Salonica old Thesalonica.

The recent riots at Salonica afford a curious coincidence in comparison with the days when it was called Thesalonica, and was visited by the apostles. Then Salonica was one of the cradles of Christianity. In ancient times the Apostle Paul established a church there, which subsequently numbered in its records several names distinguished in the annals of Christianity. Two epistles were written by Paul to the Thessalonians, and more than once the place is mentioned as a sort of missionary station, for which its situation at the head of the Gulf of Salonica rendered it admirably suitable. Before this it had been celebrated as the place where Xerxes halted and recruited his troops on his fatal march to Greece. Here also, when exiled, Cicero found a temporary abiding place. Its fine situation as a naval port gave it importance under the Roman Empire, but after that fell it steadily declined, being several times a sufferer from siege and storm, until finally taken by the Turks in 1430, in whose possession it has since remained. During the Greek war for independence, Salonica was suspected by the Turks of sympathizing with the rebels, and a fearful riot of Mussulmans took place, in which nearly all the Greek Christians of the town perished. At present the town is of no great importance, having a population of about 70,000, of whom not more than half are Mohammedans.

The result of this sudden outburst of passion will not likely be serious. The dispatches intimate that the Christians brought on the trouble by interference with what the Mohammedans are prone to consider their dearest right—that of proselyting. It is not impossible this may be true, as the state of Turkey, and its dependence for existence on the European Nations, are well known to all throughout the Porte's dominions, and this knowledge may have tempted the Christians to imprudent interference. At all events, however the difficulty arose, it became serious before it ended, and the murder of the French and German Consuls constituted an offense that called for immediate and stern retribution on the part of the Nations interested. It was rumored in Constantinople that the riot was instigated by the American Consul, who urged the Christians to aggressiveness; but this report, it is to be hoped, is merely an idle story or a vicious falsehood. The readiness of the Nations concerned to demand punishment to the fullest extent of the guilty, and the necessity the Porte is under of acceding to their requirements, will probably prevent any international difficulty about the matter at present. A few dozen of the rioters will be hanged or shot, quiet will be restored, the Consular offices vacant will be filled by new appointees, and the Porte and his rotten kingdom granted a new lease of imbecile existence.

The Oregon Steam Navigation Company own a controlling interest in twenty four steamers, five barges, two railroads, all the locks, canals, basins, etc., and is virtually master of the commerce of Oregon to-day, but they know how to handle the position for the further development of Oregon, and we guess they will do it, without prejudice.

We shall be in favor of a law taxing foreign travelers or drummers who every year visit this country and sell large quantities of goods. The local dealers all pay taxes but these drummers are permitted to come and sell goods to any extent and pay no tax on the State, and it is wrong.

The Turks, Arabians and Persians at Philadelphia have been the objects of so much attention from the rough and rowdies of that city as to render their visit exceedingly unpleasant. At first they dressed in their national costumes, but a single day's experience satisfied them that they must adopt American garments if they would be free from a crowd of street loafers, and from continual insult in the streets and even in the Exposition grounds. They are all now accordingly arrayed in black broadcloth clothes and silk hats, a la Yankee. While an inquiry as to the whereabouts of those hundreds of boasted special policemen of Philadelphia, and their ability to protect the city's guest from the jeers of the rabble, is now quite in order, it may perhaps better be preceded by the question, what would the Philadelphia papers say if delegates from that city were to visit a fair in Constantinople or Mecca, and be forced to don robes and long skull caps, in order to be saved from insult.

John, the heathen, don't seem to take kindly to the alphabet. One of those being taught at the Sunday School in Eugene, recently demonstrated the perfect ease with which a Chinaman can swear, regardless of time or place, when that subject is under consideration. The lady teacher had succeeded in learning him A, B and C, but D was a stumbling block. Finally John got excited and rose up and said to that lady: "G—d—n! What you alle time calle me D?"
