Office of the Board of Supervisors, Santa Cruz County, Nogales, Arizona, Nov. 9th, 1922.
The Board of Supervisors met at 10:30 o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment of October 2nd, 1922.

Present: Chairman Finley, Members Ashburn and Noon and Clerk.

P. H. J. Clarke, appeared before the Board with reference to changing the road to Ruby P. O. in accordance with the change authorized by the Board in 1918, and after due consideration Member Noon moved that the change be made and that the county engineer be asked for an estimate of the cost of said change.

W. H. Hathaway appeared before the board asking for one of the county rangers for the eastern part of the county. Member Noon moved that four rangers be abolished for the reason that there were no funds available at the present time, which motion died for the want of a second. Further action on this matter was deferred until Wednesday, November 8th, 1922.

J. E. Wise appeared before the board with reference to assessment on the old Arizona hotel building which had been torn down prior to the time the assessment was made, but was overlooked when the Board of Equalization met in June, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, he was allowed the refund on the said petition.

Mr. Wingle, forest ranger, appeared before the board with reference to repair and maintenance work on the Ruby road, but as the matter is in Supervisor Noon's district, the matter was referred to him.

Dolores Villa appeared before the board asking that she be given a widow's exemption, as she had been a widow for many years, and could not pay the tax levied upon her property. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, that she be given the exemption for the year 1922, and the clerk was instructed to authorize the treasurer to make said change.

The question was now brought up about the non-appearance of the other boards appointed by the board of supervisors, for the three wards in Nogales, and the following changes were made: Ward No. 1, Inspector, Jas. V. Robins; Clerks, J. E. Stetzer and H. A. Corp. Ward No. 2, Inspector, C. J. Healy; Clerks, M. T. McCleary and Hugo Miller; Marshal, Joe Seino. Ward No. 3, Inspector, R. O. Wilkey; Judges, Frank Miller and R. K. Taylor. The rest of the board stood as first appointed, as they were willing to serve.

The board now recessed until Wednesday, November 8th, at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

Office of the Board of Supervisors, Santa Cruz County, Nogales, Arizona, Nov. 8th, 1922.
The Board of Supervisors met at 10:30 o'clock a. m. pursuant to recess of Monday the 6th.

Present: Chairman Finley, Members Ashburn and Noon and Clerk.
O. K. Fanklin appeared before the board asking for adjustment on some property owned by him on Grand Avenue, but as it was too late for equalization now, the matter was referred to the county assessor for the 1923 assessment.

The following reports were presented to the board, read and ordered filed:
Report of the clerk of superior court for the month of October, 1922.
Report of the county recorder for the month of October, 1922.
Report of the sheriff for the month of October, 1922.
Report of the county physician and superintendent of health for the month of October, 1922.
Report of justices of the peace for precincts 1, 4, 7 and 12, for the month of October, 1922.
Report of county engineer for the month of September, 1922.
Report of the Associated Charities for the month of October, 1922.
Report of the county attorney for the month of October, 1922.

Mrs. J. R. Henderson appeared before the board asking for a widow's exemption as she has been a widow for fifteen months and is not able to pay the taxes levied on her property, and as the valuation of the said property is less than \$2,000, she was given the exemption for the year 1922, and the clerk was instructed to authorize the treasurer to make the change in the rolls.

The board now considered going out to look over the Kraton road which has been under discussion for the past several months, and the clerk was instructed to notify the county engineer of the day and the hour set for the department, the day set being the 9th inst, and the hour

at 10:00 o'clock a. m. W. L. Kinder, attorney for Mr. Keaton, appeared before the board and asked for three days before the board takes final action, and after due consideration and discussion, the time limit was allowed.

The question of the county rangers came up again, and after due consideration it was moved, seconded and carried, that the two rangers remain on until the 15th inst, then one shall be removed and the other remain on until the 30th inst.

It was brought to the attention of the board that Mr. F. T. Berry had fenced a county road north of Elgin, and the clerk was instructed to write Mr. Berry and ask him to remove his fence if such report were true.

