The Sound papers say that in that locality the salmon run is now likely to begin any day.

Mark Thall, advance agent of the Hattie Moore comic opera company, arrived down on yesterday's boat.

Capt. Hustler gives notice that the steamer Yaguma will sail for Yaguina and Coos bay about the 20th inst.

Senator Slater is expected back on to-morrow's steamer. It is thought that during the recess of congress he will visit all parts of the state.

David Morris fatally stabbed Sterling Officer, a young man aged eighteen, last Saturday, near Molalla cross roads, Clackamas county.

There are three cases of gunshot wounds in the hospital. Scott is getting on very well, and will be able to leave in a couple of weeks, entirely cured.

The Rev. John Rosenberg, who sometimes officiates in Grace church, in this city, has been presented by his Portland friends with a house and lot, valued at \$2,400.

The American ship Theobald, which was reported lost, has put into Callao, Peru, for provisions. She left Boston eight months ago, and is bound for the Columbia.

The steamer Eureka, formerly known as "The Little California," has been in a San Francisco dock all summer, undergoing repairs. She will soon resume her old route.

The British bark Bandahire, Swinton master, which left Glasgow Nov. 9th, 1881, and arrived at Levuka, Fiji Islands, April 29th, arrived in from that port last Monday evening.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer says that it was in that office that the word "Iwaco" was changed to "Selma," and that the Portland telegraph dispatcher sent it right originally. Glad of it.

The new channel above Tongue point has been all buoyed out, and at lowest tide has eighteen feet of water. It takes across to Harrington point, and from there runs along the Washington territory side as far as Pillar Rock.

The best-pleased men in W. T. today are the hop growers. To illustrate, the Intelligencer hears of one who in the Puyallup valley who expects to clear \$28,000 over all expenses, and he is the principal producer in the valley either.

Some of the up country papers are demonstrating the necessity of having a county school superintendent. When they get through with that they will start to prove that rain is wet; that sunlight is necessary, and other abstruse propositions.

The time of the court was taken up yesterday afternoon in securing a jury in the Bain case. A second venire was summoned at 4:30, and up to adjournment but three jurors had been secured. It will probably take all to-day to get a jury satisfactory to the counsel for defendant and the prosecution.

A stroll through the city graveyard reveals the fact that there is no room for the interment of bodies, nor can the city deed a single lot to a would-be purchaser. What is being done in relation to the purchase of a suitable location at Clatsop? Where is the hitch? We are of the opinion that all that is needed is a little personal attention on the part of the city council. The matter is an important one and needs immediate attention.

Fined Three Hundred Dollars

The denouncement to the Lawrence case was arrived at yesterday afternoon. Shortly after the second venire in the Bain case was exhausted, and there was a temporary lull in the proceedings. Jas. Lawrence Squires was brought into court and sentenced to pay a fine of \$300. The amount was quickly handed over, and the defendant discharged. He joined his wife at the Parker House, and will leave on the next steamer for the east.

It is said that the extreme leniency shown him was in deference to the feelings and wishes of his former wife and friends; that his presence in the Oregon penitentiary would have been a constant menace to her, and an unmitigated annoyance. Other parties in Portland urged that he be allowed to go upon payment of a fine, especially as he evinced an intention to make up for his peccadilloes by an entire reformation. How much weight this had in dictating the course of justice, it is impossible to say; what would have been the result had he been so unfortunate as not to possess three hundred dollars is also a problematical matter. As it stands it would seem that if a man is able to "put up" he can do a good deal that is rascally and subversive of all social law. He deserves the penitentiary as surely as man ever did, and the moral effect upon the community amounts to the tacit assertion, "run away from your wife, marry another woman, and get off with a \$300 fine."

Last Evening's Entertainment

The Presbyterian social last evening was a pleasant affair and in every way a success. The literary part of it began with an instrumental duet by Misses Welch and Hanson, followed by a vocal duet by Mrs. W. J. Stroug, and Mr. Lord. A duet by the Misses Crang, a recitation by Miss Brown and a solo by Mr. Miller were followed by an attempt at a recitation after which Mrs. W. J. Stroug closed that portion of the evening's entertainment.

