Harper J. Cunningham, owner of splendid mining property on the west side of the Patagonia, near the Havalena Mining Company's property, is a guest at the Montezuma hotel. A short time ago Mr. Cunningham made a nice deal, and now has several others pending. He also has property over in the Irish Corner, this county, near the property bonded to P. J. McIntyre of this city, who is daily expected home from New York.

It is said here that Colonel Camberos of the Constitutionalist army in Sonora, has been arrested, by order of Governor Pesqueira, on a charge of being a member of the party that two weeks ago boldly recaptured the aeroplane belonging to the state of Sonora troops, at Pike's ranch from United States authorities. Instead of reducing the colonel in the ranks, as is reported, one would think his promotion would be in order, for helping to recapture the airship.

Williams, of San Xavier, Sonora, where he has many years successfully engaged in mining, has been a visitor in the city this week, from the south, where just now there is little doing in his business, nearly everybody being engaged in the more exciting game of war. This is Fred's first visit to the states in a couple of years, and he says he is going to enjoy himself until his friends in Sonora settle their troubles, then he'll return and resume operations where he left off. After the war is over, Sonora will be in need of men like Fred. Williams.

Last Sunday Mr. Wm. Schuckmann, who with Richard Fleischer owns the Buena Vista mines near the Three R mine, spent the day out at camp, being accompanied by Mrs. Schuckmann and Miss Elsa. Buena Vista is delightfully situated amid scenery unsurpassed in beauty, and it goes without saying Mine Host Richard Fleischer, who is personally in charge of work at the mine, made his guests feel at home. Miss Elsa especially enjoyed the burro ride over the mountain trail, to the mine, which has the ear-marks of becoming a big dividend-payer. Ore for shipment is now being taken out and sacked. There is absolutely no authentic news from the contending forces in the vicinity of Guaymas, where during the past week the federals and constitutionalists have been making faces at each other. The state people are not permitting anything to leak out and the railway people refuse to talk war. All sorts of rumors are heard on the streets regarding conditions in the Sonora war zone, but since the battle of Santa Rosa, both sides appear to be playing a waiting game. However, news of other battle is hourly expected here by federals and constitutionalists. The state troops stationed here are maintaining perfect order, and everybody is hoping for an early settlement of Mexico's troubles.

Wednesday a big bunch of Chinese, young and old, about two dozen of them, were permitted to cross into Sonora, after having been barred from that state a couple of days, by representatives of the constitutionalists state government, who stated "No Chinese need apply." However, the railroad company took the matter up with Governor Pesqueira at Hermosillo, and Wednesday the Chinks were escorted to the international line by Captain Beatty of the U. S. immigration service, and sent on their way rejoicing, south, instead of back to China at our Uncle Sam's expense.
