ARIZONA NOTES.

Items of Interest Culled From Our Exchanges.

Howard Keener, linotype operator on the Tucson Star, was in town for a couple of days this week. Mr. Keener owns a ranch in the San Rafael valley which he is gradually bringing to a productive stage as is witnessed by the fact in marketing his first crop of pink beans of the season in Patagonia this week.—Patagonian.

J. F. Johnson, of Bisbee, has established an auto stage line between this city and Bisbee, and makes two trips daily. The fare has been reduced to \$2.00 each way and this line is very convenient for residents of both towns and especially those who have business in the county seat from the big Copper Camp.—Prospector.

The occupancy of any of the public lands of the state without a permit from the land department is illegal, and persons occupying such lands acquire no rights to any improvements that they may make, according to an opinion of the attorney general transmitted to the state land department this week, says the Phoenix Republican.

An aggressive campaign for national preparedness in the state of Arizona is planned by the navy league for the fall and winter months. Gov. Geo. P. Hunt one of the most sincere and enthusiastic workers for adequate national defenses has consented to become chairman of the navy league's committee for this commonwealth and steps will be taken at once to inaugurate actual work.—Citizen.

F. P. Adams, assistant state engineer, was a visitor in Miami yesterday from Phoenix. Mr. Adams is making a tour of the county seat towns of the state, meeting the supervisors, clerks and engineers of the different counties with a view to arranging for a meeting of the county supervisors of the state, the clerks of the board of supervisors and the county engineers, to be held in Phoenix sometime next month.

Over at the Balke curio shop there is an exhibit that caused mouths to water today. It is a bottle of real Budweiser with a legend attached stating that it was found in a cave south of Phoenix and is "supposed to have been a favorite beverage of the early Phoenicians." Balke has taken out additional plate glass and burglary insurance and it is said that he puts the bottle in the safety deposit vault every night.—Tombstone Prospector.

Judge Frank Baxter, of Yuma county has handed down a decision in the case of Arizona against W. J. Sturgeon, which passes upon that provision of the prohibition law which prevents the importation of liquors into the state for personal use. Judge Baxter holds in his opinion that this provision of the law is not unconstitutional, that the people had the right to prohibit the importation of liquor for any purpose if they so desired. That having by their votes enacted this amendment of the constitution that is the law of the state and can only be repealed by the people.—Blade.

ORDER AND NOTICE FOR SANTA CRUZ COUNTY ROAD BOND ELECTION, TO BE HELD ON SATURDAY, OCTOBER 23RD, 1915.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Santa Cruz County, State of Arizona, held at the county seat of said Santa Cruz county, to wit, in the town of Nogales, on the 7th day of September, 1915, the following resolution was presented, and upon motion duly made and seconded, same was unanimously adopted, to wit:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Santa Cruz county, Arizona:

That a special election of the property tax-payers, who, in all other respects shall be qualified electors of Santa Cruz county, Arizona, is hereby ordered within and for the said Santa Cruz county, Arizona, to be held on Saturday, the twenty-third day of October, 1915, for the purpose of determining whether the following indebtedness in the amount, for the term, bearing a rate of interest and for the purposes set forth below, shall be authorized, to wit:

Shall Santa Cruz county, Arizona, create an indebtedness by the issue of its bonds in the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, in denominations of one thousand dollars each, numbered consecutively from one to one hundred and fifty and bearing interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, to be sold for the purpose of building roads and bridges within and for said Santa Cruz county; said bonds being payable forty years after the date of issue, with the privilege reserved to said Santa Cruz county of redeeming all or any portion of said bonds at any time after twenty years after the date of their issue.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED, by the Board of Supervisors of Santa Cruz county, State of Arizona, that a special election be, and the same is hereby, called to be held on Saturday, the twenty-third day of October, 1915, at the regular voting places throughout and within the limits of said Santa Cruz county, under the provisions of the general election laws of the State of Arizona, for the purpose of determining whether Santa Cruz county, Arizona, shall create an indebtedness and issue and sell its negotiable coupon bonds in the manner and for the purposes as in said Resolution above set forth; said bonds to be issued if a majority of those voting vote in the affirmative, immediately after said election and during the year 1915, to bear the date of their issuance, to be numbered consecutively from one to one hundred and fifty, and to bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, and to mature forty years from the date of their issuance, with the privilege reserved to Santa Cruz county to redeem all or any portion thereof at any time after twenty years from the date of issuance; and it is ordered that the said question is hereby submitted to the property tax-payers who, in all other respects, shall be qualified electors of Santa Cruz county, Arizona, at said special election to be held at the time and place aforesaid; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the regular voting places throughout and within the said Santa Cruz county be and they are hereby designated in the following named precincts, as

