ASHURST ON THE JOB.

A Washington dispatch dated October 14th, says:

"A stirring warning of the dangers of unpreparedness and a thrilling appeal to the nation's legislators to provide proper defense to protect this country's honor from blemish and to secure its shores against foreign invasion was made by Senator Henry F. Ashurst, of Prescott, Arizona, at the nation preparedness luncheon of the Navy league at the New Willard hotel.

"Mr. Ashurst also made a vigorous appeal for American labor in America's mines and foundries. He drew attention to the fact that most of the mines in this country from which our supplies of metal and fuel are drawn are operated by aliens whose sympathies in case of war would naturally be with the countries of their birth. Should war break out he declared, nothing could prevent these men from doing incalculable damage and crippling the entire metal and fuel productions of our country, which would be so materially needed."

HEAVY MOVEMENT OF CATTLE.

Heavy movements of cattle both east and west have started the present week, and from now on are expected to increase for some time. The sale of cattle by local cattlemen is due largely to the scarcity of grass on the ranges on account of the small summer rainfall. Prices for cattle have dropped somewhat; yearlings are now bringing \$23, two year olds \$33, three year olds \$40, and cows with calf \$55.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF THE

GOODVIEW MINING & MILLING COMPANY

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That we, V. A. Young, whose residence and post office address is Denver, Colorado, and C. A. Hartman, and Frank J. Duffy, whose residences and postoffice addresses are Nogales, Santa Cruz County, Arizona, do hereby associate ourselves together and form a corporation under the laws of the State of Arizona, and adopt the following Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation shall be GOODVIEW MINING & MILLING COMPANY, and its principal place of business in Arizona shall be Nogales, Santa Cruz County. Offices may be established, business transacted, and meetings of the stockholders and directors held at such places within or outside of Arizona as the by-laws of the company shall provide.

ARTICLE II.
The general nature of the business proposed to be transacted is that of a general mining and milling business; to make contracts; to purchase, lease, option, or otherwise acquire, own, exchange, sell, otherwise dispose of, pledge, mortgage, hypothecate and deal in mines, mining claims, mineral lands, coal lands, oil lands, timber lands, real estate, water and water rights, and to work, explore, operate and develop the same; to extract any and all minerals, oils and gas therefrom and deal in the products and by-products thereof; to purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire, erect, own, operate, or sell smelting and ore reduction works, oil refineries, saw mills and power plants; to build and operate electric lighting, heating and power plants; to construct and operate private telephone and telegraph wires or for any other purpose; to do general real estate, manufacturing and mercantile business; to own, handle and control patents and inventions; to issue bonds, notes, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and secure the payment of the same by mortgage, deed of trust, or otherwise; to act as agent, trustee, broker, or in any other financial capacity; and to borrow and to loan money; and in general to do and perform such acts and things and transact such business, not inconsistent with law, in any part of the world, as the Board of Directors may deem to the advantage of the corporation.

ARTICLE III.
The amount of authorized capital stock of the corporation is One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), divided into one hundred thousand shares, the par value of One Dollar (\$1.00) each, which shall be paid in at such times as the Board of Directors may designate, in cash, real or personal property, services, lease, option to purchase, or any other valuable right or thing, for the uses and purposes of the corporation; and all shares of capital stock when issued in exchange therefore shall thereupon and thereby become and be fully paid, the same as though paid for in cash at par, and shall be non-assessable forever; and the judgment of the directors as to the value of any property, real or personal, acquired in exchange for capital stock shall be conclusive; and the Board of Directors may at any time by adopting a by-law or resolution, for that purpose, specify any cash value of the said shares at which they may be sold, and when so sold the said shares of capital stock shall thereupon and thereby become and be fully paid and forever non-assessable.

ARTICLE IV.
The time of the commencement of the corporation shall be the day these articles are filed in accordance with law, and the termination thereof shall be the day of the year thereafter, with the privilege of renewal and the right of perpetual succession as now provided by law.

ARTICLE V.
The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted by a board of not less than three nor more than six directors, the exact number to be determined by the by-laws of the corporation. The said Board of Directors shall elect a President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer. The directors shall be elected by and from among the stockholders on the first Monday in July of each year. Until their successors are elected and qualified, the incorporators hereof shall constitute the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI.
The directors shall adopt by-laws for the government of the corporation, and may amend the same. They shall have power to fill vacancies occurring in the board from any cause, and to appoint from among their number an executive committee which to the extent provided by resolution or by the said by-laws shall have and exercise the powers granted to the directors by these articles.

ARTICLE VII.
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability, direct or contingent, to which the corporation shall at any time subject itself is not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00).

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


