MAYOR H. M. CLAGETT.

Judge Marsteller Appointed Attorney and Dr. Gustetter Health Officer.

The Nogales Town Council met Monday evening, in regular monthly session, and after receiving reports of officers, etc., auditing and allowing demands for the month of May, the outgoing council adjourned.

The newly elected council H. M. Clagett, Otto H. Herold, Theron Richardson, James A. Harrison, L. W. Mix, E. K. Cumming and J. W. Edwards, was called to order by ex-Mayor Mix.

Councilman Herold unanimously elected Chairman, announced that nominations for mayor were in order.

Councilman Harrison nominated Otto Herold, who declined with thanks and passed the compliment to Captain Mix, who also declined the great honor. Then Councilman Cumming nominated H. M. Clagett. Councilman Harrison seconded the nomination and moved that the nominations be closed.

Mr. Clagett was unanimously elected, and after thanking the members for the honor conferred upon him, and asking for the cooperation of the members, a recess was taken until Tuesday evening.

Tuesday evening the new council met and organized, with Mayor Clagett in the chair.

The resignation of Judge Frank J. Duffy, as Town Attorney was received and accepted and a vote of thanks for past efficient services tendered, after which the matter of selecting a new Town Attorney was taken up.

A letter from the Republican precinct committeemen endorsing Attorney Arthur DeReimer for the place, was read, after which Judge M. Marsteller and Hon. Frank D. Barry were placed in nomination.

Upon a vote being taken, Judge Marsteller was duly elected, the vote being four to three.

For the office of Town Health Officer, the names of Dr. V. A. Smelker and Dr. A. L. Gustetter were submitted. Dr. Gustetter received the majority of votes and was declared elected.

W. S. Smith, the newly elected Town Clerk, was unanimously re-elected as police judge and cashier of the water department.

FLAG DAY.

A Mammoth Street Preparedness Parade Feature of Occasion.

In honor of Flag Day Wednesday June 14th, Nogales is going to have a great preparedness street parade and every American citizen is going to assist in making the affair a great success in every way.

The great preparedness parade will start promptly at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Colonel Sage, commander of the American army stationed here, will turn out the entire force under his command and Flag Day promises to be the biggest, best ever celebrated in Nogales.

Citizens will assemble on Arroyo Boulevard, with the head at the Crawford Street Bridge.

The military will march down Grand Avenue and the citizens will fall in when they have passed the Crawford Street Bridge.

LINE OF MARCH:

Grand Avenue to International Street; along International Street to Morley Avenue; Morley Avenue north to Court Street to Grand Avenue and then back to the point of starting.

Every citizen of the United States, in Nogales, who believes in Preparedness is expected to be in line, carrying an American Flag. No place of business should be open between 7:45 and 9 o'clock or immediately following the parade.

The various professions, trades and lines of business should be in the parade in a body. It is not thought practical for lodges to several organizations. The lodges may arrange for a committee to represent them in the parade.
