Mr. Geo. W. Hume proceeded to Portland by the Columbia.

The bark Rival came down to Knappton yesterday morning in tow of the Argonaut.

The barkentine Portland is still on the berth in San Francisco for Astoria and Portland.

The steam schooner Kate and Anna is in port ready for sea. She will sail for Yaquina bay with a general cargo.

Mr. John Badollet was a passenger home by steamer Columbia, from the springs of California. His health is still very feeble indeed.

It is pleasant now to sit upon the dear porches and in the open air which is as purifying and invigorating as a bath after ten nights in a sleeping car.

Mrs. E. J. Sheppard, of Oakland, presented her little lord with a handsome daughter on the 29th of December. The little beauty has been christened Violet.

The schooner Alpha, Capt. Starr, arrived from Tillamook Sunday evening with a general cargo for Astoria and Portland. She proceeds to the latter port to-day.

The barkentine North Bend sailed into port on Sunday. She comes fully laden with a cargo of assorted merchandise, part of which is being discharged at Main street wharf.

The Australian steamer City of New York has not yet arrived at San Francisco. With the tin delayed by her, and the time delayed on the overland route, our cannerymen are delayed.

The steamer Gen. Wright, formerly the Daisy Whitelan, recently purchased for use of the board of engineers on the Columbia river, arrived yesterday morning and proceeded up river.

Peter Eckland made complaint before Justice Fox yesterday that his brother-in-law, O. H. Wincent, had attempted to take his life by striking him with a club and throwing him off Gray's dock. Wincent was arrested and will have his examination to-day at 10 o'clock a. m.

Astorians will never greet the iron horse from the interior until the Oregon Railway and Navigation company, or the Oregon Improvement company lay their track to this city. Mr. Villard, President of these corporations, having secured \$22,000,000 for investment in Oregon railways since last December, leads us to hope that the day is not far distant.

E. C. Holden, city assessor, wishes us to state that he respectfully requests every city tax-payer who has not handed in his assessment return for 1881, to do so to-day. The assessment book must be made up forthwith, and after the name of the taxpayer is entered on the book and his property valued, no indebtedness will be allowed without an appeal to the board of equalizers, which will consume more hours than it does minutes to hand in a return.

Missizzie Norris will arrive by the next steamer from San Francisco and will be pleased to get a few pupils for the piano. Miss Norris is a very accomplished musician and has lately arrived from the east where she has been teaching for some time. Young ladies wishing to take lessons will do well to await her arrival.

Salmon Statistics.

Dickinson & Co's Liverpool and Glasgow circular for last December, under the salmon head says: "There has this year to be faced a total Pacific up-put of salmon, variously estimated at from 680,000 to 700,000 cases, being, at the lowest estimate, 150,000 cases over that of last year, and constituting the largest pack yet accomplished. It is due to a general increase of canning at all important points, but principally to that of the Columbia river, which heads the list with over half a million cases. Competent authorities place the lappage of stock of 1879 pack on hand in Europe when first parcel of 1880 arrived, as not under 50,000 cases, whilst that in America may be moderately computed at 20,000 cases. Taking these figures in connection with the pack gives the astounding supply of three quarters of a million cases for the twelve months. Considering these facts it may seem surprising that holders have combined to demand higher prices rather than let the goods go into consumption at present obtainable rates. With the aid of capitalists and cheap money they may succeed in their demands, but we fear that the result will be a limitation of consumpt, and an accumulation of stock which must ultimately lead to sacrifice and slaughter, a prospect tending to prevent that confidence necessary to free purchase and distribution. As remarked lately by one of the leading canned Goods merchants of Liverpool—'Whilst four months fishing must provide for twelve months consumption, it is needful that the capitalist should step in and ensure a degree of steadiness in prices, but when he firmly resists the offers of those, i. e., the merchants, who better understand the wants of the grocers, and altogether ignores the fact that consumers actually fix prices, then his actions are mischievous.' Salmon has too often been the butt of speculators and large canners, and it would be in the interests of the trade generally were prices rather supported when likely to go below production cost, but fairly remunerative prices nevertheless accepted. This would free it from the excessive fluctuations which have hitherto characterized it. In calculating the prospects of salmon, and of any probable easing of the market, the following considerations have to be taken into account. The fact that whilst the United States home demand is greater, 50,000 cases should be ample to meet it and the increase of shipments to the colonies. This leaves a surplus of 100,000 over that of last year for the European markets, or say exactly the amount that San Francisco authorities admit could be spared from stock on the coast, which only awaits a reduction in freights for shipment. Reports of present prices and firmness will induce preparations for a heavy up-put in 1881, and as canning commences in April—several months before European summer consumption is at its greatest—then forward quotations may considerably affect the market, and even show a possibility of laying down overland 1881 pack in May-June. The most important considerations, however, are the possibility of the consumption of the article being reduced by the higher prices presently asked over what the public have been paying, and the probability that it is gradually lessened from the competition of the greater number of articles of preserved goods now in the market than hitherto, and the continuously lower prices they are offered at. There being now a greater uniformity of quality of the various packs, we omit details of their up-puts.

Twine for nets is a scarce article here this year, but there are car loads of it on the way from the Atlantic slope, along side tracks obstructed by time goods trains.

Constable E. H. Hill, of East Portland, was in the city on Sunday and arrested a man named W. H. Mong, for embezzlement of two hundred dollars. Mong was a passenger by the Oregon, for San Francisco, attempting to make his escape. He was returned to East Portland yesterday morning.
