TERRITORIAL NOTES.

Items of Interest Culled From Our Exchanges.

Reports from the Phoenix office of the Southern Pacific indicate that travel to California is very heavy, and the trains are leaving every day with full coaches.

A party of California farmers who understand irrigation by means of pumping plants, have taken up 4,000 acres of land situated about six miles south of Casa Grande, and arrived there this week, with carloads of horses, household effects, farming and pumping machinery and commenced business. They will soon make their lands fruitful and build for themselves comfortable homes.

The Warrior Development company continues its regular shipments, averaging for several months past more than one hundred tons of 9-12 per cent ore daily. The steady shipment of Warrior ore has become proverbial. The regular routine of its operation has rendered news of its progress uninteresting. It is one of the three present producers of the Miami (or eastern) side of the Globe mining district.

Significant in that it is believed to be an aftermath of the Prescott incident in which two United States army officers were refused admission to a skating rink because of the uniforms which they wore, the order detailing Captain E. O. C. Ord, U. S. A., retired, as instructor of the Arizona National Guard, has been revoked by action of the war department. The revocation of the detail order was made at the request of Captain Ord.

Right-of-way Agent C. D. Reppy, of the Arizona Eastern, left for Mesa again Monday to obtain the last mile of right-of-way for the spur from Mesa to Chandler. The spur will run due south from Mesa to the Pinal county line, west of Sacaton, through the Chandler-Ferry-Murphy tract, 18,000 acres of which is now under cultivation, being irrigated mostly by pumping plants installed by the government under the Roosevelt canal system.

Yesterday the cattlemen of the Hackberry country sent out a trainload of cattle consisting of 1400 head. Today another like shipment is to be made, while on the fourth of June about two train loads are to be sent to market. The entire shipments will cover about 6,000 head of cattle and will bring to the cattle owners \$100,000. This is the largest shipment of cattle made from this county in years and is an indication of the growing industry in the east end of the county.—Kingman Miner.

Territorial Auditor George Mauk went over the proposed route of the Territorial road between Bisbee and Tombstone. It is said that Mr. Mauk was much pleased with the route up Tombstone canyon from Douglas and that he will at least recommend that the road continue through Bisbee and on to Tombstone, but at the same time it is understood that Mr. Mauk is not impressed with the idea of taking the road to either Benson or St. David. Just what will be the final route remains to be seen.

The territorial fair commission met last Friday and Saturday to organize for the year, and elect officers. Hugh E. Campbell, of Flagstaff, was elected president, W. C. Foster, treasurer to succeed Al Moore, Shirley Christy, secretary. E. R. Purdie was elected a member of the commission. It has been arranged to open offices for the commission in the basement of the Phoenix National Bank building, and it is expected that they will be ready for occupancy by June 1. Little was done at the last week's meeting except organize, but important matters relative to the yearly fair will be considered during this week, when the commission will meet frequently to complete the racing program, and make out the premium list.—Republican.

"Red" Lopez was yesterday sentenced to eight years in penitentiary at Hermosillo by the insurrecto court martial which has been in session at Agua Prieta this week. Desertion in the face of the enemy was the charge against Lopez.

Feeling assured that the period of political unrest in Mexico is now a thing of the past, refugees who have been in Arizona while Sonora has been a scene of strife are commencing to leave and return to their homes. This shows better than anything else that the people generally are appreciative of the fact that the resignation of Diaz was all that was needed to bring ceaseure from the war. The refugees who have left Tucson for their homes were quite happy at the idea of returning to their own vine and fig tree and expressed the hope that there would be no recurrence of the war.

The Sterling Development company, which has acquired a large tract of land near Mammoth, this county, that shows strong indications of oil, has just received at Tucson, 30 tons of drilling machinery which they will haul out to their ground at once. It will not take long to install the machinery after it reaches the ground, then boring for oil will commence in earnest. The management expects to put down a bore hole to a depth of 2,000 feet inside of sixty days from the start and have bought that amount of casing. However, they expect to strike oil at a depth of 1,000 feet.—Florence Blade.

The latest Arizona company is a set of articles of incorporation from Jerusalem of more than passing interest, for a variety of reasons. The names of the incorporators are Prince Emanuel and Philly Goldreich, and the amount of the capital stock is \$200,000. More spectacular even than the names of the incorporators, is the institution itself, which is as follows: The Most Supreme Inviolable and Universal Lodge of King Solomon's Temple, of the Temple of Wisdom or Universal University. It is apparent from the articles that their purpose is the founding of an institution of learning of general character, particularly for Jewish children, presumably for the most part natives of Palestine.—Prospector.

James F. McConnell came in from Goldroad last Monday afternoon, bringing with him a bar of bullion weighing \$17,000, the mill run for the week. The smaller tonnage of ore that is being handled at the mill accounts for the rather low bullion output the past month, but this will be remedied as soon as the new battery of boilers is installed at the big power plant. At the mine work is being rushed at all points and the property is showing wonderful ore bodies. Those that have had the opportunity of going through the property believe it to be one of the greatest gold mines in the United States. It can now readily output one thousand tons a day for years, and a high milling grade of ore.—Miner.

