That Thousand Dollar Fine.

Who should pay it? Is it right that the town should reap all the benefit and bear none of the burden? Is it right that those who assumed the danger should be made to shoulder the responsibility? As it is not right to allow the vigilance committee to bear all the burden neither is it right to allow them to have all the honor. Hundreds of citizens like myself who were not of the committee would willingly be of it if they were asked. True, \$1,000 is a mere trifle, but though small, is it right to allow a few to pay it? It is said that when the owners of the cotton bales that defended New Orleans got a judgment in the courts against Gen. Jackson, in a few hours afterwards the citizens enbilled together and paid the fine. And are not those brave men who have been fined for defending us, worthy of like consideration? There are, at least who think so, and who, if a meeting of citizens is called for the purpose of showing such consideration and respect will esteem it a privilege to be present among the rank and file and take part in such meeting. Is not such action necessary to inspire the timid and restrain the impetive, should such a case ever again arise in our history when a vigilance committee would become an impetive necessity to restrain law breakers and assist the officers of the law in the discharge of their duty. A Famous Sea Captain.

Captain James S. Dillingham of the mail ship *Franco* of the Brazilian line, who died recently, just after the vessel left quarantine, was widely known during the war. Early in 1863 he was in command of the clipper ship *Sloop Spinnaker* running between San Francisco, Honolulu and New York. While rounding Cape of Good Hope the rebel privateer *Toucan* was sighted and hailed. Being ordered to surrender, the *Sloop Spinnaker* was captured and the crew was kept up all day, the *Sloop Spinnaker* finally escaping under cover of night. In a subsequent trip the *Sloop Spinnaker* was wrecked, and Captain Dillingham transferred his crew to the brig *Mandarin*, which was afterward captured by the rebel ship *Florida*. Here the captain was a prisoner for ten days. Before the war he commanded only merchant ships, and received a gold watch from the undersheriff of Boston for saving the brig *Nahob* when dismasted by a cyclone in the Southern seas. Since 1868 he has commanded the merchant ships *Vigilant* and *Safford* of Boston. Last August he took command of the *Franco*. In it he made three trips between Rio Janeiro and New York, on the last bringing the richest cargo ever brought from that port to New York.

Loss of the Victoria.

Captain Baltes, of the *Columbia*, brought down word yesterday afternoon that the Pacific Coast Steamship Co.'s steamer *Victoria* had gone ashore off Cape Blanco on the Oregon coast. The supposition was that she had gone ashore in a fog, but no particulars had been received. The crew were all saved and the vessel was with difficulty tached at Port Orford, a few miles below. At the time the officers left her the water was rising in the hold at the rate of a foot an hour. The *Victoria* had made several trips to this city from San Francisco, mostly at times of great frost of freezing. When lost she was carrying a load of coal from the Sound to San Francisco. She was an old vessel.

They kept a Port.—The celebrated London clothing firm of E. Moses & Co. announces that it has ceased to exist, after being in business some fifty years. This firm was one of the first to advertise conspicuously. It kept a port, and as every call drew off from a station some twenty-five years ago, a small volume of its productions were sure to be shot into the carriage. This picturesque feature was introduced at a recent wedding, the ring leaves accompanying the soft wedding music as the bridal party approached the altar. But the most startling novelty was recently tried at a wedding in Sing Sing. As a rival to the groom's best man the bride had a "best girl." The "best girl" solves the problem what to do with the best man after the ceremony, as he has the best girl to escort down the aisle. For this reason the new feature may become popular.

Ship in Distress.

Captain Ingalls, of the ship *Sutherland*, just arrived from Hull, reports that "September 12, 1883, longitude 64 degrees and 20 minutes west, and latitude 55 degrees and twenty minutes south, about noon, observed a vessel to windward, apparently flying his ensign. [The ship proved to be the American ship *Ivy*, Captain Moore, 236 days out from Philadelphia on that date. She had in a gale with damage and subsequently put into New York for repairs, and sailed again. The last heard from her she was at Port Stanley, again going.] As soon as we made out his ensign we backed our yards and hove to. Made out later from his signals that his rudder was gone. Soon after he sent a message to be leeward and to come to. Pick my people up, as I must abandon the ship! But he made no appearance to launch a boat, or clear a boat. He had four good boats on deck. The ship was steering very well and the rudder was in its place, although, to all appearances, his rudder-head was gone. He was steering with the tiller on the after part of the rudder, and a spar across the stern of the ship. He ran up signals for us to come to leeward of Staten Island, which I refused to do, as there were thick snow squalls, and it was coming on dark, while there was no danger in leaving the ship with the boats. Would have sent my boats to his aid, but my officers and crew were agreeable to go, but to all appearances there was no desire on the part of the *Ivy's* men to leave that vessel, as they clung up and fought all night, with the exception of the main lower topsail, which was kept set. The ship was allowed to roll and tumble in the trough of the waves, and finally all sail was blown to leave the ship. Was rather surprised at his manoeuvres, as he was not like a man wanting to leave his ship. Passing him about a ship's length, we had made all preparations for receiving them on board. We found the ship to be a small vessel, and we were not prepared for such a landing. I asked if his ship was leaking, and he replied "no." At 8 o'clock it was dark, and we were not able to see anything in the distance, and the *Ivy's* men never showed a light or made any signals."—*S. F. Bulletin*.


