## LOCAL NEWS.

Tuesday Attorney Fred Noon visited Tucson on legal business.

Yesterday Arthur Martin, Assistant Postmaster, returned from San Francisco, where he enjoyed ten days' vacation.

Friends of Matt Hamblin, superintendent of the Nogales Jersey Farm, will be pleased to learn that he is recovering from injuries received when his milk wagon was wrecked at Yaqui Hill by an automobile driven by a young Mexican named Woolfolk.

Yesterday W. G. Bowman filed a suit against the members of the Nogales City Council protesting against the installation of an electrically driven pumping plant, until the voters have balloted upon the referendum recently filed protesting against the proposition.

Keith Hubbard and Miss Mildred Louderbach of Tucson, were married last Wednesday afternoon at Trinity Congregational church, in this city, Rev. O. A. Smith, officiating. The newly weds will reside in Tucson, where the bridegroom is connected with the Tucson Fire Department.

At the meeting of the directors of the Nogales Chamber of Commerce held last Thursday night, the matter of building a tourist hotel in Nogales was taken up and a committee to secure data regarding the building of such a hotel was appointed to report at an early date.

In open court last Monday, a list of 50 grand jurors, and 300 trial jurors, to serve during the 1922 sessions of the Santa Cruz county superior court, was drawn by Clerk of the Court Robt. E. Lee, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors James L. Finley, and County Recorder Malcom Middleton.
