THIRTY-SEVEN American ship-masters recently met in San Francisco to memorialize Congress to pass such laws as will enable America to sail her ships in competition with foreigners.

A COMPOSITOR hung himself with a towel in New York last Sunday. Had the towel been like the one which is generally used in a printing office he might have eluded himself to death with it.

If ex-Governor Boutwell of Massachusetts speaks in next year's presidential contest, he will have spoken in twelve such campaigns. He first spoke in 1840 and has been upon the stump every fourth year since.

Since the November elections the New York Sun thinks perhaps the republican party will be able to stay, but it depends altogether upon how many fools occupy high posts in the ranks of the democracy. "There can be no question that the republican party ought to go."

The Seattle Post Intelligence takes occasion to inform us that the city council of our sister city is more likely to run that municipality into bankruptcy than are the similar civic bodies of Portland or Minneapolis, a statement which is mitigated in regret only by the consciousness that our wide awake contemporary will aid in preventing such an unfortunate result.

GENERAL Wright, chief of engineers, in his annual report urgently recommends that congress make ample appropriations for putting our harbors in a condition for defense in case of war. He advises that at least \$500,000 be expended at San Francisco. Among other appropriations the report recommends the following: Rivers and harbors on the Pacific coast, \$1,978,000; gulf coast, \$3,964,600.

A GHAZTLY burial ceremony that is practiced by the Mormons rivets the hold polygamy has on the superstition of these creatures. Every wife that is buried has a black cloth laid on her face, and the Mormon women are taught to believe that on the resurrection day, when the righteous are called into the joys of their Lord, no hand but that of a husband can remove the cloth, and that unless the cloth is lifted by his hand she must remain in outer darkness forever. A woman who believes that—and the Mormon women believe it—can't help behaving herself, no matter how many wives her husband takes. She will keep on the right side of the only man who can take off that cloth.

A NOVEL inducement to crime caused by an unpopular law has recently been discovered in Russia. The police in St. Petersburg noticed that a great many petty thefts were committed of late by young men, natives of the Grand Duchy of Finland, who seemed to be so well off that want could not have prompted them to commit these larcenies. It has now been ascertained that the motive was to escape from military service, which was made compulsory in Finland last year. According to the laws of that province no one who has been convicted of theft is allowed to serve in the army, and as the punishment for theft is much more severe in Finland than in other parts of Russia, those who wanted to escape military service came to St. Petersburg and committed the larcenies, which have hitherto been visited with very light sentences.

THE Lord Chief Justice of England has just sailed away from our shores after a pleasant visit to this country. There is one Judge in the United States who is at least as great a personage as the Lord Chief Justice of England. The American Courts and judges are mostly local; but the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States is quite unique in his own dignity and power, and in the dignity and power of the tribunal over which he presides. Kings, Lords, and Commons, if they combine, can defy Lord Coleridge and his praise Judges; but the Supreme Court of the United States can defy the President, the Senate, and the House of Assembly, however much they may be of one mind. The Supreme Court interprets the Constitution of the United States; but its great authority is shown less by the powers theoretically conferred to it than by the fact that the longest, the costliest, and the bloodiest of American wars was fought to set aside a single one among its decisions, the judgment in the once famous "Dred Scott" case.

THE Oregonian is informed that there are working girls in Portland who receive so little as four dollars per week, and that they manage to exist upon this pittance. The wretchedness of such an existence can scarcely be imagined. Where virtue receives such poor encouragement it is not to be wondered at that vice succeeds in accomplishing its purpose. And for a girl there is no retreat. The beautiful parable of the Prodigal Son has for eighteen centuries been the favorite theme of repentance. It should be supplemented by a parable concerning the prodigal daughter.

"Is Germany," says the Land, an English paper, "there are twenty-two estates which are as large as any in England, the largest being those in Hanover and Westphalia, belonging to the Duc d'Arenberg. In Austria-Hungary the possessions of Prince Schwartzberg cover 120 German square miles (about 2400 English square miles). Prince Liechtenstein possesses 104 square miles, Prince Esterhazy 80, and Count Schonborn 60; and there are many estates in Austria-Hungary as large as Count Schonborn's. All the indications at present, however, point to America as the future land of enormous estates; and such as yet is the cheapness of land in the United States that a million acres there is a hundred thousand here."
