasion.

Colonel Emilio Kosterlitzky, commander of the rurales in Sonora, was here the forepart of the week, having come up to take charge of Jose Duarte, the man who last Sunday shot and instantly killed Francisco Portillo, acting presidente of the town of Santa Cruz, Sonora. The colonel is very much alive, reports to the contrary not with standing. It is doubtful if the same can be said of the slayer of Portillo.

Last Sunday at Santa Cruz, Jose Duarte, a Mexican well known in Santa Cruz county mining camps, shot and instantly killed Acting Presidente Francisco Portillo of the town of Santa Cruz. The killing is said to have been the result of trouble over the Pilaris mines near Cananea, which Duarte claimed his victim had taken from him illegally, and then boasted of his act. Monday George B. Marsh, Inc. went out a handsome coffin in which to bury the dead official, and Monday night at 12 o'clock Duarte, his slayer, was turned over to Colonel Kosterlitzky's rurales.

Although officers have been searching low and high for clues that would lead to the arrest of the party or parties who robbed the homes of Attorney Frank J. Duffy, Dr. W. H. Purdy and Dr. A. A. Doherty, no arrests have as yet been made, and timid citizens are wondering "where they are at," and our officers never sleep, for fear of being handed another package. The man who entered Dr. Purdy's house was a tall Mexican. He may be the same man who robbed Mr. Duffy and Dr. Doherty. In all several hundred dollars worth of property was taken, including dental supplies, silverware, clothing, etc.

Manager John McIntyre of the San Antonio Copper Mining Company's mines three mile from Tonichi, Sonora, Mexico, arrived in the city Wednesday night accompanied by Mrs. McIntyre and the babe Mr. McIntyre was at Tonichi during the battles between the revolutionists and federal soldiers on January 26th and 27th, last. On Thursday thirty rebels fought four hundred federals to a standstill, and on Friday fifteen revolutionists held their own against General Torres' forces. Seven rebels and fifteen federals were killed in Friday's fight. Mr. McIntyre denies the report that the soldiers under General Torres attempted to assault the wife and daughters of the railroad company's agent at Tonichi. After attending to private business here Mr. McIntyre will return to the mines.

Cel. Rabago's Losses Great.

Casa Grande, Chib., Mex., Feb. 1—Colonel Rabago with 150 federal soldiers, all that are left of his command of nearly 500 men which left here three weeks ago, arrived here this morning just before daylight from Galeana, having made his escape from that place at early dusk on Monday night. The soldiers arrived here thoroughly exhausted having marched rapidly the entire night to escape the insurrectos whom they supposed would discover their retreat. The cause of his abandoning Galeana was that his men were being constantly cut off and killed, as well as the immediate danger of the desertion of the troops and the consequent loss of the artillery accompanying the column and also their arms and ammunition. Many of the men are wounded and a large number of them are sick.

Slaughter of Chinese.

Last Monday the body of an aged Chinaman was found two miles north of the city by farm hands who notified Immigration Inspector Oon Cronin, who in turn notified the authorities. Coroner J. J. Otham's jury found that the dead man had been shot through the back of the head, probably two weeks ago, by unknown party or parties. The body was buried at the expense of the county.

Wednesday Mr. Cronin learned that another Chinaman had been found near the international line, badly wounded, having been shot four times. The wounded man was brought to the Sisters' Hospital for medical attention and will recover.

He told the officers that he and three countrymen had been piloted across the international line into the United States Tuesday night by two Mexican smugglers, who after he and his companions went to sleep, proceeded to slaughter them like rats. The wounded man insisted that all his friends had been killed by the smugglers, who after shooting him four times left him for dead. He was sure he could identify the murderers.

Sheriff Saxon and his deputies and Inspector Cronin immediately got busy. On Wednesday they arrested two Mexicans for the crime. Both have been positively identified by the wounded Chinaman. They are now in the county jail.

Yesterday morning Sheriff Saxon accompanied by the Chinaman went in search of his murdered companions, who were found lying together riddled with bullets, about one hundred feet from the international line in Mexico.

Being in Mexico, the American authorities could do nothing but notify the Mexican authorities of the terrible crime committed, and no doubt the United States will be asked to deliver the coldblooded murderers now in the county jail. Certainly they should without delay be made to pay the full penalty of their awful crime.

