The State arrived in yesterday morning. The Oregon sails for S. F. to-day.

Geo. W. Hill, of Stark's Point, W. T., has invented a file handle which is a most useful and ingenious contrivance.

Twenty acres of swamp land, near Sumner, W. T., has been bought at \$50 per acre for the growth of cranberries.

The S. F. Commercial News reports a sale of a few hundred cases of new pack Columbia river salmon, of choice brand at \$1.35 per dozen in that city, to fill an order for Australia.

We challenge any one, says the Jacksonville Sentinel, to show another case where two young men were on trial for the murder of their fathers as will be the case here next June. We are not proud of this achievement, however.

The Seattle papers speak very favorably of "Leo's Ideal Pleasure Party," which is advertised to appear here next Saturday. The box sheet will be open at the New York Novelty store at nine o'clock to-morrow morning.

The Standard comes down enlarged and improved, and containing full telegraphic report. It has always been a good local paper, and now steps to the front rank in journalism. Its enterprising proprietor has our best wishes for his success.

By reference to another column it will be seen that Messrs. Jordan & Bzorth have formed a copartnership and intend going into business in this city. From personal acquaintance with both these young men we have no hesitation in saying that they will do what they say they will do. They contemplate opening in about a month.

The Commercial News of April 28th, says that some of its remarks regarding canned goods have not been "thoroughly approved." The News or any other paper will find it very difficult to make any remarks about canned goods this season that will be "thoroughly approved." The best way is to make thorough search after exact facts and then state them just as they exist.

The corner stone for the first Odd Fellows' Orphan's Home on the Pacific slope, will be laid with appropriate ceremonies at the Home Farm near Fairview, on Monday, May 17th, at which time and place the Odd Fellows of Portland, East Portland and Oregon City will give a grand basket picnic. All friends of the widows and orphans are cordially invited to be present and participate.

The new steam whaler *Balena* sailed yesterday morning for the Arctic on her first voyage. She was in command of Captain Bauldry, and has aboard, all told, forty-three men. The building, equipment and quick departure of the *Balena* are considered one of the wonders of modern shipbuilding. Her keel was laid in Dickie Brothers' ship yard near Long Bridge, on January 29th, and yesterday, only eighty days after, she sailed for actual service.—*Bulletin*, 28th.

The work of driving the piling for the foundation of Kinney's brick building on Squemoqua street, has begun. It will be 50x70, two stories high, and will cost about \$17,000. On the other side of Genevieve street work is progressing on Capt. Flavel's new building, which will be also 50x70 feet. A building of the same dimensions will immediately be erected on the southwest corner of Genevieve and Chenamus street. There are over fifty new buildings now in every stage of completion in Astoria.

A good deal of land is being secured under the timber land act in Oregon and Washington territory at present; but the "boom" doesn't begin to compare with the way it is done in northern California. The Eureka, Cal., *Times-Telephone* for April 28th has two hundred and eighty-one notices of application. The notices embrace patents to 44,960 acres of land. It is a great deal of land, and "a big thing" for the newspaper that publishes the notices.

There has recently been issued from the headquarters of the military division of the Pacific a list of the deserters from the regiments serving there for the three months preceding Jan. 1, 1882. This list shows that there were, during this time, fourteen desertions from the First Cavalry, thirty-one from the Third Cavalry, twenty-four from the Sixth Cavalry, fifteen from the First Artillery, twenty-one from the First Infantry, eleven from the Second Infantry, ten from the Eighth Infantry, and three from the Twenty-first Infantry.

BOILED DOWN.

New York city is to have a Chinese consulate.—Objection is made to the opening of the Brooklyn bridge on the 24th, because it is Queen Vic's birthday.—Hay commands high prices.—Fitzharris, on trial for alleged complicity in the Phoenix Park murder, was acquitted in Dublin last Tuesday.—Fisherman still scarce on the Columbia.—A floating salmon cannery is the latest idea at Victoria.—German pork importers repudiate Bismarck's embargo.—A London telegram to Drexel, Morgan & Co., of New York, announces the sale to a London syndicate of \$3,000,000 worth of first mortgage bonds of the Oregon and California railroad, which, it is said, secures the completion of the road to junction with the California and Oregon branch of the C. P.—M. Livingston, a peddler, was shot for his money near Colfax, W. T. last Tuesday.—Villard was at Astworth yesterday.

Salmon Items.

The California Canner and Grocer, of recent date, says: "Affairs on the Sacramento river are in a fearful state; packers are paying seventy cents for raw fish, and are losing money. The run so far is very light, and the pack is not more than one third as large as is usual at this time. At this point business is very unsatisfactory and prices are nominal."

The Liverpool correspondent of the London *Grocer* says: "Now that warm weather has supervened there has been an active consumptive demand for salmon, and although no operations of moment have transpired with regard to Columbia river, some good parcels of Fraser river have changed hands at satisfactory prices. Should the weather continue under the present favorable conditions, no doubt dealers will see their way to improve their bids, and so lead to considerable business."

The *Grocer's Gazette* Liverpool correspondent says: "The demand for Columbia river packing is at present very slow, but prices are well sustained and there is no reason to anticipate any weakness, the whole being well and firmly held."