The county engineer presented road maps of roads as follows: "Ernest Sealy's Road," the "Washington-Duquesne Road," and "Harrison Change on Washington Camp Road." Same were approved by the board and ordered recorded in the office of the county recorder as required by law.

A communication from Mr. H. B. Riggs asking permission to fence the county road, lying to the Anderson mine, stating that he would place a cattle guard and gate if necessary, was presented to the board and read. After due discussion and consideration, license was granted Mr. Riggs for the construction of a fence across the county road, with a gate and a cattle guard where the fence crossed the county road, with the express understanding that the fence, gate and cattle guard were to be removed upon the order of the board of supervisors, and the clerk was instructed to so inform Mr. Riggs.

A communication from Mr. B. K. Wilson asking for a fund on improvements assessed on the property owned by him in Lyall Canyon, but as the board had no authority to equalize the property at this time, the matter was referred to the county assessor for the 1923 assessment.

A communication from Mr. H. B. Rothrock regarding a cattle pass on his land, was presented to the board and read. Mr. Rothrock objects to the \$40 offered him by the board as their last meeting, but no change was made in the attitude of the board with reference to this matter.

A communication from Mrs. A. T. Gastrell, with reference to the bill in the Parker Canyon going to the Sunnyside camp, was presented to the board and read, but as the matter was in Chairman Finley's district, the matter was referred to him.

A petition for a county road in the San Rafael Valley, together with a copy of the notice and affidavit of the posting of said notice the required length of time prior, was presented to the board asking for the establishment of a county road as follows:
"Beginning at the section corner of sections 2, 4, 9 and 10, T. 23 S., R. 17 E., thence running south 70 degrees 12' 12" east, 125 feet, thence south 87 degrees 15' E., 500 feet, thence 31 degrees 50' E., 190 feet, thence 56 degrees 39' E., 125 feet, thence south 49 degrees 47' E., 215 feet, thence 87 degrees 25' E., 275 feet to a point on the Lochiel-Canille county road."

Upon motion duly made and carried, the petition was accepted and County Engineer J. W. Larimore, A. L. Kingsley and W. D. Parker were appointed viewers on the said road.

Viewers report on the Tubac Back Road, was presented to the board and accepted. The viewers report no damages to any one, and the clerk was instructed to have the necessary notices posted for damages, and Saturday, December 30th, 1922, the day set for the final action on the said petition.

This being the day for objections for damages and opposition to the abandonment of the road thru the Melick property, and for the establishment of the road on the outside of the Melick property, there were presented several communications opposing the said change and also a petition opposing the same and change. Mr. Melick stated to a member of the Board of Supervisors that he would place cattle guards across the fence, where the road is asked to be abandoned, and after due consideration, it was ordered that the matter be taken up with Mr. Melick, and authorize him to place said cattle guards if agreeable with him.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Clerk was instructed to authorize the Treasurer to transfer the sum of \$4,500.00 from the County General Fund to the County Salary Fund and the further sum of \$1,000.00 from the County General Fund to the County Expense Fund.

There being no further business, the Board recessed until Monday, November 20th, 1922, at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

Phoenix—Interstate Commerce Commission denies application for decrease in rail freight rates to Pacific coast.

Benson—Tombstone cattlemen ship 500 head to Winters, California.

Superior—Magma Arizona R. R. granted permission to issue and sell at par \$800,000 in capital stock.

Goldfield, an abandoned camp for many years, again busy mining district.

Phoenix—Arizona Poultry & Egg Co. organized to conduct wholesale and retail business.

Globe—Inspiration Consolidated erecting modern city including school, stores and cottages.

Chandler—Highway in Cotton City district being placed in first class condition.

Holbrook—Big oil company appropriates \$1,000,000 for development of four state oil belts.

Prescott—Milling plant to be installed and Dos Oris group developed.

Ajo—New Cornelia to build 4-room bungalows to house increased force.

MINES PAY WAR WAGES.