Admit Seriousness of Revolution.

High Mexican army officials admit the grave seriousness of the revolution in Mexico, and state that "rebels are springing up like mushrooms in the night." "The state of Sonora is almost unanimously in favor of a change of government," said a prominent, wealthy Mexican citizen to a BORDER VIDEETTES reporter this morning, and if an election is not soon called and the people given the right to express themselves at the polls, the Diaz government will surely be made to retire from the boards. The revolutionary movement is growing stronger and stronger each day, and it is only a matter of a short time when the United States government will be compelled in fairness to all, to recognize those who are fighting against present conditions in the United States of Mexico.

In the state of Chihuahua the rebels, according to the Associated Press, have been most successful, and the early surrender of Juarez, will do much to strengthen the cause of the revolutionists and hasten the day when the United States will recognize their cause.

"No news from the infected districts in Sonora, is good news," say those who sympathize with the fighting rebel's now occupying General Torres, commander of the government forces on the Yaqui river.

ANOTHER BATTLE.

Mexican Revolutionists Continue to Win in State of Chihuahua.

Pesidio, Texas, Jan. 31.—Federal troops under Col. Dorante, which sustained heavy losses fighting between Ojinaga and Coyame recently, and which were attacked at Boquillita Saturday morning by insurrectos, have been attacked again. Fighting still continues. It is believed the federals have lost many men.

Outgeneraled and defeated with a loss of more than a hundred soldiers killed, the federal forces of Gen. Luque are divided and cooped up in Ojinaga and Cuchillo Parrado.

Gen. Luque, with less than 100 men occupies Ojinaga, and Col. Dorante with about 200 cavalry is at Cuchillo Parrado.

Insurrectos occupy every road leading to both towns and will not permit provisions nor forage to be carried in. Following the rebel ambush at Coyame last week, where he lost more than a hundred killed, Col. Dorante Sunday led his men from the place of refuge. It was the evident intention of avoiding mountain trails where the chances of another insurrecto ambush are plentiful. The rebels quickly divined Dorante's purpose, flanked him, and when the file attempted to pass through a canyon at Boquillita a murderous fire met them.

The federals were slowly forced back in the direction of Cuchillo Parrado.

The insurrectos are hurrying up reinforcements. Yesterday more than 300 insurgents passed through Mulato to aid in the fight against Dorante.

The insurrectos declare Dorante never will be permitted to return to town, but will cut to pieces in the foothills.

FURTHER CONFIRMATION.

Shafter, Presidio County, Tex., via Marfa, Jan. 31.—Reports were received here today that 30 were killed in a battle between revolutionists and federals just across the Rio Grande yesterday. Federal soldiers came upon insurrectos by surprise over the brow of a hill and the firing commenced immediately. Two hundred participated and for a while the fighting was hard to hand. It is also reported that Gen. Luque with 300 federalists is hemmed in near Ojinaga.

SAHUARIPA RECAPTURED.

Douglas, Ariz., Jan. 31.—A mining engineer, the first man out from Sahuaripa, confirms the story that the federals have recaptured that city. The rebels learned of the approach of federal forces of 500 men with two machine guns and they evacuated the city, taking a position in the mountains. There was no severe fighting. The rebel force now at large probably accounts for the increase of the federal forces in the border towns.

All the guns in Douglas stores were shipped for the federal government to Nogales, Naco and Agua Prieta. The regulars from Cananea are still held in Agua Prieta and each night guards two and two are stationed along the international boundary.

Prominent railroad officials have been warned by the rebels to move their children and women out of the city as they have planned an attack immediately. Many Mexicans continue to cross the line into the United States to escape imprisonment into the citizen soldiery of which 300 have been placed under arms in Cananea.

HONORS EVEN.

Mexico City, Jan. 31.—A battle between federals and revolutionists at Sahuaripa is reported in special dispatches from Montezuma, Sonora, to have occurred January 25. Col. Ojeda, commander of the regulars, and Severiano Talamantes, leader of the rebels, are said to have been killed. No details of the fight were given, far fewer than the troops occupied the town.
