A RED LETTER DAY.

Hundreds of Citizens at "Spudding In" of Elgin Oil Well.

More than 500 residents of Santa Cruz county attended the official "spudding in" of "Cady No. 1," the title applied to the first well of the Nogales Oil and Gas Company, at Elgin, Sunday.

By their presence, the large crowd of directors, stockholders of the company, and citizens of the county, gave evidence of the fact that they have faith in the extended and favorable reports regarding the oil bearing possibilities of the company's holdings, made by geologists for a period covering the past twenty-five years.

From daylight Sunday morning until the hour of the official "spudding in" at noon, the roads leading to Elgin were dotted with automobiles climbing over the mountain roads, resembling a trail of black ants, when viewed from the higher points.

More than 150 automobiles, having as passengers, hundreds of citizens, interested in the development of this county, were parked about the field where the official "spudding in" occurred, at the noon hour.

A reception committee, composed of the directors of the oil company greeted the visitors, all of whom were requested to participate in a picnic lunch, the piece de resistance of which was delicious barbecued beef.

Captain L. W. Mix, president of the Nogales Oil & Gas Company, sponsor of the day, opened the program by inviting the assemblage to partake of two nice young beebes which had been barbecued for the occasion under the able direction of M. M. Davidovich, director of the oil and gas company.

The crowd responded very enthusiastically in the consumption of the beebes, after which the assemblage was called to the rig and Captain Mix introduced the speakers. Judge W. A. O'Connor welcomed the assemblage in his usual heartfelt manner. J. W. Going from the California oil fields and a director of the drilling company, stated in a few brief words the generalities of the oil business.

Bracey Curtis, one of the best known men in Arizona, president of The First National Bank of Nogales, and a director of the oil and gas company, commented upon the conditions of this undertaking, thanked the people for their support and interest, and stated that a continuance of the same was bound to bring success.

Oscar T. Jones of California, vice president of the drilling company, commented upon his organization, and stated his pleasure at the wonderful progress made to date, and expressed his gratitude to the Nogales Oil & Gas Company, and the people of Nogales and vicinity, for their co-operation in this undertaking.

Dr. L. W. Klene, an old time resident of Elgin district, commenting upon the country as it was and is at the present time. Mr. Neil of Elgin spoke for the dry farmers of the district and their present prospects.

Captain Mix then introduced R. E. Leslie, president of the drilling company, who commented upon the loyal support of his own organization. He thanked the Nogales and Santa Cruz county people as a whole for the wonderful cooperation they have given him in this undertaking, and asked the people for continued confidence and support, after which he introduced the balance of his organization including E. L. Farrin, secretary of the drilling company; W. O. Dugger, assistant to Mr. Cady; Fay Whipple, assistant to Mr. Cady; E. R. Cady, superintendent and the man to whom he looks for the success of the drilling operations.

Captain Mix then christened the well to the chief driller, naming it "Cady No. 1," after which the machinery was started and the drill was put to work hammering the hole into the ground. The audience was then passed through the base of the

derrick where they could have a close up view and see the more intricate working of the machinery going after the oil.

The well is being drilled on the Babacomari Grant which consists of 33,792 acres of land upon which the Nogales Oil & Gas Company and the Western Pacific Drilling Company hold the oil and mineral rights. The two companies also hold several thousand acres of leases surrounding the Babacomari Grant, their total acreage being approximately 50,000 acres. It is the plan of the companies to immediately drill several wells in order to test their holdings.

The equipment for the first well is all on the ground including 3500 feet of casing, a 90 foot derrick, and all other equipment necessary to carry on the drilling of an oil well under the most modern methods, and the drilling crew in charge are men who have had long and varied experience in drilling oil wells. Mr. Cady, field superintendent and chief driller, has spent the last six years of his experience drilling for the Associated Oil Company and is very highly commended by that company.

The Western Pacific Drilling Company, while an Arizona corporation, was originally financed in California among men who know the oil business, which should add confidence to the possibility here. The Nogales Oil & Gas Company was financed and is being managed by the most prominent and successful business men of Nogales and Santa Cruz county. This combination of conservative business men and experienced oil men, joined with the paramount idea, should lead this undertaking to a success.—Democrat.
