

NEWS IN BRIEF.

FOREIGN.

The diptheria is raging with great violence in some sections of Russia. English subjects in Brazil have been ordered to liberate their slaves. The belief gains ground at Cabot that the massacre of Maj. Cavagnari and his associates was instigated by Yakov K. An. Hard times are now the cry in Switzerland, and extensive public works are talked of to keep the people employed the coming winter. A new revolution has broken out in Cuba, headed by a Crazo chief. The Archduchess Marie Christine, the future Queen of Spain, has officially renounced her right to the Austrian succession. The Argentine Republic has ordered two ironclads from Europe.

The Mexican Congress has approved the contract for laying a telegraph cable across the Gulf of Mexico to the United States. A revolution has just broken out in the State of Chihuahua, Mexico. Thirteen persons, returning from a fair, were drowned while crossing a river in the island of Islay, near Glasgow, Scotland. Forty-two Afghans have so far been hung by the English for complicity in the Cabul massacre.

Baker Pasha has been appointed to superintend reforms in Asia Minor by the Turkish Government. This is no doubt done at the demand of the English Minister. A telegram from Madrid asserts that Gen. Martinez Campos will resign the Premiership, and will be sent to Cuba with 15,000 men to pacify the island. He will have the right to declare a state of siege in Cuba.

Owing to the omission by the Catholic clergy to pray for the French republic, the Minister of the Interior has made official inquiry whether this neglect was in accordance with their instructions. An iron steamship—the Pallas—on route from Amsterdam to Copenhagen, is reported foundered with the loss of thirty lives.

Three persons were killed during a fire in a house belonging to Prince Charles Bonaparte, in Rome, on the site of the villa burned at the storming of Porta Pia.

Vigorous measures are now being taken by the English Government to suppress the honorable and anti-revolutionary disturbances in Ireland. A few days ago the authorities caused the arrest and incarceration in Sligo jail of three of the leading home rule agitators—Michael Davitt and James Bryce-Killen, of Dublin, for making "seditious" speeches, and James Daly, the editor of the *Cavanagh Telegraph*, for "seditious" editorials. These arrests have intensified the excitement among Irishmen both at home and elsewhere.

An explosion of gas at Hamburg, ten persons were killed. Yesterday a great eruption seems probable.

PERSONAL.

Hon. Benning W. Jenness, ex-United States Senator from New Hampshire, who came within one vote of being named instead of Franklin Pierce by the delegation from that State as their choice for the Presidency, died at Cleveland, Ohio, last week.

Col. John Hay, once Private Secretary to President Lincoln, has been appointed Assistant Secretary of State, in place of Mr. Seward, who has resigned.

Gen. Grant passed the remainder of his stay in Chicago in a more quiet way than the first two days, holding receptions at the Palmer House, Grand Pacific Hotel, and at several private houses. On Monday the children in the public schools were given a sight of the distinguished visitor at the Exposition Building, and on Tuesday the visit of Grant to the Garden City Hotel.

A Washington newspaper states that the Rothschilds are anxious to advance one-third of the amount which it is estimated the Nicaragua canal will cost, on the understanding that Gen. Grant be President of the company.

The following are the official majorities of the Republican candidates at the National Convention in Wisconsin: Smith, for Governor, 25,494; Bingham, for Lieutenant Governor, 20,647; Warner, for Secretary of State, 20,605; Genthner, for Treasurer, 20,601; Weyen, for Attorney General, 20,601; Whitford, for State Superintendent, 21,330.

A Washington dispatch says: "The plan of Representative Singleton, of Illinois, to make Gen. Grant Captain General in the army, seems to be received with some favor by Southern Congressmen. The bill is said to be already drawn, and will be introduced at the very first opportunity after Congress adjourns." Gen. Grant to the position he resigned when he became President in 1869.

FIRES AND CASUALTIES.

Another terrible marine disaster is chronicled in dispatches of the 15th inst., this one having taken place on one inland sea. The schooner C. G. Reed, from Detroit for Buffalo, with a cargo of grain, was struck by a sudden squall about seventy miles north of Point Au Pelice, on Lake Erie, and immediately thrown overboard. The crew consisted of Captain and seven men. At the overturn they were all with the exception of the crew, which was thrown into the water, where each seized hold of the side of the vessel and the rigging, but one after another were worn out by the waves, which were very high, and washed away. Only one without the exposure till rescued at about 1 o'clock next morning by a yawl from the propeller Milwaukee. The schooner Nellie Gardner picked up another of the crew, David McAllister, after he had floated around on a few boards for over twenty-four hours. Following are the names of the officers and crew: Capt. H. H. Reed; Captain, Harry Rose; Detroit—leaves a wife and four children; first mate, William Vincent, of Cleveland, single; second mate, John Smith, of Buffalo—leaves a wife and two children; David McAllister, of Port Colborne, saved; Frank Davis, saved; John McLeod, of Lincoln, but what port is not known; James Lawler, an Irishman, with no friends in this country; the name of the cook is not learned. The loss on vessel and cargo amounted to about \$50,000.

A long iron trestle bridge on the Chicago and Alton railroad across Macopin creek, in Greene county, Ill., lately went down under a freight train, precipitating nine cars into the abyss. The engineer and a brakeman were killed, and the fireman was badly injured.

Lake City, Minn., mourns the loss of eight buildings and about \$50,000 worth of property by fire the other night.

Another marine disaster is added to the already large number of fatalities by water the present fall. The tug Seymour, of Ogdenburg, left Cape Vincent, N.Y., with four tugs, three dredges and eighteen crews in tow for Buffalo. During the night a gale on Lake Ontario was encountered, and three tugs and all of the small dredges and crews were lost. One tug was picked up next day, and the Seymour and its crew were saved, the other twelve being lost.

