Kruttschnitt, assistant superintendent of the Nogales-Tucson division of the Southern Pacific railway company, with headquarters at Tucson has been in the city this week on business connected with the improvements his company will shortly make here. Large new freight houses will be erected on the company's property in front of the court house and the big stone building now in use will be remodeled for use of the U. S. immigration and customs officials. About twenty-five thousand dollars will be expended in the new improvements.

### AMENDMENT TO ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION, THE TUNA BITTERS COMPANY

We, the undersigned, President and Secretary respectively of The Tuna Bitters Company, do hereby certify that at the special annual meeting of the stockholders of the said THE TUNA BITTERS COMPANY called pursuant to notice and to the provisions of the By-Laws of the said company at the office of Frank J. Duffy in the town of Nogales, Arizona, on the 8th day of August, A. D. nineteen hundred and eleven, at which said meeting a majority of the stock of said company was present and participating, the following amendment to the Articles of Incorporation was adopted by the unanimous vote of a majority of the stock, to-wit:

Article III of the said Articles of Incorporation of said company was amended so as to read as follows: Article III. "The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), divided into Ten Thousand (10,000) shares of the par value of ten dollars per share, which said capital stock shall be issued by the Board of Directors only when fully paid for in money, property or services, and in the absence of fraud, such stock when so issued shall be fully paid and non-assessable and shall be conclusive as to the value of the property purchased or the services performed."
