**JNO. B. SNEED IS ACQUITTED**

In His Second Trial at Ft. Worth for the Killing of Capt. A. J. Boyce, Sr.

Ft. Worth, Tex.,—J. Beal Sneed was found not guilty of the murder of Captain A. J. Boyce, Sr.

Mrs. Sneed awaited the verdict in seclusion in a downtown hotel. Sneed telephoned the news to her.

John Beal Sneed shot Captain A. G. Boyce to death on January 13, 1912, in Fort Worth, soon after Sneed had returned from Winnipeg, Canada, with his wife, with whom Al Boyce, Jr., son of Captain Boyce, had eloped. Boyce was sitting in a hotel lobby when Sneed entered and almost immediately shot him. Captain Boyce was unarmed. Sneed claimed self-defense and a conspiracy of Boyce to rob him of his wife.

Al Boyce, Jr., was killed by Sneed in Amarillo September 14 last. Sneed will be tried for this in February at Vernon.

The two killings have been probably the most notable in the history of Texas criminal law. The families involved are very wealthy and have played prominent parts in the up-building of Texas. After the elopement Sneed spent \$2,000 in a chase across the continent to find his wife. The first trial of Sneed for killing Captain Boyce was held last winter here, and the jury disagreed.

**Rabbi Cremated**

New York.—Lewis Levy, a Jewish rabbi, lost his life in a fire which swept away an apartment house in upper Fifth avenue.

**INDIAN BILL HEAVILY CUT**

Scott Ferris of Oklahoma is the Guiding Hand in Slicing Estimates of Bureau.

Washington, D. C.—Despite the protests of the bureau of Indian affairs, the subcommittee of the house committee on Indian affairs applied the pruning knife to the right and to the left on the bureau's estimates in framing the Indian appropriation bill. Representative Scott Ferris was the guiding hand.

The bureau officials asked \$250,000 for the conduct of the affairs of the five tribes in Oklahoma, but the committee cut this down to \$150,000. Not only did they thus show their determination to push the closing up of the affairs of the Indians, but they also struck out that clause, which would allow the expenditure of any amount up to 10 per cent of the total

**OIL INDICTMENTS MAY BE DISMISSED**

Wickersham Weakens On Texas Charges Because Evidence is Lacking

Washington, D. C.—Attorney General Wickersham called into conference Charles G. Morrison, in charge of the big oil investigation of the department of justice, and William H. Atwell, United States attorney at Dallas, Tex., to determine whether the government should dismiss for lack of evidence, any of the individual indictments, especially those against Standard Oil officials, returned at Dallas last August for the alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

The services of the warrants for the arrest of John D. Archbold, H. C. Folger, Jr., and W. C. Teagle of the Standard Oil company, indicted with others at Dallas in connection with the case against the Magnolia Petroleum company, is being held up by order of the attorney general, because Mr. Wickersham believes the evidence which so far has been brought to his attention did not justify their indictment and would not warrant removal proceedings.

Mr. Atwell and Mr. Morrison, whose investigations is expected to reveal whether there had been any violation of the decree dissolving the Standard Oil company, discussed the general phase of the Texas situation with the attorney general and James A. Fowler, his assistant. No conclusion was reached, but Mr. Morrison and Mr. Atwell were instructed by the attorney general to make a careful joint study of the evidence and report to Mr. Wickersham whether in their judgment it was sufficient to sustain the indictments.

**BIG STOCKING FOR OKLAHOMA**

Million and a Half Appropriations Asked of Congress at the Short Session

Washington, D. C.—Governmental expenditures in the state of Oklahoma will reach \$1,500,000 during the fiscal year of 1914, beginning June 30, if the estimates of Secretary MacVeagh sent to congress are all adopted.

Provision is made for the care of all the Indian tribes within the confines of the state, several public buildings, Platt National park and Fort Sill.

Last year \$200,000 was asked for the administration of the Five tribes, but this year \$250,000 outright is asked.

The completion of six federal buildings in the state is provided for. Chickasha will get \$70,000, according to the estimates; Guthrie will get \$55,000 for extension and remodeling of the federal postoffice and courthouse; Kingfisher will get \$10,000 for the completion of her building; McAlester will get \$65,000 for the completion of the building there; Muskogee will get \$105,000 for a postoffice and courthouse, and Tulsa will get \$40,000 for completion of postoffice and courthouse.

Representative Dick Morgan will ask for \$40,000 more for the Oklahoma City postoffice.

Johnson Marries Lucille Cameron Chicago.—Jack Johnson, negro pugilist, married Lucille Cameron, who recently appeared as a witness against him before the federal grand jury which returned indictments charging him with violations of the Mann act.

Richmond, Va.—Nineteen governors were present at the opening session of the fifth annual governors' conference. Governor Norris of Montana responded to the welcoming address by Governor Mann of Virginia and the conference took up the details of organization.

The governors present were: O'Neal of Alabama; Donaghey, of Arkansas; Shafroth, Colorado; Baldwin, Connecticut; Gilchrist of Florida; Brown, of Georgia; Hawley, of Idaho; Plaisted, of Maine; Foss of Massachusetts; Norris, of Montana; Oddie, of Nevada; Dix of New York; Kitchin of North Carolina; Harmon of Ohio; Blease of South Carolina; Spry, of Utah; Mann, of Virginia; McGovern, of Wisconsin and Carey of Wyoming.
