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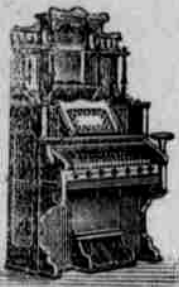
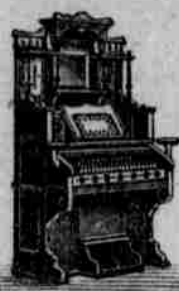

For the third time since the introduction
of the Wilson bill the people of different
sections of the United States have had a
chance to put the seal of condemnation on
the measure. On Monday, the enlightened
citizenship of the North and West made its
unanswerable demand that the policy of
destruction now being carried out by Grover
Cleveland and his contemptible cackles be
dispensed with and that the enactment of
the bill which would bring ruin and devastation to the North, be forever postponed.
By the most sweeping and significant
victory of the decade everything that is free-
trade, McKanite, Clevelandite and un-
American is rebuked and condemned.
Michigan stands proudly in the lead in
the good work and Owosso and Shiawassee

county lead the great state. Pontiac, one
of the strongest democratic cities in the
state comes bodily over to the republicans,
while in Jackson and Kalamazoo the party
of ruin has nothing left. Grand Rapids,
Lansing, Mt. Pleasant and other old time
democratic cities swing into line. The tidal
wave rose higher in Ohio than it did last fall
and returns indicate a majority of over
100,000. At the home of Neal the democratic
candidate for governor last fall the entire
republican ticket was elected and in Alliance
the republicans came out 790 ahead. Waverly
elected her first republican mayor as
they did in Mansfield, Canton and Crestline.
Laurel, Maryland, the home of Senator
Gorman and many of Cleveland's hench-
men and advisors turns a democratic major-
ity of 236 to a republican of over 100.
For the first time since the war the re-
publicans got something in St. Joseph,
Missouri and they not only got the mayor
but every city office and every alderman by
majorities ranging from 300 to 400.
Chicago, ruled by corrupt democrats and
anarchists came out for decency and right
and elected twenty-three out of thirty re-
publican aldermen.
Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and other cities
in that state saw the hottest political battles
in their history and in nearly every case the
result was a grand American victory.

In Hartford, Connecticut, the city, demo-
cratic but one year ago, was carried by the
republican candidate by the labor vote by
1109 and in Stamford, the result was equally
as good.

North Dakota, Nebraska, and Kansas,
simply emphasize their opinion of the Lil-
lolaian president and his ex-confederate
councillors at Washington.