the regular places in said precincts, to wit:

Nogales Precinct No. 1, Town Hall; Calabasas Precinct No. 2, public school house; Tubac Precinct No. 3, public school house; Patagonia Precinct No. 4, Patagonia public school house; Harshaw Precinct No. 5, public school house; Washington Precinct No. 6, Trickey's store; Lochiel Precinct No. 7, public school house; Canille Precinct No. 8, public school house; Montana Camp Precinct No. 9, P. M. Clarke's store; Elgin Precinct No. 10, public school house; Sopori Precinct No. 11, Juan Elias' house; Mowry Precinct No. 12, Red Rock District school house; Salero Precinct No. 13, M. S. & T. Co.'s building, the one used for public school house; Sonoita Precinct No. 14, public school house.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that said voting places and polls shall be opened at 6 o'clock A. M. on the day of said special

election, and remain continuously open until the hour of 6 o'clock P. M. on said day, when same shall be closed.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the form and words of the ballots shall be as follows:

Stub No. . . . To be torn off by Inspector.

Shall Santa Cruz county, Arizona, create an indebtedness by the issue of its bonds in the sum of One hundred and fifty thousand Dollars, in denominations of One thousand Dollars each, numbered consecutively from one to one hundred and fifty, and bearing interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, to be sold for the purpose for building, repairing and maintaining public roads and bridges within and for said Santa Cruz county. Said bonds to be issued, if a majority of those voting vote in the affirmative, immediately after said election and during the year 1915, and maturing forty years after their date of issuance, with the privilege reserved to Santa Cruz county to redeem all or any portion of said bonds at any time after twenty years after their date of issuance.

BONDS: YES BONDS: NO

Those desiring to vote in the affirmative on said question should vote "Bonds: Yes" by making a cross in the square following, and those desiring to vote in the negative, should vote "Bonds: No" by placing a cross in the square following.

IS IT FURTHER ORDERED that the notice for said election shall be and consist of a copy of this order properly headed as follows:

"ORDER AND NOTICE FOR SANTA CRUZ COUNTY ROAD BOND ELECTION, TO BE HELD SATURDAY, OCTOBER 23RD, 1915."

and that such election shall be called and notice given by posting at least five (5) copies of this order in public places within said Santa Cruz county for not less than twelve (12) days prior to the date of said election, and by posting a copy of said order and notice at every voting and polling place within said county, as the same is hereinabove described, for not less than twelve (12) days prior to the date of said election, and by the publication of said order and notice for at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of said election in THE BORDER VIDETTE, a weekly newspaper, the official paper, of said Santa Cruz county, published at Nogales, in said Santa Cruz county, Arizona.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Sheriff of said Santa Cruz county, Arizona, shall post copies of this Order and said Order and Notice as aforesaid, at the places aforesaid, and shall make due return thereof.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Clerk of this Board cause official ballots to be printed containing the matter described in this order, and that said Clerk send the said ballots with other necessary supplies to the proper officers of said special election as required by law; that the said officers of election shall canvass and return the votes cast, and shall make return thereof to the Board of Supervisors within twelve (12) days from the date of such election; that on the first Monday succeeding the twelfth (12th) day after said election, at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M., this Board of Supervisors shall meet at its usual place of meeting for the purpose of canvassing the votes cast in said election and shall proceed to canvass said votes and perform such other duties in the premises as the law requires.
