Good News.

OYSTERVILLE, W. T., April 4, 1881. EDITOR ASTORIAN:

I have just received a letter from Hon. Thomas H. Brents, delegate to congress from Washington territory, in which he informs me that he has secured an appropriation for the survey of a canal for light draft vessels from Bakers bay to Grays harbor, and also for an examination and survey of Grays harbor and the Chelalis river. Thinking this information would be of interest to readers of THE ASTORIAN, especially in Pacific and Chelalis counties, I send you a few extracts from the letter for publication. Yours truly, C. A. WASHINGTON, D. C., March 17th, 1881. HON. C. A. REED:

DEAR SIR: Your esteemed favor of the 25th inst., is received. \* I have secured an appropriation for a survey for a canal for light draft vessels from Bakers bay to Grays harbor. \* \* \* I have also secured the examination or survey of Grays harbor and the survey of the Chelalis river. As the survey of that river had been made several years ago I could not otherwise secure an appropriation to improve the same. \* \* \* Yours very truly, THOS. H. BRENTS.

"Home again," and glad to get home. We are rejoiced with the sight once more of the blue hills and tranquil waterscapes surrounding Astoria, while the mountains are inviting, somehow suggesting the lines of our friend Miles O'Riely to his cat, yet not at all appropriate, because it is not the "Oregon style," and there are signs on every hand indicating to us that this may be aptly described as the dawning of a year of commercial convalescence, showing the most cheerful returns of confidence and activity in all channels of trade—the many new buildings in process of construction here, the heavy freights of both steamers and sailing vessels for Astoria prove that we are soon to have 10,000, or 15,000, perhaps 30,000 to 50,000 permanent citizens at this modern Athens, and the query will be: Where do the people come from? They are coming, all the same, by every mode of conveyance. We are happy in the fact that Astoria is our home, and we have no desire to again leave our sanctuary for a year at least farther than to visit the hospitable homes of men like Farmer Gray, and angle an occasional day for the speckled beauties inhabiting the Klaskan, Youngs river, or Lewis and Clarke. So here goes for plain business, on the squarest basis that can be dealt out in Astoria. Friends and patrons give us your... The "nest" poster is that which is sent regularly into the family circle. Long obituary notices must be paid for. Look at it as you will, advertising carries with it a certain moral influence. Most people cannot resist the impression that a man who advertises a large stock of fresh goods, is more likely to have them than one who does not do so. Advertising has at least one good chance in its favor. Why are advertisers able to sell at the lowest prices? Is it not because they obtain the largest custom, by the most reasonable expenditure, and are really able to buy lower than their neighbors. Many people imagine that the effect of advertising is only to enable a merchant to sell. The reactive effect on his power to buy well is often lost sight of. Ordinance No. 403.

AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT animals from running at large within certain limits within the City of Astoria.

The City of Astoria does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That it shall be unlawful for the owners of any cattle, swine, horses, sheep or goats, to permit the same to run at large, except as in this ordinance otherwise provided, within the following described limits within said City of Astoria, to-wit: All that portion of the City of Astoria which is bounded on the south by 8th street... In said City of Astoria as laid out and recorded by John McClure, and by Spruce street of said city as laid out and recorded by John M. Shively, and on the east by West 6th street of said city as laid out and recorded by John M. Shively, and on the west by Spruce street of said city of Astoria as laid out and recorded by John McClure, and on the north by the north boundary line of the said City of Astoria as designated by the act of the legislature incorporating said city; provided, that within said limits each family residing within said City of Astoria shall be entitled upon complying with this ordinance to have one milch-cow run at large therein.

SECTION 2. The head of any family living within said city or the limits above described, desiring to keep one milch-cow and to have her run at large within said limits may be permitted to do so upon filing with the auditor of said city a description of such cow with a statement that he or she, being a resident of said city, desires to keep such cow and to have her run at large therein and thereupon he shall be permitted so to do.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to seize and take possession of all animals found running at large within the limits described in section "1" of this ordinance, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance and confine them in a pen or enclosure to be provided therefor and forthwith give notice by posting written or printed notices in three public places within said city, describing such animal, stating that if the owner does not appear and pay the costs and charges of the seizure and the keeping of such animal within three days from the date of the notice that the animal will be sold at public auction at a time and place to be specified in said notice which notice must be dated of the date of posting the same.

SECTION 4. The owner or owners of any animal or animals so impounded may appear at any time after such seizure and upon paying the costs and expenses of keeping such animal to-wit: the sum of one dollar per day while impounded, and the further sum of one dollar as a fee for impounding the animal shall be entitled to receive such animal; and all sums so paid shall go to the Chief of Police, or such person as he may authorize to enforce this ordinance as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 5. The Chief of Police may by writing appoint a person to seize, take possession of and keep as herein provided all animals found running at large contrary to this ordinance, and such appointment when made shall be filed in the office of the auditor of said city.

SECTION 6. If at the expiration of the notice provided for in section "3" of this ordinance no person has appeared and paid the costs, charges and fee for impounding such animal, it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to proceed and sell such animal or animals at the time and place in such notice specified, for cash, and retain from the proceeds of such sale the amount of the said costs, expenses and fees, and the over plus if any there be, shall be paid into the city treasury, and the Common Council upon receiving satisfactory evidence of ownership of such animal or animals shall order a warrant to be drawn upon the treasury for such over plus in favor of such owner.

SECTION 7. When any animal is impounded under this ordinance if the owner or owners thereof be known, a copy of the posted notice shall be personally served upon such owner or owners if he reside within the limits of said city, but if such owner reside outside of the city limits he may be served by mail.

SECTION 8. When any animal is sold under this ordinance the Chief of Police shall make a report showing his proceedings in full in relation to the matter, which report shall be filed in the office of the city auditor.

SECTION 9. A sale of an animal under the provisions of this ordinance shall operate to convey unto the purchaser a full, absolute and complete title to such animal.


