A telegram from Washington yesterday, announced that questionnaires for men from 37 to 46 years of age and eighteen years of age classes, under the draft order, had been released by Gen. Crowder in all local boards districts where the classifications of other groups have been completed. The local board will, within a few days, complete mailing questionnaires to registrants, the most of whom have already been classified.

Hon. Carl Hayden, Arizona's splendid representative in Congress, has been commissioned a major in the United States army, and his campaign for re-election is now in the hands of his host of friends, who will see to it that he is re-elected by an overwhelming majority. False and misleading statements made by the so-called National Security League, an organization that can not disguise its repeated attempts to discredit President Wilson's administration, will not prevent loyal citizens of Arizona, from casting their vote for one of the state's most honorable patriotic native sons.

Tomorrow three of Santa Cruz county's best known, most popular young Americans, who have been called to Uncle Sam's colors, will entrain for the cavalry officers' training camp at Leon Springs, Texas. They are County Attorney Leslie C. Hardy, Ed. Mix, clerk of the Superior Court, and Hon. Harry J. Saxon. After a strenuous three months training, it is expected the boys will be rushed to France to aid Pershing's hosts in handing the Kaiser the final knockout punch. The boys will take with them the best wishes of a host of personal friends and acquaintances throughout Santa Cruz county. All will make good.

According to information received here by Postmaster Wm. Schuckmann and Bracey Curtis, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce, congress has authorized the expenditure of \$120,000 for a Federal Building to be erected in Nogales, on a site for which an additional \$15,000 have also been authorized. The money is said to be available immediately. The proposed building will be two story. The post-office will occupy the ground floor and the customs department, immigration service, war trade board and department of justice will be located on the second floor. It is said the site for the new building will be selected at an early date, after which it is believed construction work will immediately commence.

Blix & Company, contractors of Douglas, who have the contract for building the new Y. M. C. A. building on the site of the guard house at Camp Little, last Thursday morning commenced work and the new Y. building will be pushed to completion as fast as possible. The building will be 38x112 feet and will be built of wood. Besides the auditorium with a seating capacity of between eight and nine hundred, there will be bed rooms, shower baths, lavatories and two class rooms; also a ladies' rest room and a reception room where the enlisted men may entertain their lady visitors. The building which will be completed next month, will be equipped with numerous writing desks, amusement tables, gymnasium equipment, etc.
