The annual meeting of the Shi-
awassee County Sheep Breeder's As-
sociation will be held at Corunna
on Tuesday, Jan. 17.

Teacher's Association.
The Shiawassee county Teachers'
Association met on Saturday and
gave an interesting program. On
account of the rain few were in atten-
dance in the forenoon. In the after-
noon a paper on spelling was read by
Miss Etta Moseley, of the Corunna
schools. This was followed by a
lively discussion. Prof. Bates of
Owosso schools then took up the sub-
ject, "The Air We Breathe." This
was accompanied by some very inter-
esting experiments with Oxygen, Hy-
drogen and Carbonic Oxide. This
was followed by an unexpected treat
in the form of a lecture by Prof. Cut-
ter late in the service of the Japanese
Government on the Japanese and
their education. He stated that
scientists who had made a study of
the language and comparative anat-
omy of the people have come to the
conclusion that they should not be
classed with the Mongolians. That
they are superior and more resemble
the Malays. The advance made in
education in Japan during the last
few years is truly wonderful. The
English language is permitted to be
taught in all the common schools and
is actually taught in a majority of
them. Your correspondent has read
a paper that is printed in Tokio in
English. There were in the Univer-
sity at Ann Arbor last year ten Japa-
nese young men in the different de-
partments and two who graduated
from the Law Department. The
people fear the British and German
Governments but have perfect con-
fidence in the U. S. Government.