It is expected that by the first of July the lands in Wallapai valley will be thrown open to entry by the government. The people will be notified through the Miner just when these lands may be entered, the department now having the survey plats under consideration. The lands embrace about 800,000 acres, two-thirds of which lie in the valley proper, and the balance through the north end of the Wallapai mountain and along the Big Sandy. These lands are well situated for irrigation and in the event that water can be brought upon them will make Wallapai valley one of the richest sections of the southwest. Everything in the way of fruits can be raised on the lands, while wheat and other small grains would do well.

ARIZONA BULLETIN, JUNE, 1911.

Globe is planning to build a high school to cost \$50,000 to \$60,000.

Corner stone of Elks Lodge to cost \$20,000, was laid at Yuma on May 23rd.

A summer resort in the Pinal mountains is to be established by the citizens of Globe.

Great smelters at Douglas are turning out big supplies of copper. Works employ 1,500 men.

Activity is being renewed at Swansea. The smelter there is to be blown in at an early date.

Reports from Navajo County announce formation of more oil companies to drill in vicinity of Winslow.

Cattle growers in Coconino county have organized association to encourage industry. Arizona cattle demanded in best markets.

Reports from Mohave county increasing prosperity in mining industry. Mohave produced \$1,526,279.56 in gold, lead and zinc last year.

Wickenburg reports activity in many mining centers. Several important mineral discoveries are heralded from various parts of Arizona.

Lumber mills at Flagstaff increasing their capacity. Now cutting 100,000 feet daily. Arizona pine now in demand and is of proven value.

Contracts have been let for continuation of Territorial highways on the Tucson-Bisbee and on Flagstaff-Prescott sections. Good roads in Arizona.

Nogales, the Arizona gateway to Mexico, reports activity in mines. Shipments of cattle are heavy. Business continuing with little interruption.

Transcontinental automobile highway along 35th parallel will go through Arizona. Arizona offers only open-all-the-year road from coast to coast.

Orders to survey Colorado Indian Reservation have been issued. Opening up of this reservation is looked for. Reservation contains 200,000 acres.

Tucson has arranged for right-of-way for El Paso & Southwestern Railway in the city. Railroad expected to extend lines to other Arizona cities.

Many enterprises are being undertaken in Pinal county. Road improvement and opening of concrete bridge across Gila river brings Florence in closer touch with Salt River valley towns.

Cordial co-operation evidenced. Work of organization to induce all Arizonans to work for all Arizona is meeting with success. Annual meeting November at Phoenix.

PINAL PAYMENT IS MADE.

Yesterday the final payment of \$5,000 was made by the Tiger Gold Company to P. Kearney, for the latter's interests in the Gray Eagle and Cleveland mines in the Bradshaw Mountains, which aggregates \$60,000 paid for these properties to date. The original deal dates back to 1905, when the company assumed charge. Mr. Kearney was the owner of a one-half interest in each mine, and had been associated with their operation by the purchasing company. This transaction removes all pioneer owners and Mr. Kearney is the last to retire from ownership. Both mines are at present under development and more attractive than at any time in their history.

The Gray Eagle lode is among the oldest locations in the Bradshaw region and has always enjoyed a high standing in mining circles.—Prescott Journal Miner.

CREPIN CHILDREN RECOVERING.

Jean Crepin, aged 10, and Mignon Crepin, aged 6, the two children of A. E. Crepin, are now beginning to recover, their physicians state, from the first cases of infantile paralysis which have come under medical observation in Tucson. The elder child is stated to have so far recovered from the deadening paralysis as to be able to walk a little. The younger child is still unable to use her limbs.

Dr. H. E. Crepin, uncle of the children, is in charge of their cases, and is assisted by Dr. I. E. Huffman. Six other physicians have been called in from time to time to observe the new disease and assist in checking it.

Infantile paralysis is described by medical men as an inflammation of the nerve cells in the gray matter of the spinal cord, which begins suddenly, is followed by a paralysis of the muscles controlled by the nerves attacked. It was imported to this country about five years ago, and has since raged in epidemic form among children in the eastern states, taking a toll of 100,000 victims. Two in every ten have died, and only two in ten escaped being crippled for life.

The presence of the disease in the Crepin children became apparent through partial paralysis during a visit to Nogales about a week ago. They were brought to Tucson immediately for treatment.

Dr. Huffman stated today that no other cases of the disease have been reported in the city.—Tucson Citizen.

BIG ROUNDUP.

A big roundup is in progress on the Empire ranch near Vail, and after the cutting out process is completed the shipments will commence. The first shipments are to be made about June 10. According to E. L. Vail, the size of the shipment has not yet been determined, and will not be until the roundup is completed.

The usual shipments, however, are about 2000 head. The cattle will be shipped, to one of the California ranches.—Citizen.