Next in order came the substantial, and the ladies were soon busily engaged in serving ice cream cake and coffee, to which full justice was done by all present. We believe such entertainments will be a taking feature this fall and winter.

Hattie Moore's Comic Opera Co.

The company consisting of 28 artists will appear at Liberty Hall for two nights—Thursday and Friday, August 17th and 18th—in the latest operatic success, "Olivette," which has had the longest opera run on record. The opera will be produced with all the original costumes and mechanical effects and properties, and a first-class orchestra under the direction of Mr. Louis Bodecker. The management, state that notwithstanding their great expense there will be no increase of admission. The chart for the sale of reserved seats is now open at Adler's music store without any extra charge.

Ancient Order Hibernians

At the annual convention of the A. O. H., held last Saturday evening in Portland, Thos. Dealey, of this place, was chairman. The Astoria division has for its officers: P. H. Fox, president; Jas. McCarthy, vice-president; recording secretary, M. F. Kelly; corresponding secretary, R. R. Marion; P. J. G. Sullivan, treasurer. It has a membership of 27, has \$400 worth of property, and has \$420 cash on hand, making a showing equal at least to any other division in the state proportionately. The assassination of Cavendish and Burke was condemned; and after the usual vote of thanks the convention adjourned to meet at the Dalles at their next regular meeting.

The Fifteen-Chinamen Law

On the 21st inst. the British steamship Triumph, having previously conveyed a cargo of Celestials from Hong-kong to San Francisco, arrived at Astoria. On the following day she steamed away for Nanaimo and thence she proceeded to Port Townsend, having on board fifteen Chinamen who had been brought across the Pacific as cooks. As she neared the latter port the captain appreciated the fact that he could not land the Mongolians in American territory without rendering himself and his vessel liable to the new law. He was too late and his Chinamen were shut out by just three days. But at all hazards he had got to get rid of them and consequently he transferred them to the tug Goliath, which brought them over here yesterday and landed them on British soil.—Victoria Standard.

Montana Justice

George A. Morrison, a noted character of Union county, Oregon, escaped from La Grande a year ago, and went to Montana to engage in the stock business, and was not heard of afterwards for a long time. The Mountain Sentinel, of Union, says news has just reached that town that Morrison was killed in Montana about a month ago. It seems that Morrison stole a hand of about twenty head of horses from an old man, who, missing the horses from the range, trailed them up and found them in Morrison's possession. He claimed his horses, when Morrison opened fire on him, killing him almost instantly. The report of the murder soon got out, when a party of six or seven of the old man's neighbors armed themselves and pursued Morrison; coming up with him, without a moment's warning, on an attempt at arrest, they turned loose on him and fairly riddled him with bullets; leaving his body on the range as a terrible warning to others not to break the golden rule with Montana stock men.

The New Prison Shops

A gang of convicts are at work upon the foundation of the new shops within the prison enclosure, says the Statesman, and the building will be rapidly pushed to completion. The building is to be a substantial one and so arranged that it will be a difficult matter to set it on fire. Mr. W. F. Boothby, the architect of the insane asylum, has the erection of the shop in charge. It will be one story in height, 16 feet in the clear, 220 feet 8 inches in length, and 46 feet 8 inches in width. It will be divided into three compartments and will be so arranged that they will be suitable for any kind of manufacturing.

Label Suit

James Turk has commenced suit in the state circuit court against the Oregon Publishing Company, to recover \$25,000 damages for the publication of an alleged libel. The item which has done Turk the damage claimed was published on July 28, 1882, headed "Turk's Nefarious Trade," and was in reference to shanghaiing sailors, and as Turk claims has given his house, hotel and business a bad name, in consequence of which he is damaged in the amount above mentioned.