A series of explosions occurred on the 15th inst., 2,500 feet from the mouth of a tunnel under construction upon the narrow-gauge railroad between San Jose and Santa Cruz, in California. It appears that the blast was left about 2,700 feet from the mouth of the tunnel, which caused an explosion of gas generated by the explosion of a small quantity of dynamite.

A gale of great severity prevailed on Lake Michigan on the 19th of November, doing great damage to shipping. A number of vessels went ashore at Grand Haven, Mich., some of which will prove a total loss. "Old Probs" has received a diploma at the International Exhibition of Science, in France, as being the best weather cruiser in the world. The former Confederate cruiser, Shenandoah, recently sank off the island of Socotra, in the Indian ocean. Most of the crew were drowned. The Shenandoah belonged to the Sultan of Zanzibar.

News from Liberia, the negro colony on the west coast of Africa, to which many of the colored people of the United States have emigrated, state that the latter have suffered terribly since their arrival there. The climatic fever carried off a large number of them, and in their poverty they had no shelter, little food and no medicine, and only a remnant of the emigrants survive. Eighteen of them arrived in New York last week, who tell a doleful tale, and others, they say, would gladly return if they had the means.

The Indian commission reported rather more success on the 29th inst., and a probability was expressed that the Indians would make a clean breast of the affair. A dispatch from Gen. Hald to the Secretary of the Interior says: "Chief Oursy this morning asks for time, and it is believed it is the interest of the Government to take to Washington such chiefs as we may designate, not to exceed ten, including some of the White River chiefs. In the meantime, while waiting for your answer, we will continue to take such testimony as we can obtain here and elsewhere." The request was granted by Secretary Schurz.

The National Association of Trotting Horse Breeders, in annual meeting at New York, adopted rules to control the admission to the record of pedigree. H. W. T. Malt has been re-elected President, and G. M. Jewett, of Ohio, Vice President.

A colony of sixty-five farmers and their families, from England, Ireland, and Scotland, sailed from Liverpool one day last week, bound for Texas.

The new French cable was formally inaugurated Nov. 21, by a telegram from M. Grevy, President of the French republic, to the President of the United States, expressing the most cordial sentiments.

Chief Murray, on Nov. 20, stated to the Indian commission that he had the best proof of overtures being made by Mormons to the White River Utes, promising to supply all the arms and ammunition required, provided they continue their fight. This had occurred since Gen. Adams was at White river.

POLITICAL.

A meeting of the National Committee of the Greenback party, with all prominent persons interested in the greenback cause, is called at Washington on the 8th of January, 1883.

Official returns from all the counties of Pennsylvania give the total vote cast for State Treasurer at the late election at 52,379—a shortage of 169,265 as compared with the vote for Governor in 1878. Samuel Butler, the Republican candidate for Treasurer, received 28,153 votes; Barr, Democrat, 22,715; Sutton, Greenbacker, 47,207; Richardson, Prohibition, 48,213.

The *Albany Evening Journal* gives the following as the pluralities by which the Republican candidates for State officers are elected in that State: Cornell, for Governor, 28,609; Hoskins, Lieutenant Governor, 1,190; Carr, Secretary of State, 2,132; Wadsworth, Comptroller, 6,619; Wendell, Treasurer, 3,274; Ward, Attorney General, 7,233. Legislature—Republican majority in the Senate, 18; Republican majority in the House, 56. Majority on joint ballot, 54. Seymour, Democrat, State Engineer, received a majority of about 10,000.

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The following is the condition of cotton, wheat, tobacco and corn, as reported by the Department of Agriculture: Cotton—There was a decided increase in the condition of cotton during October. Favorable weather was reported in Georgia and Alabama. In all other States it was favorable. The returns indicate a yield per acre of 126 pounds of lint, against 121 pounds last year. Wheat—Returns of Nov. 1 show an increase in the wheat crop of 26,000,000 bushels over last year. This great increase is the result of the very large yield in all the States bordering on the Ohio river and the Missouri. Tobacco—The indicated product of the entire country is 98 per cent of that of 1878. The gain has been the greatest in Tennessee, Connecticut and New York.

Jay Gould has just purchased the controlling interest in the Missouri Pacific railroad. Chicago elevators contain 5,616,882 bushels of wheat, 1,969,911 bushels of corn, 654,265 bushels of oats, 248,749 bushels of rye, and 626,082 bushels of barley, making a grand total of 9,265,229 bushels, against 6,129,283 bushels at this period last year.

The estimates for the expenses of the government for the next fiscal year are published, and foot up \$195,647,123. The total amount appropriated by Congress for the current fiscal year was \$192,84,048, which included \$25,000,000 for the purchase of land, about \$3,000,000 for the District of Columbia. No estimates for either of these purposes are submitted in the book of estimates this year.

Real estate in New York city is very active at advanced prices. The Cincinnati papers report that the "Cincinnati" Division Paper Manufacturers' Association held a private meeting at the Gibson House, in that city, last week, which was fully attended. It is understood that they decided upon an advance in prices of both news and book papers, ranging from 1 to 1 1/2 cents per pound.

A sharp decline, followed by a reaction, in all kinds of stocks on the New York exchange took place the other day, doubtless for the purpose, and with the effect, of "freezing out" outsiders and small operators. "It's a way they have."

The United States Auditor of Its Road Accounts has just received a communication from the Vice President of the Central Pacific Railroad Company including a check for \$600,000, which settles all accounts of the road with the Government up to the 31st of last December. The cash payments for the year 1879 will not be due till next February.
