Democratic state candidates will address the voters of Tubac tomorrow night. Monday they will address the voters of Patagonia and Monday night the big show at the Lyric in this city will be pulled off. Come out and listen to Arizonans with red blood in their veins. Men who have the nerve to speak out in court and tell the voters just where they stand on every question of interest to Arizonans.

A detachment of ten U. S. soldiers from Fort Huachuca, arrived in the city yesterday, presumably for the purpose of keeping an eye on the so-called Reystas who are said to be herding along the Mexican border, on the American side of the international line. Our Uncle Sam does not propose to take any chances, and anyone caught attempting to start anything on this side of the line, will get all that is coming to him.

Hon. Mark Smith and party will speak at the Lyric Theatre on Saturday evening, December 9th. The following Democratic nominees will accompany Mr. Smith: David Johnson, for state treasurer, W. P. Geary for Corporation Commissioner, A. W. Cole for Corporation Commissioner, C. O. Case for Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Hon. Wiley E. Jones. There will be a free moving picture show and good music.

Colonel Garcia, hero of many battles during the late revolution in Mexico, has been in the city several days, accompanied by his secretary D. R. Salazar. Colonel Garcia on Wednesday evening addressed a large crowd in front of the Congreso or International street. He told of the hundreds of lives lost during the battles in Sonora for the welfare of his beloved country, and concluded his remarks by denouncing those so-called Reystas who would through envy and spite, cause trouble with the present Mexican Government. Like Madero, Colonel Garcia is a Democrat who believes in "Letting the people rule." During the evening, Mr. W. M. Hunter, vice president of the Sonora Valley Land Company, delivering a rousing speech in English. Eduardo Legleu, vice president of the International Cattle Company, interpreted his remarks which were loudly applauded.

Jake Shepard, the mining man, who has been mining down on the Yaqui river several years, arrived from the South Thursday and yesterday continued north. He said the reports printed in the daily press of the United States to the effect that Yaqui Indians were killing Americans, or anyone else, for that matter, were absolutely false, and evidently circulated for the purpose of injuring the Mexican government.

Tonight there will appear at Ramirez Theatre, Pixley & Lander's latest comedy song success "A Wife Wanted." This excellent comedy, in three acts, was written for the purpose of laughter, says an exchange. The situations are bright, witty and farcical in nature, and yet refined. The play is a decided novelty, not a dull line. A howl from start to finish, and it is a comedy gem without a flaw. If you want to laugh and forget your troubles go to Ramirez Theatre tonight.

Mr. and Mrs. John Glasson have taken apartments in the John Wilson house and will spend the winter in Nogales, near where Mr. Glasson has some valuable mining interests, now receiving his personal attention. He has resigned his position of superintendent for the Richfield Copper Company of which Major James A. Cooper of Washington, D. C., is vice president. Captain William Glasson, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Glasson, is making his home with his parents.

Don't forget the big Democratic rally at the Lyric Theatre next Monday evening. There will be an unusually fine moving picture show, free, with special music, for the occasion. The meeting will be attended by the following Democratic nominees: George W. P. Hunt for governor, Henry F. Ashurst for United States senate, Carl Hayden for Congress, George Purdy Bullard for attorney general, Sidney P. Osborn for state auditor, and F. A. Jones for Corporation Commissioner. Don't forget the time, and the place. Everybody invited.

Lee Reagan, president of the Yaqui River Consolidated Gold and Copper Company, after an extended absence from the city, arrived from Tucson Thursday night and is busy transacting company business. It is said the affairs of the company, financially and otherwise, are in good condition and stockholders may soon look for "something doing." On December 20th, next, there will be held at the office of Hon. Frank J. Duffy, a special meeting of stockholders of the company, for the purpose of considering a consolidation with the Cicero Smith Mining Company, and for the purpose of raising the capital stock of the Yaqui River Consolidated Gold and Copper Company.

E. E. Bethell, manager of the Washington Trading Company's Patagonia store, was a business visitor here the forepart of the week. He reported the Patagonia mining district looking up, there being at the present time a large number of prospectors and prospective buyers in that district. Mr. Bethell is personally interested in some very good mining properties near Patagonia. He said the Three R. mines owned by Colonel R. R. Richardson and A. E. Crepin, continues one of the biggest and best mines in the country. Gray Brothers, who own and are working adjoining property to the Three R., also have a valuable property from which they have shipped some good pay ore to the smelter.

Last night at the Lyric Theatre Hon. E. W. Wells, republican nominee for governor and Hon. W. S. Sturgis, nominee for Corporation Commissioner, addressed a large audience composed of Santa Cruz county voters, republicans and democrats. Geo. D. Christy, nominee for attorney general, J. F. The gentlemen, all of whom are standpat anti-constitutional Republicans, were a great disappointment to the voters who heard them. Judge Wells promised absolutely nothing if elected to the governorship. George Christy stated that Cameron, Hoyal Smith and Williams were three kings, himself and Wells two aces, which constituted a full house, if elected. All in all the republican meeting last night, was a great success from a Democratic point of view.

Mayor of Douglas in Nogales.

Hon. Frank Ramsey, mayor of Douglas, Arizona, and nominee on the Democratic ticket for treasurer of Cochise county, has for the past week been a guest at the Montezuma hotel, after having accompanied a trainload of Sonora cattle to Los Angeles, where he disposed of them at a good profit.
