Charley Levin, clerk in the Nogales, Sonora, office of the Southern Pacific of Mexico, one of the non-combatants wounded in last Tuesday afternoon's battle between Americans and Mexicans, is getting along nicely at St. Joseph's hospital. He was wounded in the left arm and in the left leg, while sitting at his desk in the depot on the Mexican side of the line. At the same time Cashier E. Marcor was wounded in the hand. A third man in the office, received a slight flesh wound. Mr. Levin is a brother of Henry Levin, of Holler & Levin, customs house brokers, of this city.

Superior Judge W. A. O'Connor returned yesterday from Dallas, Texas, where he had been in conference with the officials of the Federal Reserve Bank of the Eleventh district. He brought with him the assurance that a hearing would be given to all border towns, situated as Nogales, and that complaints of unfairness in fixing the quota in Liberty Bond campaigns would be given careful consideration. Judge O'Connor will leave for El Paso tomorrow, for another hearing before Deputy Governor Hoopes of the Eleventh District Federal Reserve Bank, and says he feels certain our quota will be greatly reduced. Representatives of other border towns and cities, will also attend the conference at El Paso, next Monday.

Last Wednesday evening, Gaston Reddoch, who was seriously wounded in Tuesday's battle, passed away at the base hospital. Gaston was a bright, lovable boy, and his untimely passing is deeply regretted by everybody in this community. He was fatally shot while doing his duty as a loyal citizen of Nogales, where he had resided since childhood, with his grandmother, Mrs. S. A. Reddoch. He was the son of James Reddoch, who formerly resided in Nogales, but now superintendent of a railroad in Arkansas. Gaston was a nephew of County Recorder A. E. Reddoch and Mrs. J. W. Larimore, of Nogales. The young man was a cadet at the New Mexico Military Institute, and was soon to depart for Roswell, to resume his studies.

### OUR HOME GUARDS.

Sheriff Raymond Earhart and Chief of Police Lowe Commanders.

At a largely attended meeting of Nogales, Arizona citizens, held last Wednesday morning, at the Town Hall, for the purpose of organizing a home guard, Sheriff Raymond Earhart and Chief of Police Jay Lowe were selected as commanders, and the following advisory committee was named: Captain L. W. Mix, Councilmen George H. Fiedler, A. M. Gillespie, manager of the Nogales National Bank; F. L. Bosch, local agent for Standard Oil Co.; and Wirt G. Bowman, president of the One Hundred Per Cent American Club.

There home guard which will have between two and three hundred citizens, adopted the following plans:

"In view of the international conflict which occurred yesterday, we, citizens of Nogales, Arizona, hereby agreed through the undersigned executive committee duly appointed with full powers for such purpose, to form an organization of Home Guards for the purpose of protecting our families in time of trouble and in general to maintain peace and harmony along the border; and to that end we hereby declare:

"(1) Every member shall use every precaution to maintain peace and harmony at all times to the full extent of his ability.

"(2) Every citizen or resident of the town, desiring to do so, shall enroll himself as a member of the Home Guards at the office of Dr. J. C. Underwood, Police Justice, in the town hall.

"(3) The first duty of every member of the Home Guards or citizens of Nogales, in time of trouble, shall be to protect his own family at his own home; but in case such a necessity should not exist, then he should proceed immediately to the city hall, properly armed, without taking part in any conflict individually, and should place himself under the direction of the military authorities or their duly authorized agents; it being expressly understood that every member, citizen or resident taking any active part in any armed conflict, shall be at all times under the strict discipline of the military authorities or their authorized agents."

It is Further Ordered that the Clerk of this Court give notice of said hearing by publication of this notice in The Border Vidette, a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in said Santa Cruz county, for four weeks successively before said date of hearing.
