

IN ITS GRAVE.

United States Places the Remains of the Democratic Party.

MICHIGAN ENDORSES JOHN T. RICH BY 105,000 PLURALITY.

NEW YORK FOREVER DISPOSES OF D. B. HILL---MORTON HAS 153,000 PLURALITY.

Tammany Robbers, Murderers and Thieves Turned Over to Justice by Democrats and Republicans.

ANARCHIST ALTGELD'S CLIQUE BURIED FROM SIGHT BY HONEST MEN.

PROFESSOR WILSON WITH HIS BILL CAN GO BACK TO ENGLAND TO DINE.

The Solid South Repudiates the Perfidy and Dishonor of its Congressmen.

THE NATION REDEEMED FROM THE CLUTCHES OF FREE TRADE PROSPERITY-DESTROYERS.

SHIAWASSEE COUNTY FOR PROTECTION AND GOOD WAGES BY 1,800 MAJORITY.

Twelve Men Elected to Congress from Michigan Who Will Represent Its Industries and Not Its Poorhouses.

REPUBLICANISM, protection and decency have triumphed over democracy, free trade and Tammanyism. Love of home, comfort and plenty which had been taken away by the democratic victory of 1892, has controlled the voting in 1894 and the result is a majority that insures a republican president in 1896 and a return of prosperity from ocean to ocean and from the north to the south border. The victory in Michigan is, first, the endorsement of honesty in the state capitol and the nomination of American men for public office, and, second, the repudiation by the workingmen of Michigan of the policy that takes away their bread and butter and allows the ex-confederate brigadier who knows nothing of the northern industry to throttle the business of these great northern states. The victory in Shiawassee is a magnificent endorsement of John T. Rich by the voters, governed by their own convictions and conscience and not by a crowd led by a brazen, swaggering leader, whose republicanism is not of the kind that believes the majority should rule, but who believes in personal gain and "rule or ruin."

Tammany is overthrown. New York and Brooklyn are disenthralled from a yoke held on by thieves, murderers, thugs and blackmailers who have sucked out the very lifeblood of these great American cities. The condemnation of the democratic policy is the result of two years of hard study and thought and not a sudden fancy as was the work of 1892.

Of the election the New York Tribune says: "The Ten Commandments have prevailed by majorities that vindicate the right of the people to rule. Thou shalt not steal, the country says to those who have sold the industries of the Nation for profits in sugar speculations. Thou shalt not steal, the State says to Hill, and to others who robbed the people of the State of the right to rule themselves. Thou shalt not steal, nor lie, nor barter away the rights of the city to professional abortionists, say the people of the city to Tammany Hall. No one can measure the practical effect of the votes recorded to-day. The triumph of the Reform ticket of New York means honest elections hereafter, and will cut off a revenue of millions which the Democratic party has drawn from vice and crime. The defeat of Hill sends back to powerless ignominy the whole band of brigands by whom the State has been robbed, and returns to the honest people the power to govern themselves by honest elections."
