LATE NEWS.

MEETING OF RAILROAD MEN.

El Paso, Tex., April 1.—C. H. Huntington, of the Southern Pacific, and a large number of high officials of that road, and A. C. Hutchinson, president of the Morgan line of steamers, will arrive in El Paso in the morning. Jay Gould, who is here, has invited them to call on him.

An inspection committee of stockholders of the Texas & Pacific will leave New Orleans in the morning to run through to El Paso. The object of all the railroad magnates meeting here is unknown. General Superintendent W. B. Cutler, of the Chesapeake road, is with the Huntington party, and will spend several days in El Paso. It is believed Huntington is coming to watch Gould to see if he is going to build from El Paso through Mexico to the coast. It is understood here tonight that the Santa Fe officials will arrive in El Paso Friday.

El Paso, Tex., April 1.—C. I. Huntington and party here this morning at 10:30 o'clock, and were met by Jay Gould. Mr. Gould and Mr. Huntington were closeted in Huntington's car for an hour. Then a notary public was sent for and in his presence Mr. Huntington signed and swore to a document the purpose of which your reporter could not learn. This evening Huntington's party left for San Francisco. He was seen by an associated press reporter, and stated that he was simply on a tour of inspection. It is announced that Mr. Huntington will return to El Paso Sunday. Mr. Gould will remain here ten days longer.

LADIES' WORK OF THE EXPOSITION.

The ladies' committee of San Miguel county, for raising funds to help the exhibit for the territory, have been circulating the following paper for signatures, and with great success, it having been endorsed by the Board of County Commissioners, the Commercial club, and many hundred citizens.

We, the undersigned, residents of the county of San Miguel and Territory of New Mexico, being in sympathy with the ladies of this county in their efforts to assist in the exhibit of the county at the World's Columbian Exposition to be held in the city of Chicago in 1893, and also being in sympathy with the departments organized by Mrs. Franc L. Albright, of Albuquerque, and Mrs. Cora L. Bartlett, of Santa Fe, lady managers for the territory.

And in view of the fact that the territorial appropriation is not sufficient to carry on the enterprise without additional funds (the amount received by the women's department being but 10 per cent of the same) we hereby pledge our support by patronizing the ladies in their entertainments and endeavors to raise funds, provided the work is carried on unitedly under the management of one finance committee, who shall have charge of the entertainments and the disposition of the funds, which are to be divided properly and equitably as the requirements may demand.

The following resolution was passed, in relation to the same work, at the last meeting of the council:

At a special meeting of the board of trustees of the town of East Las Vegas, held on the 30th day of March, 1892, the following resolution was offered by Trustee Bell, and was adopted:

Be it resolved, By the board of trustees of the town of East Las Vegas that the members of said board generally of the said town, being in hearty sympathy and accord with the ladies of the territory of New Mexico, and particularly of the county of San Miguel, in their endeavors to raise sufficient and necessary funds for the proper exhibition of the resources of the territory of New Mexico, and county of San Miguel, at the World's Columbian Exposition, and desiring the success of the undertaking of the ladies of said town in this enterprise, we hereby endorse said enterprise conditionally that there be unity and harmony among the ladies of said town in said enterprise, and the raising and disposition of funds under their control, and that there be but one proper and suitable committee to be designated and recognized among the ladies of said county, and to be called the finance committee to accept, receive, and have disposition of all funds raised within said county of San Miguel for the benefit, purposes, objects, for which the ladies of said county of San Miguel, have been duly organized in connection with the World's Columbian Exposition, and we pledge ourselves to give our support as citizens and as well as officers of said town in aid of said enterprise, but only to one duly recognized and accredited organization in said county for said purpose.

EAST LAS VEGAS, APR. 1, '92

By order of the officer of the day the following will be the program for the Ninth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held on the 7th day of April, A. D., 1892, at Las Vegas, N. M.

1—The committee on reception from the Commercial Club and Sherman Post will meet the department commander and delegates at the depot on the arrival of the train No. 2 at 7:30 a. m., and escort them to the Plaza hotel, where the department headquarters will be established during the encampment.

2—At 1 p. m. parade will form on Plaza (old town) to escort department commander, delegates and visiting comrades to G. A. R. hall. Line will be formed as follows:

3—Line of march: Plaza, east on Bridge and Blanchard streets to Fifth; south on Fifth to Grand avenue; south on Grand avenue to Center street; north on Sixth street to Douglas avenue; west on Douglas avenue to G. A. R. Post hall when command will disburse.

Sherman Post No. 1 will assemble at the Plaza hotel at 12:30 p. m. and all old soldiers are respectfully solicited to fall in with the post.
