The minutes of the meetings of May 1st and 13th, were read and approved.

The following reports were presented to the Board, read, and ordered filed:

Mr. C. M. Melick appeared before the Board with reference to damages done to his property by the State Highway, asking that he be paid for said damages, asking settlement for a fence and cattle passes. After due consideration, action on this claim was deferred until later in the day.

Upon motion duly made and carried, Board recessed until 1:30 p. m. Board met at 1:30 p. m. All Members and Clerk being present.

Mr. J. A. Harrison appeared before the Board with reference to a change in the Washington Camp road, asking that the county fence on one side of the road where it goes thru his land, as he already has a fence on one side and the land would only go to where the present fence now is. After due consideration, Board decided that they could do nothing until a petition had been regularly acted upon and the County Engineer was instructed to prepare such a petition and have action on same as soon as possible.

Mr. Melick again appeared before the Board with reference to his previous claim for damages. A question as to the time of the signing of the original petition came up, and Mr. Fraizer, who was in charge of the survey of the State Highway from Sonoma to Cochise county line, was called and it was shown that the petition was signed some six months after the final location of the road was made. After lengthy discussion, Member Noon moved that it be referred to the County Attorney for a written opinion, which was seconded by Member Ashburn and carried.

Sherriff White appeared before the Board with reference to building, or rather, roofing part of the space now used for a court for the women's cells, for a private office for the Sheriff, which was taken under consideration for the 1922 budget.

The Chairman report approval on the bond of R. L. Mason, Justice of the peace precinct No. 11, with the U. S. F. & G. Co., in the amount of \$1,000.00 as surety.

Chas. P. Lopez appeared before the Board in behalf of Mrs. Thomas Pacheco, who is a widow and unable to pay the last half of the 1921 taxes. After due consideration, the Board instructed the Clerk to authorize the Treasurer to strike the last half of said assessment from the rolls for the year 1921.

Viewer's report on the Nevins-Young road petition was presented to the Board, allowing no damages to anyone, but making provision that no action be taken toward opening said road until Mr. Roundtree can harvest his crops, which was accepted by the Board, and the Clerk instructed to have the necessary legal notices posted, and Monday, July 3rd, 1922, the day set for final action on said road.

Viewer's report on the San Rafael Valley road, was presented to the Board, allowing no damages, but making provision that the road be abandoned with the declaration of this road, be not abandoned until both this one and the Nevins-Young road be declared and opened to the public. Said report was accepted by the Board, and the Clerk instructed to have the necessary legal notices posted, and Monday, July 3rd, 1922, the day set for final action on said road.

A communication from Pete Bergier with reference to indigent condition of one Jack Trowbridge, was presented to the Board, and case referred to Mr. Ashburn. Member Ashburn, claimed that he had made an investigation of the case, and moved that he be allowed the sum of \$15.00 per month, which was seconded and carried.

A communication from the State Tax Commission, allowing the Board to make an additional levy for the 1922 budget for an emergency, was presented to the Board, read and ordered filed.

A complaint had been filed with a member of the Board of Supervisors with reference to a bill near the residence of Mrs. John Smith at Cliftonden, they claiming that when the rains came, the bill would allow the water to enter the property of Mrs. Smith, and the Clerk was instructed to write the State Highway Department in reference to this and ask that some action be taken to remedy the condition.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Clerk was instructed to notify the Treasurer to transfer the sum of \$3,900.00 from the County General Fund to the County Salary Fund and the further sum of \$4,200.00 from the County General Fund to the County Expense Fund.

Upon checking up the Treasurer's report, it was found that the original agreement with reference to promotions allowed as deposits in the various banks has not been adhered to, and the Clerk was instructed to notify the Treasurer to adjust this difference in accordance with her agreement with the Board of Supervisors.

Office of the Board of Supervisors, Santa Cruz County, Nogales, Arizona, June 10th, 1922.

The Board of Supervisors met at 2 o'clock p. m. pursuant to recess of June 4th, 1922.

Present: Chairman Finley, Members Ashburn and Noon and Clerk.

Mr. C. M. Melick again appeared before the Board with further reference to his claim for fence and cattle passes on his land. Much discussion was had with reference to this claim, and an opinion was given by the County Attorney advising the Board that they could not legally pay Mr. Melick damages, as he had not filed his objection in accordance with the provisions of the law. Mr. Melick claimed that he had made his objection with Mr. Ashburn, a member of the Board of Supervisors, and that that was complying with the law, and after further discussion, the Board agreed to take the matter up with the Attorney General for an opinion in the matter.

A communication from Judge O'Connor asking the Board to urge the County Attorney to try Silva for the murder of Mrs. Pearson, was read and filed, and the Board immediately advised the County Attorney to begin with the case. Upon motion of Member Noon, seconded by Member Ashburn and carried, the sheriff was ordered to offer a reward for the apprehension and conviction of "C. J." Samanigo, one of the benefits accused of the Ruby murder. Mr. E. J. Barry was asked if he would render his services to the county, gratis, for the assistance of the County Attorney, which he agreed to do, and the Board expressed their gratitude to Mr. Barry for his attitude in the matter.
